

# Pels Sweep Series, Defeat GP, Ashland

A marauding band of Cavemen almost had a menu of roast Pelican for a Saturday night banquet at Pelican Court.

However, a driving sophomore, Gary Patzke, turned in a tremendous performance to pull the Klamath Falls Pelicans out of a 57-all fourth quarter deadlock into a 78 to 69 victory over the Grants Pass Cavemen.

It was the second victory in as many nights for the Pels who dumped Ashland's Grizzlies 63 to 50 Friday night after a squeaky third quarter.

The KUHS cagers spotted Grants Pass an early 3-0 lead, then came from behind with Paul Bishop showing the way to move in front 7 to 3.

Bishop counted 11 of the Pels 20 points in the first quarter which found them holding a seven point edge.

Halftime closed with Klamath

holding a six point advantage at 40 to 34.

Coach Gordon Prehm's Cavemen switched to a press and gambling game in the third quarter to close the gap and overhaul the Pels at 51-51. Dean Dunson converted a charity toss for Klamath, but Rex Benner and Jim Purkett each added a free throw to push Grants Pass back into a 53 to 52 lead. Dunson slipped through for a two-pointer just as the quarter ended with KU in front 54 to 53.

Dunson opened the final quarter with a gift toss, but Purkett converted two on a foul to tie it up at 55-all.

Patzke dropped in a field goal for the Pels for a short-lived lead with Larry Janssen dumping in a two-pointer to deadlock it for the last time at 57-57.

At this point, the Pel fire began to find the range, and four straight field goals, one each by Patzke and Dunson and two by Bruce Brickner gave coach Dean White's charges a lead they clung to desperately in the closing moments of a sometimes hectic struggle.

Patzke moved into the starting spot when Bob Lewis turned up with a chipped ankle bone that will keep him out of action for the next two weeks.

The sophomore rose to the occasion by scoring 14 points and pulling in 24 vital rebounds. Bruce Brickner gave Klamath a second tough rebounder by clearing the boards on 19 shots.

All told, Klamath held a big edge in the rebounding department, pulling in 63 while the visitors got only 33.

The Pels dropped in 29 out of 71 shots for an excellent .408 percentage as Grants Pass shot .349 per cent, scoring 22 out of 63.

Bishop chalked up game scoring honors with 27 points, including nine of 10 gift shots, with teammate Dean Dunson potting 20 points.

Jim Purkett was top point man for the Cavemen, scoring only four field goals, but firing an amazing 13 of 14 from the free throw line. Rex Benner, high scorer of the Southern Oregon conference, netted 19 points.

The win gave Klamath a 6 and 2 record in the conference, and a 12 and 2 for the season.

Another sophomore, Kent Hunsaker, lead the Klamath Jayvees to a 66 to 46 preliminary victory over Grants Pass JV's, scoring 14 points.

Friday night at Ashland, Wally Palmberg was top point man for the KU JV's as they trampled Ashland 84 to 36.

