Area C Of C Asks Council For Ad Fund

DUNSMUIR—Dunsmuir Chamber of Commerce will ask the Dunsmuir City Council for a specified advertising fund to be spent by the chamber for civic promotion.

The chamber passed a motion authorizing Ted Fay, chamber president, to request the city to earmark 50 per cent of the city's parks, music and advertising fund for chamber use to publicize the city and attract more visitors and residents. The chamber met for breakfast Wednesday morning at the Travelers Hotel.

A 1/2 per cent of the city clerk's office finds this fund amounts to \$2.10 (in special levy of five cents per \$100 assessed valuation) and approximately 50 per cent of it has been spent in the first six months of the fiscal year. A sum of \$854.51 has been spent for labor, insurance and supplies for park projects and \$457.39 for special police, labor and other Railroad Days expenses.

Chamber members expressed opinions that too little of this fund goes into civic advertising and that specific budgeting would eliminate the annual plea for financial aid to the city by the chamber of commerce.

Fay, conducting his first meeting since taking office named James Lambert, chairman of the membership committee, with Don Sirlanni, Vic Petrovic, Lee Huddell, Cliff Hurd and Bill Febrero to assist him.

A motion was passed to put membership fees on a fiscal basis making \$12.50 dues payable now and the \$25 annual membership dues payable hereafter in July. Dinner meetings on a quarterly basis were also approved with board meetings to be held monthly and to be open to the general membership.

Removal Slated On Equipment

MOUNT SHASTA—The Mount Shasta Recreation District has been supplying some playground equipment for youngsters near the Boy Scout cabin on Washington Drive. This will be removed to the city park after being reconditioned.

It was feared traffic at the old site would endanger youngsters. Also, there was lack of supervision for activities there. Injuries were more likely to be sustained at the old playground than if all came to the park for a better playground program.

Building Permits

LAKEVIEW—A total of 60 building permits were issued in Lakeview during 1959, according to figures compiled by Town Recorder E. J. Calderwood. Valuation figure was estimated at \$613,175. These records included 19 new homes with a value of \$236,200; a school addition at \$46,000; seven new commercial buildings at \$244,000; and 33 remodeling jobs with a value of \$86,975.

The total estimate for the previous year was \$645,946, the majority being for new homes.

New Chairman Named By RC

Appointment of Mrs. Winston D. Purvine as blood program chairman for the local chapter was approved when members of the Red Cross board of directors met January 18. The resignation of Mrs. Hugh M. Swaney was accepted with regret.

During the eight years Mrs. Swaney has headed the blood donor program for the Red Cross locally, nearly 13,000 pints of blood have been collected in Klamath County. Twice the local chapter has been selected as winner of the regional award as "Best Chapter in the Blood Program" in Oregon and southern Washington. Bloodmobile operations have been held in every community within the chapter's jurisdiction.

In recognition of the outstanding success of the program in this area, Mrs. Swaney has served on the Regional Board of Directors and has been vice-chairman of the group which acts as an advisory board to the local program.

In appointing Mrs. Purvine to the chairmanship locally, John Zumwalt, chapter chairman, pointed out that Mrs. Purvine has served for eight years as a blood program volunteer, has been a member of the board of directors for three years, given two years service as a member of the chapter's social welfare aide corps, and for the past two years has been chairman of the staff aide corps. During the time she has headed the staff aide service, the program has expanded to include donor recruitment and assistance at chapter headquarters as volunteer office workers.

In accepting the appointment, Mrs. Purvine asked for the cooperation of all community groups in order to continue Klamath County's record as a leader in the Northwest blood program.

Other business at the meeting included reports from Mrs. E. A. Geary, Al Nyback, Mrs. Purvine, William Ganong Jr., and John Zumwalt, chapter chairman, of proceedings at the Bi-State Conference held in Portland January 15 and 16. Mrs. Virginia Dixon, executive director of the local chapter, served on a public relations council at a training session. Over 400 Oregon and Washington residents attended the two-day meeting to hear of immediate past accomplishments, present developments, and future plans for the Red Cross organization. Zumwalt appointed board members to committees to study the conference reports and assist service chairman of the local chapter in future development of community services.

NAACP Aide Attends Meet

Mrs. William Barnett, president of the Klamath Falls Chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, was in Vancouver, Washington, January 16 and 17, where she attended a Northwest Area Board meeting of the NAACP.

The failure of federal court action at Biloxi, Mississippi, in the Mack Parker case, caused the board to stress the need for congressional action on the federal civil rights bill now bottled up in committee.

Mrs. Tarea Pittman, acting regional director, for the West Coast NAACP, was the main speaker at the board meeting, and Miss Betty Lou Burleigh, a member of the National NAACP Board, was in attendance.

Mrs. Barnett stopped off in Portland on her return from Vancouver to observe the installation of officers for the Portland Branch of the NAACP.
