You will be interested in knowing that the ESQUIRE THEATRE has scheduled a most unusual event - the first motion picture presentation of the famous BOLSHOI BALLET group of Moscow.

It will be shown on our regular policy at regular prices - no advance - one day only - Wednesday, February 3, 1960. The theatre will open at 6:45 PM.

The engagement of the BOLSHOI BALLET will be the first showing of the performance of a leading Soviet artistic institution since the recent discussions began between this country and the Soviet Union aiming toward regular exchange of cultural products. And it will be the first time that Klamath Falls audiences will be offered an opportunity to witness a complete evening of ballet on film as performed by the BOLSHOI BALLET group, recognized throughout the world as a hallmark by which all other ballet groups must be judged.

THE BOLSHOI BALLET full-length film was produced in London in 1958 when the entire ballet made its first historic visit to Covent Garden in London and danced before Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Filmed by a method of multi-cameras designed to capture the full theatrical impact of a live ballet performance, it is beautiful in Eastman color.

Prima ballerina Galina Ulanova dances the classic "Giselle" in the film which also has six other ballet divertissements typical of the Russian repertory. There are excerpts from the BOLSHOI BALLET'S production of "The Fountain of Bakchisarai," "Swan Lake," "Ivan Susanin" and "Faust," as well as the divertissements "Spring Water," with music by Rachmaninoff and "The Dying Swan," created by Fokine for Anna Pavlova and performed in this film by Mme. Ulanova.

The orchestra of the Royal Opera House in London and the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Yuri Faier and G. Rozhdestvensky, are heard in the film. Photographic techniques and staging employed in this production are of interest.....enough to please everyone.
