Income Tax Facts

Editor's Note: This is one in a series of articles on federal income tax filing. These articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Southern Oregon Society of Certified Public Accountants in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.

1960 TAX PLANNING

Your problem right now is how you should report the income you earned in 1959. You want to report it in such a way as to take advantage of all the legitimate tax savings you are entitled to. Unfortunately, whatever you did last year is now history. However, it pays to be your own "Monday morning quarterback." Looking back, you may wish that you had given more to charity, had some tax-exempt income or done something which would have helped reduce your taxes. But remember, all the things you could have done in 1959 to ease your tax headache, you can now do in 1960. Don't make the same mistakes twice, particularly when they can affect

the number of dollars you have in your pocket.

Planning your 1960 income can be an interesting and profitable undertaking, and it can only be done in 1960, not on April 14, 1961. Here are a few examples of what you can do this year to improve your tax position next year.

If you are your own boss, or if your job is low on security and high on reward, you may be faced with the problem of fluctuating income. In terms of tax dollars, a person with a steady income will pay less tax than a person with a highly erratic flow of income.

You, on the other hand, could never settle into a steady job. You like to play piano with a small jazz group; in fact, last year you actually had your own combo. As is normal in the entertainment business, you have gone through a number of "ups" and "downs."

Now, compare the taxes that each of you paid over the same period of time. With \$30,000 total income, your brother paid only \$3,900 against your bill of \$7,000. If you view this situation as inequitable then you may find comfort in the fact that many share your view. However, if you are

faceted with erratic income then the more immediate problem is what to do.

If this year is not particularly good but you have high hopes for the future, then you might try to put off some of your deductible expenses until after the end of the year. It pays to have the most deductible expenses in high income years, since they serve to reduce your taxable income.

In reviewing your expenses, you should remember that you are permitted to claim a standard deduction of 10 per cent of your adjusted gross income, but this deduction may not be more than \$1,000 (\$500 for a married taxpayer filing a separate return). When your deductible expenses are less than 10 per cent of your adjusted gross income you will certainly take advantage of the standard deduction. When they are more, you will probably itemize your deductions to reap the larger tax savings.

Here is something you might try. Say that your adjusted gross income for the year is expected to be about \$8,000. This means that you would be allowed a standard deduction of \$800. In November, you make a little review of the deductible expenses you have paid during the year for medical care, contributions, and so on, and you find that you have paid out \$400. You expect to have some more medical and dental expenses before the year is out. You also want to give something to your church, but all-told your expenses are not likely to go over the \$800 you are allowed to deduct anyway.

The best thing you can do is defer these additional deductible items until January of the following year. In other words, if you can't exceed the standard deduction you are allowed then try to keep your deductible expenses to a minimum. By deferring some expenses you may be able to build up a sizeable deduction in the following year.

To look even further ahead, say that you pay some of your 1960 expenses in 1961. Toward the end of 1961, you might be able to pay some of the expenses you would normally have paid in 1962. The net effect is that you are taking many of your deductible expenses for a three-year period and squeezing them into the middle year. Instead of taking the standard deduction for each of three years, you take the standard deduction for the first and third year and something more than the standard deduction for the second year. Result: a tax saving.

If the tax tactics described here bother you, it may be because you are not used to the idea that tax considerations can dominate some of your personal affairs. Many people conduct their personal and business affairs in the manner that suits them, giving little consideration to their tax liability until it comes time to pay. You have a responsibility to pay a fair share of the costs of government, but you are cheating yourself if you approach the payment of a large chunk of your income in a lackadaisical manner.

Cheating the government constitutes a fraud, and is punishable by fine or imprisonment. Tax planning, to avoid overpaying your income tax is a laudable undertaking that reduces the amount you pay to a fair share.

If you are concerned enough to devote more time and considera-

tion to your tax liability, remember one important thing. This country's system of taxation is based on the acceptance by each citizen of his responsibility for assessing his own tax liability. The federal income tax law is written in such a way as to spread the financial needs of the country among its people as fairly as possible.

If you read the instruction book-

let you receive free from the Internal Revenue Service, you can probably complete your own tax return without any need of outside assistance. However, if you have any questions that are not clearly answered by the instructions, then call or visit your local Internal Revenue Service office. You will find that they are only too willing to give all the help you will need.

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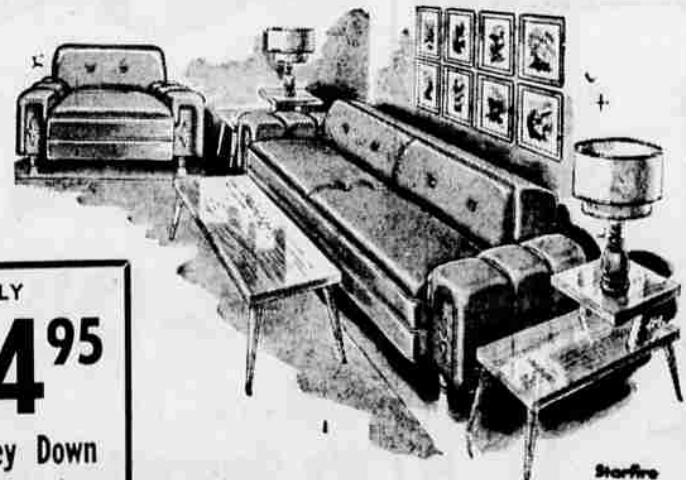
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
