

Dayton Flyers Snap VPI's Win Streak

Looks as if the Dayton Flyers, who make the National Invitation Basketball Tournament a March habit, will be heading to New York at tournament-time again.
Coach Tom Blackburn has blended sophomores Gary Roggenbuck and Tom Hatton with holdovers Frank Case, Mike Allen and Stan Greenberg into a team that's more than making up for last season's club that blew a NIT bid by dropping five of its last six games.
When the Flyers decisively snapped ambitious Virginia Tech's eight-game winning streak 77-59 Wednesday night, they built their own win string to six and their overall record to 14-3.
The loss was only the third in 15 games for VPI, ranked 17th nationally this week after pulling in-

to a tie at 6-0 with classy West Virginia for the Southern Conference lead.
West Virginia, fourth-ranked nationally, nailed a 16-1 record by beating Pitt 76-66, Kentucky bounced back from its thumping loss to Georgia Tech by drubbing Georgia 84-60, seventh-ranked Utah (15-2) beat Loyola of Los Angeles 80-81, and eighth-ranked Villanova (13-1) rallied to beat Army 66-53 in other Wednesday features.
Dartmouth rebounded from an 11-point halftime deficit to finally turn back Boston U. 90-83 in two overtimes, Fordham ended a six-game losing streak with a 62-54 victory over LIU, and Wisconsin's string of five losses ended in a 92-80 breeze over North Dakota. South Carolina whipped Furman 91-81.

Pelicans Fear Loss Of Starting Guard

With the possible exception of one player, the Klamath Union Pelicans are all set for another series of Southern Oregon Conference basketball this weekend when they travel to Ashland Friday night then return home to host Grants Pass here Saturday. The games mark the Pels' second start against each club.
The first time around the Pels dumped the Cave-men 58-50 at Grants Pass and dealt the Ashlanders a 64-46 whipping on Pelican Court.
During practices this week, which have been short and to the point, the KU quint has sped

through rapid scrimmages and fundamental shooting drills.
The only dark spot during the week has concerned senior guard Dean Dunson, who has been suffering extensively from a severe head cold that has hampered him during the drills. Dunson, a starter for the Pels, scored 27 points in the recent conquest of the Central Point Crater Comets.
Dunson's condition has prevented him from acquiring the "flu" shots that have been deemed necessary for the entire balance of the squad.
Said coach Dean White, "Dean's condition is causing a great bit of concern to the whole team and me. He is approaching a rundown condition since, in addition to the cold, he has been working extra hard in bringing up his grades. Al (Keck, assistant coach) and I feel hesitant in taking a chance with his health this weekend. We could hurt him for future games."
Aside from Dunson the remainder of the team seems in excellent health and ready for a top effort this weekend.
In spite of the previous wins over the weekend foe, there is no tendency to take either Ashland or the Cave-men for granted.
"On their own home floor and with their ball control tactics, Ashland can always be tough, for anyone. And Grants Pass, with Rex Benner scoring as he has been (the GP sharpshooter counted 23 last time the clubs met), is always upset-minded. We can't afford to take either team lightly," observed White.
The starters for Saturday night will be picked from Bob Lewis, Bruce Brickner, Gary Patzke, Paul Bishop, Fred Biehn, Steve Binney, Don Eastman, Wayne Dennis, Wally Palmberg and Bob Lapsley.

"Gene Fullmer is stronger. I would nail him in the sixth. As for Spider Webb—he would be the easiest of all—he's made for me and it would take only three rounds."

Ducks, OSC Head South

Oregon and Oregon State leave by plane today for San Francisco and weekend basketball games with the same opponents.
Oregon State will play Stanford Friday night at Palo Alto and then move on to Berkeley for a Saturday game with California's defending national champions.
Oregon plays the same two teams—California Friday and Stanford Saturday.
It will be the first time this season that either Oregon or OSC has met California, loser of only one of 15 games this season and third-ranked nationally in the Associated Press Poll.
Oregon Coach Steve Beiko said his squad appeared to be in its best shape in weeks—with Glenn Moore recovered from an ankle injury and Charlie Warren over a bout with the flu.
Oregon has a 13-4 record for the season. At its earlier meeting with Stanford, the Ducks got a one-point overtime victory.
Oregon State is 10-3 for the season, and has been beaten in four of its last five outings. Coach Paul Valenti said the Beavers were determined to win this weekend.

