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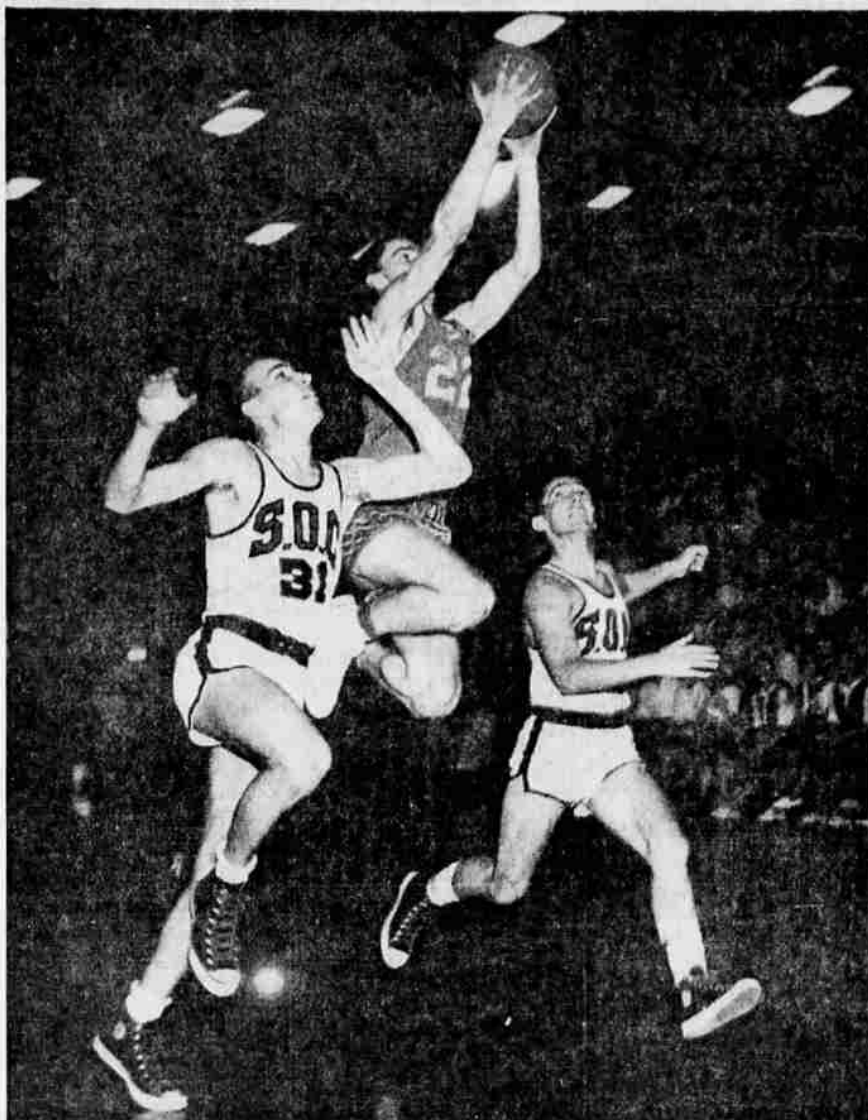

## Carrigan Sizzles Raiders Beat Owls, 74-70

ASHLAND (Special)—The Oregon Tech Owl basketball team learned at least two things here Tuesday night. One, you can't let Gordie Carrigan shoot from the field; two, you can't let Gordie Carrigan shoot from the foul line. Because if you do he's very apt to score 25 points and lead the Southern Oregon College Red Raiders to a 74-70 victory, exactly what happened.

The game, the fifth Oregon Collegiate Conference match of the season for the Techmen, leaves them with a 2-won, 3-lost record, and boosts the Ashland quint into clear-cut possession of second place behind the idle Portland State Vikings.

A ding-dong battle, as per usual when the Raiders and the Owls meet, the game was tied at 14-all, 20-20, 32-32 at the half, 48-48, 56-56, 63-63, 64-64, 66-66, 68-68 with a minute and five seconds to go, and 70-all with just 35 seconds left on the clock.

After Owl Charlie Wilson hit a jumper from the top of the key to tie it 70-all, a defensive mistake with six seconds left allowed SOC guard Brad Flanary an easy lay-

up to make the score 72-70. A split second later Raider forward Glen Peterson collected his fifth foul and Owl Jack Horton stepped to the foul line with a chance to tie the count once more. He missed both tries and when SOC started backed down the floor Carrigan was fouled as the gun sounded. While the jubilant SOC rooters swarmed the floor Carrigan calmly stepped to the free throw line and sank two absolutely unnecessary points.

