

Owls, Plywooders Split

Second Half Surge Not Enough For OTI

A second half point spurge that died too soon wasn't enough to offset the coldest first half in the history of the Oregon Tech Owls and they lost the second game of a weekend doubleheader to the Redding U.S. Plywood cagers, 66-54, here Saturday night.

Friday night the Owls won the opening match between the two clubs with an awe-inspiring performance that netted them an 83-69 victory. Neither game has a bearing on the Owls' standing in Oregon Collegiate Conference play.

In addition to the Saturday loss the Owls had another shadow cast across their path when big Paul Layher, the Tech squad's only counter-irritant for Mike Preaseau and Doug McClary, the Plywooders ace rebounders, limped off the court late in the game with a sprained ankle. It was not learned whether he would be able to perform when the Owls host Southern Oregon College here Tuesday night.

The Owls were red hot from the foul line in the Saturday test

but the Plywooders matched them there and then demonstrated the value of controlling the backboards plus hitting from the field at a better than .400 clip.

The Techmen, who were led in the score column by little Leon Wilson with 15 points, collected on 12 of 14 tries from the foul line but couldn't do better than a .241 from the field. In the first half they scored only five two-pointers off 36 tries. In the second stanza things picked up a bit as they connected on 16 of 51 tries.

U.S. Ply's Ken Carter, a former Stanford Ace, was the big gun for the night with 11 from almost any spot on the floor plus 4-5 from the foul line for a total of 26 points. Wilson, with 5 field goals and 5-6 at the foul line, was next.

The next busiest man in the house was playing-manager Doug McClary, a former Washington star, who potted 16 points and pulled in 16 rebounds. His teammate, USP's Mike Preaseau, hit 13 points and collected 9 rebounds.

Layher's five rebounds were the best mark for the Techsters. Saturday the Plywood five romped off to an easy ten points in the opening four minutes of the game while holding the Owls scoreless. Things did not get better fast. Coach Wally Palmberg traded units with 13 minutes left in the half when the score was 14-3. In the closing two minutes of the period Wilson sparked a small surge to bring the count to 26-15 at the gun. By halftime USP's Carter had collected 14 points, all from the field.

In the second stanza the action quickened but McClary and Preaseau combined to match the Owls point for point. With 10 minutes left in the ball game the score stood 48-36 and at this point the U.S. Ply squad showed signs of tiring and the Owls closed to 50-40.

A determined OTI press boosted the Owls to the short end of 55-50 count with 4:30 left but this was as close as they could get. With 1:48 left they were up to 57-52 but a rash of fouls and some loose defense let the Plywooders get away.

Layher with 10 points was the number two Owl producer and Dennis McKee and Jack Horton were next with six points each.

JOHN DAY (Special) — The Grant Union High School basketball team continued its unbeaten Greater Oregon Conference record, adding wins number five and six at the expense of the Lakeview Honkers here Friday and Saturday.

The Prospectors stopped the Honkers 73-67 Friday night then pasted them 84-55 Saturday.

The big point-producer for the two day stand was Grants' Tom Wilson who collected 29 Friday and added 23 more in the second game. Teammate Mike Sanders contributed 19 in the first game and 15 in the second for second place honors.

Jerry Parkinson was high for the Honkers with 21 Friday and 6 Saturday, while Jerry Sawyer totaled 20, Frank Engenhoff hit for 19, and Doug Maxwell collected 23, all over the two games.

Friday night the quarter counts read 21-19, and 37-34, both for Lakeview. The third ended in a 52-52 deadlock which the Prospectors broke loose in the final minutes of the game.

Saturday night the Honkers were on the short ends of 16-15, 39-21, and 54-38 counts.

The defeats leave the Lakeview five with a 1-5 record for league play.

No New Boss, No Decisions, No End In Sight For NFL

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — There was no new commissioner, no decision on expansion and no end in sight Saturday to the marathon National Football League meeting.

The only hope for a sudden break in the stalemate over a commissioner appeared a compromise in which a veteran club owner or official would handle the job for one year. Philadelphia's Joe Donoghue and Detroit's Edwin Anderson were mentioned as possibilities.

Another alternative discussed was adjournment for a cooling off period of a month or so.

Apparently San Francisco, Los Angeles, Detroit, Cleveland, Chicago Cardinals, Green Bay, Detroit and New York will not desert their No. 1 candidate, Marshall Leahy of San Francisco. Philadelphia, Washington, Pittsburgh and Baltimore are just as determined that Leahy won't get the job and

carry the league office home to San Francisco with him.