NFL Expansion Nears Voting Stage Today

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Expansion could come to the National Football League today if: 1. Agreement can be reached on how many teams to admit. 2. A decision can be reached on when to admit the new franchises—1960 or 1961, or even later. 3. A plan acceptable to at least 40 owners can be worked out on alignment of conferences, schedules, and player allotment.
Wednesday, the owners meeting on the eighth day of their annual winter meeting simplified expansion if that is their pleasure. An amendment to the constitution was passed reducing from a unanimous vote to 10-12ths the number necessary to take on new teams.
George Halas of the Chicago Bears, chairman of the league's expansion committee, hailed the amendment as the most important change in the NFL in 25 years.
George Marshall, owner of the Washington Redskins, and Walter Wolfner of the Chicago Cardinals were the only negative votes on the amendment proposed by Edwin Anderson, president of the Detroit Lions.
The new commissioner, Pete Rozelle, who took over the chair at the meeting Wednesday, said the owners would vote on expansion either late Thursday or Friday. The decision could admit any combination of one to four teams.
Representatives of Dallas, Minneapolis-St. Paul, St. Louis and Miami, Fla., are here waiting for the league's decision. Each has applied for a franchise. The rumor is that Dallas will get in this year with the others approved for 1961 or later.
While the discussion on expansion went on here, Football League Joss Foss of the American Football League commented from Dallas that if the NFL should come into Dallas, it would "not be considered a kiss of love," indicating it might create strife between the two leagues. He said it was a poor example of harmony he sought.
Rozelle retorted: "Tell Mr. Foss that if the NFL does expand into Dallas it would hope to achieve the same harmony the NFL desires in New York, Los Angeles and perhaps San Francisco."
The AFL has teams in the NFL territories of New York and Los Angeles and is considering invading the older league's San Francisco grounds.

Gun Clubbers Vie For Cup

Members of the Klamath Gun Club will vie for a brand new trophy Sunday when the organization holds its regular weekly meet on the Wocus range.
The trophy will become the property of the shooter registering the best score in a 100-target competition, including 50 16-yard and 50 handicap targets. New shooters or those without average cards will be handicapped by one of the club directors.
Gunners from all over Klamath County participated last Sunday when the club staged a big merchandise shoot.
John Lichtenstern, club spokesman, noted that the general public is invited to be on hand either as spectators or participants in all gun club affairs.

Ore Tech Matmen Host SOC In 1st Match Of New Program

Oregon Tech wrestlers get their first taste of competition Friday afternoon when they host the Southern Oregon College Red Raiders in a match scheduled to begin at 4 o'clock in the OTI gymnasium.
The bout marks the culmination of a long grind of training and conditioning that began shortly after the close of the Owl football season when the wrestling program was reinaugurated at the Mile High school. In past years Ore Tech had competed on an intercollegiate basis with other schools both in and out of the Oregon Collegiate Conference but the sport was scratched from the OTI athletic program because of a lack of sufficient interest on the part of Owl athletes.
The sport was revived this season, under the direction of coach George Miller, also the Owl line coach, when it was learned that there were a number of athletes on campus who were decidedly interested.
Miller began working with the squad, which has numbered 20-25 men, daily, and began negotiations with neighboring schools for possible wrestling dates. Because of the late start, it has been difficult to schedule bouts since nearly all probable competitors had previously filled schedules.
Following the match with SOC Friday the Techmen are set for bouts with Humboldt State on February 5, Clark Junior College there on February 12; Portland State College there February 13; and a repeat match with Southern Oregon there February 19.
Miller intends to fill a complete conference and non-conference slate next season.

AFL To Close First Meet, No Decision

DALLAS (AP) — The American Professional Football League winds up its first annual meeting today attempting to select its eighth team but with small prospect of doing it.
President Lamar Hunt of Dallas predicted that it wouldn't be accomplished although there are four applicants. He said this would necessitate a telephone ballot requiring a week or 10 days.
Atlanta, Oakland and San Francisco already have submitted bids in person while two Miami groups have asked to be considered. One of those, headed by Bob Neal, representative of a Cleveland syndicate, will have a chance only if it fails to obtain a National Football League franchise and the AFL isn't filled by that time. The other, whose group wasn't identified by Hunt, will not be considered at all.
Hunt said a study of the stadium facilities of the applicants was the main reason for postponement of the selection.
General opinion was that Oakland had the best chance of getting the last franchise because it is backed by Barron Hilton, owner of the Los Angeles club. He wants that city in the league to furnish a natural rivalry for his team. A unanimous vote is necessary to select the eighth member.
