Following the ceremony a reception was held at the Hollinbeck

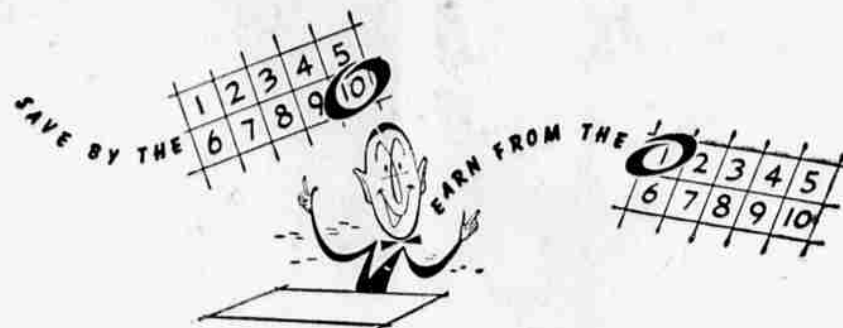
and Mrs. Albert L. Wagner and Clair Hollinbeck Sr.