All in all Carrigan hit nine field goals off his two-handed specialty, and a cool 7-10 at the foul line. Owl guard Dennis McKee came the closest to Carrigan's total with 18 points off seven field goals and four for five tries from the foul line.

Making the best use of a pair of agile 6-6ers, John Payne and Peterson, both of whom fouled out of the game, the Raiders controlled the backboards, 52-39. Peterson collected 12 rebounds and Carrigan and Payne added eight and six respectively.

Playing one of the best games of his career, Jack Horton led the OTI rebounders with 10, and scored 11 points. The number two Owl point producer was Troy Koontz who hit for 12 and added six rebounds.

Paul Layher pulled in seven rebounds and Norm Oliva collected six more. The Owls started slow and were short 13-7 with seven minutes gone in the game. The six points were the largest edge the Raiders were to get. The Owls' biggest blurt was a 64-60 lead with five minutes left.

The Raiders scored on 26 of 58 tries from the field for a .448 mark while the Techmen hit on 23 of 70 shots for a .328 percentage. At the free throw line the SOC five counted 22 in 34 tries while the best the Owls could muster was 24 in 40.

The only lead the Owls got in the first half came when Troy Koontz tipped in a missed free loss by Leon Wilson to make the count 32-30.

## Auburn Tigers Spill Georgia Tech, 66-59

As long as Auburn and Coach Joel Eaves' shuffle offense keeps Georgia Tech's number, don't count Baron Adolph Rupp and his Kentucky Wildcats out of another Southeastern Conference basketball championship.

And don't overlook Auburn either. Kentucky, well recovered from one of its poorest starts ever, needs help if it is to overhaul the Georgia Tech team that spilled the Wildcats so ignominiously in their SEC opener at Lexington Jan. 2. Auburn looks like the club ready to help Kentucky while helping itself, too.

Coach Eaves' Tigers spilled sixth-ranked Tech 66-59 at Atlanta Tuesday night in one of those "extra games" SEC teams play. The result doesn't count in the SEC standings but it was Auburn's fifth straight victory over Georgia Tech over a three-season span and it means there's a lot to come in an SEC race that now has Tech leading with a 4-0 mark to Kentucky's 4-1 and Auburn's 3-1. Had Tuesday night's game been an official league game, there would have been a three-way tie for the lead.

The official showdowns come a week apart with Kentucky out for revenge at Georgia Tech Jan. 25 and Tech at Auburn on Feb. 2.

## Expansion, Commissioner Features Of NFL Meeting

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — An early stalemate in the fight for the National Football League commissioner loomed today between forces backing acting commissioner Austin H. Gunsel and those favoring attorney Marshall Leahy of San Francisco.

Leahy's strong support as the 12 league owners opened the league's annual meeting was a surprise. He was believed to have virtually eliminated himself Monday by flatly refusing to leave the West Coast.

A number of owners had said league headquarters either should be in the Midwest or East. However, the Los Angeles Rams and San Francisco 49ers, chief backers of the athletic looking lawyer, apparently had rallied support on a platform of "It doesn't matter where the league office is located as long as the commissioner is a strong man."

A reliable source told The Associated Press today that Leahy now has seven votes and Gungel five. Leahy's support included the entire western division and one eastern club. The source said it looks like a stalemate at the start.

It takes nine votes to elect. Election of a commissioner was expected to become the first order of business in the meeting. Whether to expand the 12-team league was another item of major importance.

Other items, such as changes in playing rules, the player limit, minimum game guarantees, radio and television contracts and discussion of the congressional investigation into pro sports also are on the agenda, but it is expansion which has the owners talking to themselves, as well as to each other.

Three cities—Dallas, St. Louis and Minneapolis-St. Paul—already have made their pitches for NFL membership. Miami was to paint its rosy picture for the owners today, and it was reported late Tuesday that Atlanta also was expected to ask for a hearing.

Eaton Chaikley, attorney and a member of Atlanta Sports, Inc., has approached George Halas, Chicago Bears owner and a member of the expansion committee, concerning the Atlanta bid.

Atlanta Sports, Inc., is the organization which obtained a franchise in the embryonic Continental Baseball League. It is reported the city tentatively has approved a city-built stadium, to be completed in 1962, seating 55,000 to 60,000.

A battle looms over the expansion question. Under the constitution a unanimous vote is necessary to take in two teams, and there are two dissenters.

George Preston Marshall of the Washington Redskins and Walter Wolfner, executive director of the Chicago Cardinals, are the two opposing the action. Marshall says he feels expansion at this time leaves the league open to charges of trying to destroy the new American Football League.
