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DAC Outlines Year's Program

It was decided at the December luncheon to contribute toward the National Headquarters building fund. This will assist the young society to buy or build its own home in Washington, D.C. Eva Burkhalter is chairman of this special committee.

On September 17, Constitution Day, the Oregon State Society, Daughters of American Colonists, dedicated an historical marker on Sauvie Island in the Columbia River, where Captain Nathaniel Wyeth established Fort William in 1834. State regent, Mrs. John Y. Richardson, presided at the

dedication ceremonies, assisted by Mrs. Owen R. Rhoads, state first vice regent and state markers chairman. It is the obligation of all Oregon members to contribute to this Centennial effort of the society. Eva Burkhalter hopes these two undertakings will be completed on or before the January 30 meeting.

On the local level, members are delving into all available histories, genealogy books, legal records, family Bibles and manuscripts, to complete the history of their Colonial ancestors by the April meeting. Mrs. Charles K. Wells is chairman of this research for the Klamath chapter.

It is gratifying to know that in the two years since the organization was begun, a purchase of a genealogical library of nine line-age volumes has been made. Two more are available and it is hoped to acquire them soon. These are

published by the National Society and are available for the searchers.

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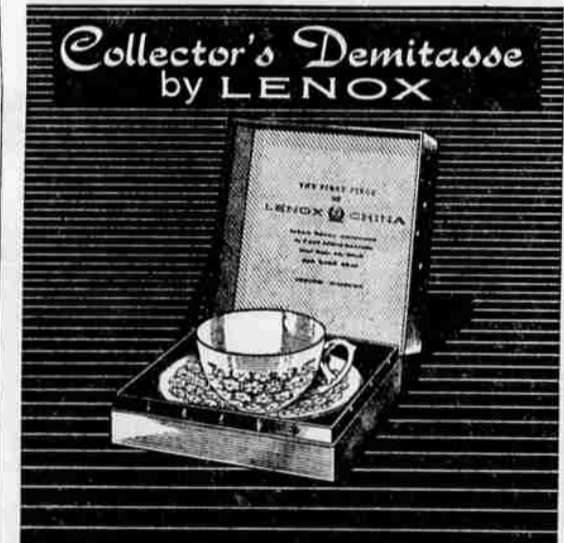
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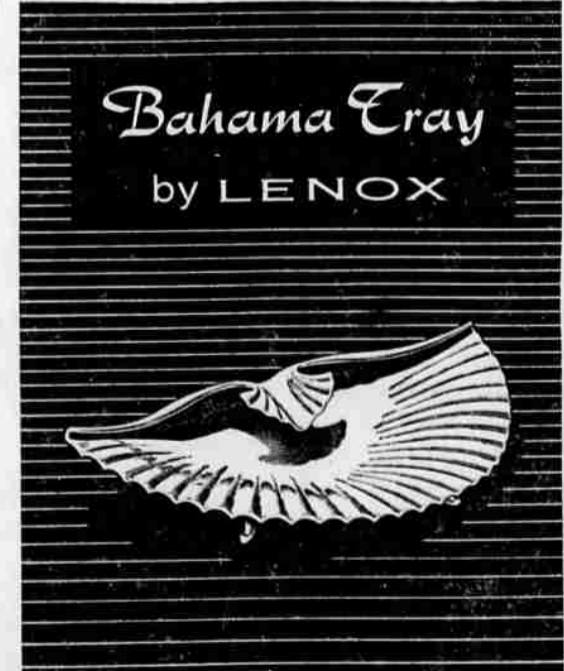
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