The minority doesn't insist on any one candidate.

George Halas, Chicago Bears' owner, has passed on all 14 ballots in order not to offend either side and thereby lose votes for expansion. Halas wants to admit Minneapolis-St. Paul and Dallas in 1960 and perhaps St. Louis and Miami, Fla., the following year.

Saturday the owners approved suggestions that a team waiving a player with a no-cut contract permit the claiming team to give him a two-week tryout before taking over the contract, and any player waived out of the league could be reclaimed by the waiving club after a four week lapse.

Defeated were efforts to change the date of the annual player draft meeting now held either the last week of November or first week of December.

The owners expect to meet Sunday and possibly Monday, depending on progress.

UW Huskies Erratic, Indians Win 54-42

SEATTLE (AP) — The Stanford Indians handed Washington its seventh straight Big Five loss Saturday night 54-42 as the Huskies' second two-point of the half, on a one-handed push shot from the left corner.

Stanford, in the meantime, had moved ahead, first by nine points, at 43-34, and then 47-37 as the Indians continually broke up Washington plays and kept the Huskies from getting any set shots.

The Indians hit on 33 per cent of their shots from the field. The Huskies made only 23 per cent of their field goal attempts, far below their average.

Bill Hanson, who topped Husky scorers with 12 points, set out most of the second half after he had picked up four fouls. He eventually fouled out with about three minutes to go.

High for the Indians was Johnny Arritola, who got 15 points for the Californians.

Big Ten Eyes New Bowl Pact

CHICAGO (AP) — The Big Ten will study an invitation to resume Rose Bowl football competition in a special meeting Sunday.

Conference athletic directors and faculty representatives will weigh a letter from Tom Hamilton, executive director of the newly-formed Athletic Assn. of Western Universities, to sign another long term bowl contract.

A 14-year Rose Bowl series between the Big Ten and the defunct Pacific Coast Conference ended with last New Year's Pasadena classic in which Washington trounced Wisconsin 44-3.

Last spring, the Big Ten split 5-5 in a vote to resume bowl competition, a deadlock which killed possible renewal of a contract. However, by the same divided vote, the conference failed to expunge from its code a clause which would permit a conference school to play in the Rose Bowl on an individual basis.

Pelicans Set All-Time Mark; Defeat Central Point 97-61

The Pelicans soared to a new altitude record Saturday night at Pelican Court.

Firing at more than a three-points-a-minute clip, the KUHS cagers smothered the invading "Crater" Comets of Central Point under a barrage of baskets while setting a new scoring record for Pelican scorebooks 97 to 61.

A game that opened in tepid fashion with Crater taking the early lead at 9 to 5, ended in a torrid shooting exhibition that surpassed any pace the Pelicans have set this season.

Dean Dunson and Paul Bishop

alternated quarters in pushing the Pels to their new scoring mark.

Dunson took game scoring honors with 27 points while Bishop was only a step behind with 24. After spotting Central Point a 9 to 5 lead, Klamath rallied to surge in front 14 to 13 on a Bishop bucket, only to have Loyal Higinbotham tie it up again with a charity toss.

That was the dividing point, though, as the Pels poured in five straight points to grab a 19 to 14 lead and move away to a lead they never gave up.

An effective fast break by the

Pelicans broke the game wide open midway in the second quarter. Bob Lewis and Dunson each added another two-point to fatten the spread to 14 points. That was the edge for coach Dean White's charges at half-time, 42 to 28.

A hot - shooting third frame pushed the game out of sight and triggered the scoring spurge that lifted the whitebirds to a new record for any KU basketball team. Fred Biehn who had been held scoreless in the first half, pumped in 15 points in the second, winding up with the third scoring effort of the game.

Lewis also hit in double figures for the Pels with five field goals for 10 points.

Dave Sharp and Higinbotham split game honors for the invaders with 14 points each, while Chuck Turner added 13.

The victory gave Klamath a 10 and 2 record for the season, and made their fourth conference victory against two Medford defeats.

Previous high scoring record for any Pelican team was also made against a Crater High five. Coach Don Mezale's Pelicans trampled Crater 85 to 59 in the 1957-58 season.

White used his entire 13 man squad in the victorious effort with all but one breaking into the scoring column.

Crater coach Lloyd Hoffman used 9 men.
