The unbeaten Klamath Union Pelican wrestlers added victories number four and five to their 1960 season this weekend, disposing of a formidable Grants Pass Cavemen squad 22-19 on the Grants Pass mats Friday, and then returning home to manhandle the Ashland Grizzlies 51-3 Saturday afternoon in Pelican Court.

Following the varsity and Jay-vee encounters Saturday the KU freshmen took over and dealt McLoughlin Junior High of Medford a 43-3 thumping.

In the KF-GP tussle the Pelicans won six matches and drew one while the Cavemen garnered wins in five and drew in the one. The Cavers are considered to be one of the toughest squads among Oregon state prep matmen.

Pelican Dan Ross collected the only pin win of the evening in Grants Pass, disposing of Darrell Bennett in the 135-pound class in 1:50.

A dark spot loomed on the KU horizon in Grants Pass Friday when heavyweight prep champ John Hancock lost a 2-1 decision to Caver Bill Cole. Hancock, who has been ailing the past week, came back however Saturday afternoon to erase the blemish on his nearly spotless record with a minute and 10 second pin of Ashland's Fred Neuman.

Saturday afternoon the KU Jay-vees had a comparably easy time as they walked over the Ashland Juniors, 32-3. Sherd Duncan, Ron Simpson, Ron Reinmiller and Gene Webb all pinned their foes while winning decisions were Jim Long, Ken Mitchell, Erik Peterson, Ible Krummich and Lynn McKune.

Exactly Double LA Dodger Front Office Boosts Larry Sherry's Weekly Check

A ball player's dream of having his salary doubled came true Saturday for World Series hero Larry Sherry.

The 24-year-old Los Angeles Dodger's relief ace ended the 1959 season earning \$7,000 and will start the 1960 campaign with a contract calling for an estimated \$14,000.

Sherry earned the 100 per cent increase in spades. Called up from the minors in July, he proceeded to post a 7-2 record for the Dodgers along with a 2.20 earned run average. He went on to gain credit for two World Series victories against the White Sox and save two other Dodger triumphs.

The Pittsburgh Pirates also corralled one of their pitching aces by signing Bob Friend, The 29-year-old right-hander accepted a cut on the basis of his 8-19 record last season which followed a 22-14 mark for the 1958 campaign.

Outfielder Al Smith was given a slight boost by the White Sox even though he batted only .237.

Smith came through with several clutch hits, however, driving in the winning run in five of the club's extra-inning victories. He batted in a total of 55 runs and hit 17 homers.

General Manager Bing Devine reported that 21 members of the Cardinals are now under contract with the acceptance of terms by four pitchers. The four were hold-over Ernie Broglio, who had a 7-12 record last season, and rookies Jeff Long, Mel Nelson and George Stetter.

Pitchers Al Worthington and Joe Shipley agreed to terms with the San Francisco Giants, and the Kansas City Athletics signed

rookie hurlers Marty Kutyna and John O'Donoghue.

The White Sox signed 33-year-old Billy Pierce, the oldest member in point of service with the club.

Ted Williams visited Boston and is scheduled to sit down and talk terms today with General Manager Bucky Harris.

The 41-year-old Red Sox outfielder said his ailing neck still bothered him and added, "If it doesn't get any better, I won't play this season."

Here and there along the baseball front there were requests for more money.

Outfielder Jackie Brandt, traded by the Giants to the Orioles last month, has been offered a raise but he wants more. Catcher Gus Triandos and veteran outfielder Gene Woodling also have returned unsigned contracts.

Roger Maris, the Yankees' new outfielder, has sent his first contract back without signing it, and in Maracaibo, Venezuela, shortstop Luis Aparicio denied reports he had signed with the White Sox.

State Game Commission Posts 1960 General Fish Regulations

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Game Commission Saturday announced that the 1960 general angling season will open April 23 and close Oct. 31.

In the Coastal, Rogue and Umpqua watersheds, the opening will be delayed until May 28.

The regulations were announced Saturday after a second public hearing Friday.

The regulations call for a May 21 to Oct. 9 season for High Cascade Lakes. Exceptions, where the opening date will be April 23, include Suttle, Blue, Odell, Crescent, Fish (Linn County), Fish (Jackson County) and Big Cuts lakes and Wickiup Reservoir.

Copies of the rules will be printed soon and will be distributed through sporting goods stores about the end of February.

The final regulations contained

only five changes from the tentative regulations announced Jan. 9, and allow Snake River anglers to take trout through the winter months below the deadline at Pine Creek.

Here are some of the highlights of the new regulations:

It will be legal for the first time this year to fish for warm water game fish at night, including bass, yellow perch and crappie.

Shad limit is 10 per day and 20 in possession. Bass limit is 12 per day and 24 in possession.

The minimum length limit for striped bass is 16 inches.

Special jack salmon bag limits on the coast and in the Columbia River were eliminated.

Pamela Lake off the Santiam Highway in the Willamette National Forest will have a special 30-fish per day bag limit and 60 in possession.
