rain with a two-stroke edge over Gene Littler of San Diego. The test quickly turned into a wide open finale when Ken Crosby putted the third hole from five feet.

It wasn't until almost the finish that Venturi emerged victorious with a four-round score of 276—the highest since the Crosby was extended to 72 holes three years ago.

Six bogeys and just one birdie gave him a five-over-par 77 over the wind-lashed Pebble Beach layout, stretching 6,700 yards along the Monterey Bay cliffs.

But his 286 was three strokes better than the 290s with which former U.S. Open champion Julius Boros and boyish Tommy Jacobs of Arcadia, Calif., tied for second.

Portland State played a tight game of ball control. It is among the top-ranked small colleges in the nation defensively.

Eastern Oregon came to life with minutes to go Saturday and whipped Oregon College 75-66. Pasco Articola and Frank Chase led the victors with 19 each, but yielded scoring honors to Denny Spencer of the losers with 21.
