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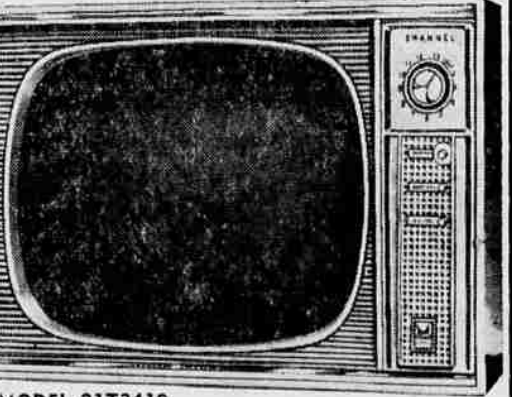
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Slay Trial Has More Drama Than Flock Of Mysteries

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — It's no wonder that a flock of Hollywood names have been dropping in to watch the Finch murder trial. It has more drama than a month of Perry Masons.

The protagonists are well cast. There is the smooth, urbane Dr. R. Bernard Finch, listening intently to the testimony and breaking into a toothpaste - ad smile when a witness utters some unconscious humor. During the recesses, he talks to newsmen with the geniality of a physician answering questions about flu symptoms.

Sharing the defendants' table is Carole Tregoff, young, buxom, red-haired. The state has portrayed her as the doctor's mistress and co-conspirator in the death of his wife.

The legal battery is imposing. Defending Carole are Rexford Eagan, with the look and pugnacity of a pro football tackle, and young Donald R. Bringbold, with whom she often confers. Dr. Finch receives the counsel of Grant Cooper, equally urbane and ingratiating.

The state's case is being presented with vigor by Dep. Dist. Attys. Frank N. Whichello and Clifford Crail, both bald and distinguished, both bristling with outrage for the acts they claim the loving pair committed. Crail is especially ready to snap back at the defense attorneys, accusing them of trying to scare the state's witnesses. Not the least impressive of the

courtroom cast is Superior Judge Walter R. Evans. A big man, especially imposing as he strides to the bench in his black robe, he reminds one of Sen. Estes Kefauver. He has the height and long face of the senator and the same calm, deliberate manner of speaking, though without the bacolic overtones.

No one is fooled by his gentle approach, however, his stern look quickly indicates he is a no-nonsense kind of judge, and he can deliver decisions with whiplash style.

One of those attending every day is Cornwell Jackson, part owner of the Perry Mason TV show.

His wife, Gail Patrick, who produces the show, also appears frequently.

"I came down here once and

got hooked," Jackson explained. "It's like reading a murder mystery; you've got to keep going to discover how it turns out."
