**Lyndon Seen As Rival**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) is increasingly centering his thinking on Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.) as his chief rival for the Democratic presidential nomination.

He said so publicly last week when he entered the Wisconsin primary against Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.). Humphrey scoffed politely then, saying after all it was he, not Johnson, who is running against Kennedy in Wisconsin.

But Kennedy thinks he can dispose of Humphrey's chances in the Wisconsin battle, and he has told friends he no longer believes Adlai Stevenson is likely to be drafted by the convention if there is a stalemate.

On the other hand, Kennedy is inclined to believe that Johnson, the Senate majority leader, may have more convention votes craved than he himself has at this time. But he thinks his first ballot potential is greater than the Texan's.

Kennedy's chief task is to convert his potential strength into actual convention votes. He has almost all of New England's 103 sewed up and Ohio's 64 are virtually promised to him.

**Mac Feted On Birthday**

NEW YORK (AP) — General Douglas MacArthur received several mementos of his long military service Tuesday night as gifts at a party celebrating his 80th birthday.

Leaders of the Army, Navy and Air Force presented MacArthur: "The silver command wings of 'Dusty'"; Rhodes, MacArthur's wartime pilot, from Gen. Thomas White, Air Force chief of staff.

A flag flown by the USS Nashville, MacArthur's command ship during much of the Pacific campaign, from Adm. Thomas C. Kinkaid of the Navy.

And the office chair MacArthur used as Army chief of staff from Undersecretary of the Army Maj. Gen. Hugh Milton II.

Nearly 100 old friends, including key members of his World War II staff, attended the party at the Waldorf-Astoria. They sang "Happy Birthday" as MacArthur cut a red, white and blue cake.

**Courthouse Work Started**

Workmen have begun enlarging the small third floor courtroom in the county courthouse to accommodate jury trials.

The work amounts principally to moving a partition farther back and is expected to cost from \$500 to \$600.

With the change, the courtroom would be able to accommodate juries and could be used for circuit court trials. The judge, lawyers, recorders, and public would be removed during jury deliberations, as is the practice in the district court now.

Judge David R. Vandenberg said the enlarged courtroom would enable the county to take advantage of additional judges sent here to release pressure on the county's burdensome civil docket.

"The chief justice said he would supply us with extra judges, but we have to have a place to try cases," the judge said. The change is considered expedient, not permanent.

**First Aid Class Has Openings**

The Red Cross first aid class being conducted in Room 116, KUHS by Ella Redkey is still open for enrollment.

Miss Redkey plans to take the group through 10 hours of standard first aid, 18 hours of advanced first aid, and 10 hours of instructor training. The last portion of the training is offered only once or twice a year in the community, and Red Cross personnel urge all interested persons to enroll immediately. The class meets each Thursday evening at 7:30. Text books may be purchased from the instructor at the class. There is no charge for the instruction.

**Two Girls Confined**

Judge Charles H. Foster committed one girl to Villa St. Rose home, ordered another to the county juvenile home, and made five other youths wards of the court during juvenile court hearings Tuesday.

The girls ordered to other homes were considered beyond parental control. Two other girls were released to their parents, under supervision of the welfare department.

Court hearings involved three boys. Two were brothers, 14 and 16, involved in the theft of beer from the Malin fire station early this month. Another, 16, was arrested for being drunk and disorderly.

The judge also heard the first appeal from a referee hearing, a procedure begun January 1 under a new state law. The traffic referee, Mrs. Maxine Smith, had suspended a boy's driving license for 60 days because the boy had accumulated seven points of the department's traffic point system—the last assessed because of a noisy muffler. The suspension was protested by the boy's parents, but confirmed by the judge.

**Employers Cautioned**

Employment Commissioner David H. Cameron today told Oregon employers that full payment of their 1959 state unemployment compensation tax by January 31 can reduce their federal unemployment tax by 90 per cent.

"About 17,000 Oregon employers pay a three per cent federal unemployment tax on their payrolls," explained Cameron. "These are employers who had four or more workers on their payrolls for at least 20 weeks in 1959."

"However," said Cameron, "employers who have paid their entire state unemployment tax to the State Department of Employment by January 31 may claim an offset in an amount not to exceed 90 per cent of the federal tax due. In cases where part of the state tax has been paid on time, only part of the offset can be allowed."

Cameron cautioned employers that the cost of delinquent payments is increased not only by loss of the federal deduction, but also by a provision of the Oregon law which imposes interest penalties on overdue taxes.

The federal deduction is not automatic, but must be claimed on federal form 940. Employers of four or more workers who have not received this form should request it from the nearest office of the Internal Revenue Service. Department of Employment Field auditors, who may be reached through all offices of the Oregon State Employment Service, will answer any questions employers may have about unemployment compensation taxes.

**Area Roads To Be Mulled**

The county court has an appointment with the State Highway Commission in Salem Friday to discuss two principal road matters.

One is the proposed improvement of Washburn Way. Original plans called for a four-lane overpass above Great Northern Railway tracks and a four-lane highway between Kingsley Field and South Sixth Street. No assurances have been given that federal aid will be available, however, so plans may have to be changed.

The other matter is the Sprague River Road between Chiloquin and State Route 66 below Beate. The county thinks this paved road of 34.8 miles should be included in the state system because it joins U.S. 97 on the west with Route 66 on the east, and does not fit the general pattern of county roads.

**Thief Scared By Video Show**

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — A gunman entered a delicatessen Wednesday night and announced: "I am the friendly bandit. Give me what you got."

Anthony R. Mulec, 28, part owner of the store, was handing over change from the cash drawer when suddenly, said Mulec, from his residence at the rear came a shout, "a lot of gunfire, and people hollering, and this 'friendly bandit' suddenly ran out, jingling loudly from about \$60 in silver in his pockets."

Mulec's daughter, Denise, 3, was watching a TV Western. "I guess the TV scared him," said Mulec of the holdup man.

**Ex-Engineer Asks For Job**

C. T. Darley, Klamath County surveyor and engineer from 1918 to 1929, appeared before the county court Wednesday to apply for the job of county engineer.

Darley, a spry 79, now is living in West Stayton, Marion County, but visits the county often.

He said he has been doing work in Bonanza, Langell Valley, and on several Upper Klamath Lake subdivisions. These include a 60-acre tract completed for Mickey Wampler, a 20-acre tract completed for Bob Johnson, and current work on a 40-acre tract for Bob Veatch, Darley said.

The court said it now has four applications for the engineering job, vacated formally last December 3 with the resignation of assistant county engineer Pat Rodgers. One applicant withdrew Wednesday, the same day Darley applied for the job.
