Titan Mentor Predicts AFL To Go Okay

NEW YORK (AP) — Although the American Football League hasn't played its first game Steve Sebo feels it's bound to be an artistic and probably a financial success.

Sebo was fired as Penn coach last fall after winning the Ivy League title and promptly signed as general manager of the New York Titans in the new league.

"People want more football on club's headquarters," Sebo said today at the club's headquarters. "Those turn-out crowds and the National League attendance increasing every year prove it."

"The 12 National League clubs can only play six games on a Sunday and our eight clubs will add four more."

Steve is just as optimistic about the quality of the football the new clubs will play.

"We haven't announced the names of the pros we've signed, but we have some pretty good ones," he said.

How long will it take before the AFL attains equality with the NFL on the playing field?

"It's a lot closer than a good many people think because of the players' great desire," Sebo replied. "The boys want to play football and the ones who made reputations in college usually think they're pretty good. They'll be out there trying awfully hard to prove it."

Burns Fighters Score Well On Chilquin Amateur Card

CHILQUIN (Special) — A contingent of boxers from Burns invaded Chilquin Saturday and captured wins in nine of the 14 bouts featured on the big amateur fight card. The smoker was presented by the Chilquin Boys Club under the direction of Chief of Police Lou Jones and officer Ken Schoonover who train the Chilquin fighters.

In addition to the Chilquin and Burns' lads appearing on the card were boys from Lakeview and Kingsley Air Force Base.

Although there were four technical kayoes registered during the evening, only one, a match between Kingsley's Lynn Cole and Burns' Everett Capps ended in a knockout. Capps, 128, put Cole, 126, away in the first round of the bout.

In the opener Fred Norris, Klamath Agency, TKO'd Butch Wampler, Chilquin, in the 49-pound class. Dave Graves, a 91-pounder

earned the first Burns' victory with a decision over Chilquin's Lynn Anderson. Ray DeBortoli, 82, Chilquin, decisioned Burns' Tom Grlms, 85, in the second contest. Rod Dickerson, Burns, 83, won a decision over Bob Pohl, Chilquin, in the third match.

Dan Kirk, Burns, 101, decisioned Rick Starkey, Chilquin; Darrell Williams, 90, Burns, TKO'd Emory Bettles, Chilquin; Dan Lakey, 122, Lakeview, won on a technical from Chilquin's Carl Wright; and Keith Capps, 128, Burns, TKO'd Pat Barnes, Chilquin.

Dan Kender, 152, won the next decision for Burns, stopping Gil Andrews, Chilquin, but Ralph Wright, Chilquin, came back with a decision over Denny Terzyck, 122, Lakeview.

Pilots Subdue MSC, 71-69 In Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — The University of Portland survived a 25-point scoring spurge by Montana State College's great Larry Chanay and eked out a 71-69 basketball victory here Thursday night.

Portland's 69 sophomore center, Bill Garner, came within one point of Chanay's total and Jim Altenhofen, 6-7 captain, contributed 19 points before leaving the game nine minutes before the end.

With Altenhofen's departure the Bobcats began their big bid. They almost caught up, cutting Portland's margin to 69-67 with less than two minutes to play.

But then Chanay drew two quick fouls, committing his fifth with 1 1/2 minutes left. Still the Montanans battled and cut the margin to 70-69. Then the pilots took the ball and kept it until their Roland Carpenter sank a free throw for the final margin.

The taller home team had a 55-44 advantage in rebounds although the Bobcats hit 25 of 63 field goal attempts for 40 per cent to Portland's 29 of 75 for 39 per cent.

Portland was ahead, 42-36, at the intermission and built the advantage to 10 points, a lead the pilots maintained through most of the half until Altenhofen left.

Chanay got 16 of his points in the first half. Carpenter took over the defensive assignment on him after the intermission and limited him to two baskets on a dozen attempts.

The result left each team with an 8-6 season record. Montana State will meet Saturday University at Seattle Saturday night. The pilots will be idle until next Thursday when they are host to Creighton.

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By ED LUBANSKI The only other bowler on the tournament circuit besides myself who uses a two-finger ball is the famous Ed Kowal.

Ed is a hold-over from another era when most bowling balls had only two holes.

I started bowling as a youngster in 1942 with a two-finger ball, switched to the conventional three-finger because everyone else used it, but went back to the type I began with. I've stuck with it and been lucky enough to win some big tournaments.

The two-finger grip allows me to control the ball better. I not only can get my middle finger out of the ball easier, but only have to worry about one finger when "lifting," or putting side spin on the ball.

I get a more accurate "feel" of the ball as I release it. Most bowlers must make certain that their index and middle fingers come out of the ball at the same time with the exact amount of upward pull on the ball.

Using only two fingers in the ball prevents me from exercising my natural inclination of trying to roll the ball too hard.

Although I suggest some bowlers give the two-finger model a try, I'd say don't use it unless your fingers are constructed somewhat along the lines of mine—short and very thick.

A long, bony finger won't properly support the weight of a two-hole bowling ball.

Golden Boy Loses Match, May Retire

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Art Aragon, the "Golden Boy" of California boxing, went out Thursday night like the champion he never became.

Aragon, a boxer for half his 32 years, said he would quit if he lost this one to Alvaro Gutierrez, a tough Mexican. He lost.

Art was bloody, busted and beaten when Referee Tommy Hart stopped it in the ninth round. But if his competence was gone, his courage persisted. He was ready to go on.

Aragon, talkative and provocative, usually gets a lot of abuse from the fight crowd. This time, many of the 8,100 at a standing ovation, some of them shouting as though carried away by the final act of a tragic opera.

In his dressing room, Art didn't say that he will retire.

"I want to think about it a couple of days," he said.

Aragon presented flashbacks of his former self early in the fight, even though he was knocked down for a three-count in the first round. He had a good second round and got in some nice shots in the third, although fewer than Gutierrez.

Then, in the fourth, Aragon scored with sharp combinations and gave the Mexican the wobbles.

But he was weary after the fourth. He accumulated punishment almost constantly from then until Referee Hart stepped in. Then Aragon walked wrecked but erect to his corner.

Gene Littler, Knight Lead

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Gene Littler and Dick Knight, leading the storm-lashed Bing Crosby Golf Tournament field by three strokes after the first round, braved Pebble Beach's exposed sea cliffs today.

The steady San Diegans shot brilliant 67s over the forested Monterey Peninsula Country Club course Thursday, enjoying considerably more protection from the blustery winds and driving rain than players venturing out on the Pebble Beach and Cypress Point layouts.