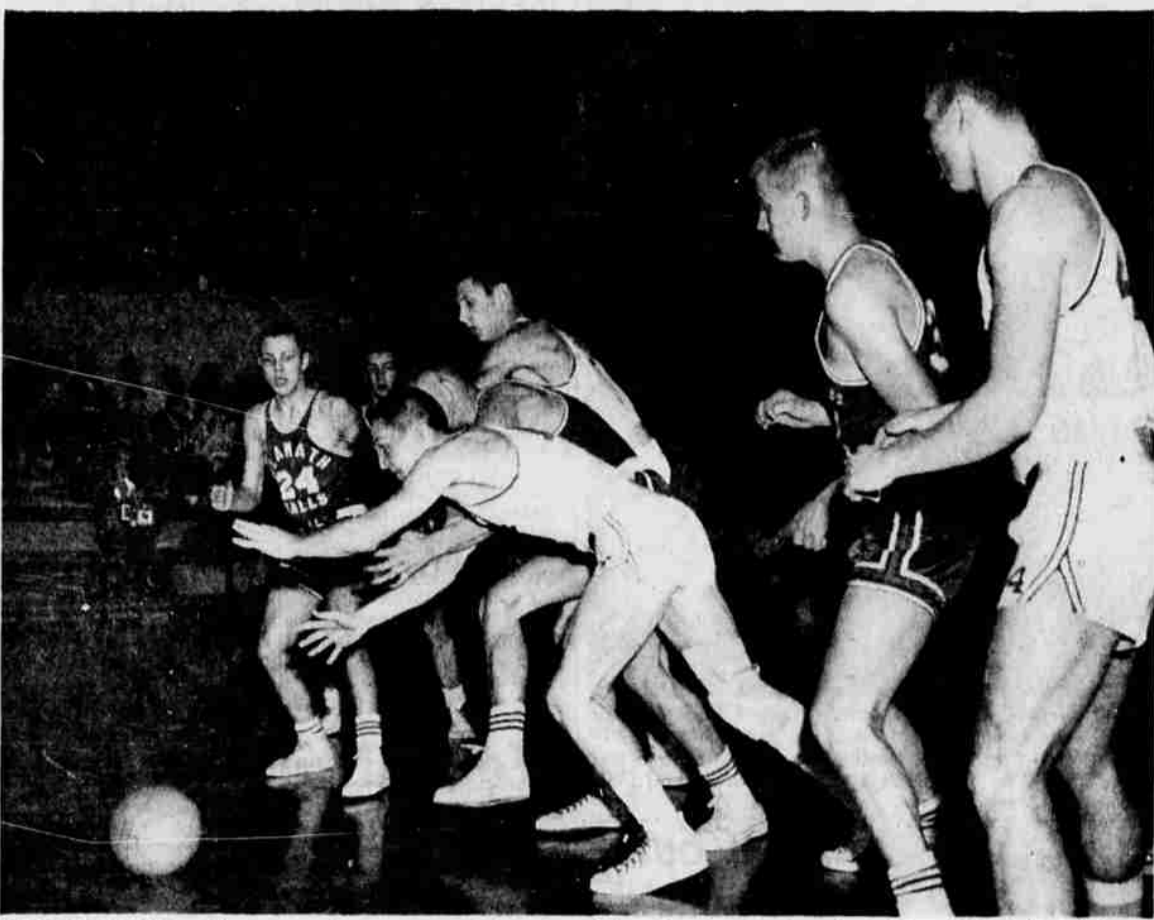

# Owls Humble OCE, Secure Second Spot

MONMOUTH (Special) — Completely unmindful of the fact they had won only five of 15 games prior to moving into Monmouth Friday the Oregon Tech Owls took a masterful command of second place in the Oregon Collegiate Conference title chase with a 79-53 victory over the Oregon College Wolves Saturday night after hauling in a 75-66 win Friday night.

The double victories leave the Owls with a 5-3 win-loss mark for OCC play, just a half game short of league leading Portland State which annexed a pair at the expense of the Eastern Oregon Mountaineers. Friday the PSC quint dumped EOC 57-40 and Saturday they won 87-38. The other OCC squad, Southern Oregon, drew a bye over the weekend.

A trio of high scoring Owls broke loose after 13:00 minutes were left in the ball game to give the Saturday winners a lead and from here on they continued to pour it on.

Paul Layher pulled in 25 rebounds for the Tech squad in addition to collecting 15 points. Layher, guard Dennis McKee, the game high-pointer with 17, and big Jack Horton, number two with 16 points, took advantage of a successful free-throw by Friday's hero Troy Koontz which brought the Owls out front 41-40 and broke up the whole affair.

The Ore Tech squad got away to a quick 8-0 lead but fell short 27-25 with 16:00 left in the first half. By halftime the Wise Birds were down 33-29. Layher really took command of the boards at this point and assisted by Horton who collected 13 markers in the second stanza, started the Owl march. Horton hit to boost the OTI five to a 40-40 tie with 14:10 left and Koontz gave them the edge, on his free toss.

Said jubilant coach Wally Palmberg after the Saturday win, "These boys aren't giving up like they once did when they get behind . . . now they battle. If they play the rest of the way like they did tonight we won't lose another league game. They all did a good job . . . Layher especially. He was great off the boards. Horton, McKee, Koontz and Wilson (Leon) all played a great ball game."

Palmberg deviated from the "platoon" system called upon in recent tests and substituted only as he saw the need.

The Tech club hit 30 of 79 shots from the field for a .379 average while the Wolves had to settle for 15 of 56 and a .268 mark. At the foul line the Owls hit 19-33 while OCE connected on 23-34.

OCE's Ron Jones was held to only 11 points while Dennis Spencer collected 16. Jones is the leading scorer in the OCC.

In the rebound department the Ore Techsters completely ignore

# UO Quintet Gets Lumps At Stanford

STANFORD, Calif. (AP) — Stanford found the offensive touch Saturday night and turned in its highest score of the season, defeating Oregon 77-61 in a non-conference game.

After hitting a seasonal low of 40 points in losing to Oregon State Friday night, the Indians rebounded with the return of their injured captain, John Arrillaga, who scored 13 points, and got a 20-point performance from sophomore John Windsor in the youngster's best varsity game.

After the score had been tied six times in a see-saw first half, Windsor went on an eight-point scoring streak just before intermission to give Stanford a 35-30 halftime lead.

Arrillaga came off the bench with a sprained ankle at the beginning of the second half and scored all his points in the final 20 minutes.

Fine outside shooting by Oregon guard Chuck Rask and the inside work of 6-7 Glenn Moore kept the score close for a while but the Ducks couldn't stop Stanford on its hottest night of the season. Moore led his team with 17 points. Windsor's 20 points was game high.

**Scotty's BARKS 'N' BITES**

It hasn't been too long ago . . . the Saturday after the Medford Black Tornado had whacked the KUHS Pelicans into submission in the annual football classic, to be exact . . . that we were informed that the city of Medford planned to suit up every football player in the schools' organized system for a mass picture.

They did just that . . . 800 plus, well uniformed youngsters ranging in ages from the fifth grade through the 12th, all posed for 3 mass picture . . . and we'll have to admit that it made quite a picture. And we'll also have to admit that Medford's high school football teams make quite a showing . . . as a direct result of the fact that the program starts back in the fifth grade.

From the fifth grade on, with the same purpose utilized in an academic structure (everything is aimed toward culmination in the 12th grade), the Medford graders are taught the same system of fundamentals, etc., used by the Black Tornado varsity. And it pays off.

Now, under the direction of city school athletic coordinator Jim Johnson, the same plan of attack has been inaugurated in Klamath Falls. And this will pay off here. Anyone connected with sports realizes that Klamath Union High will not collapse if the Pelicans never win another football, basketball or any other athletic competition from Medford. But it makes it a lot nicer for the lads involved if they at least have a fighting chance . . . if they know that they are competing on an equal basis.

It is important to note that there are two types of sports activities in operation in ours, or anyone's school system.

One, a physical education program, in which the boys (and girls) participate in gym classes aimed at health education, exercises, coordination drills, games, etc., all within school hours and credited them towards graduation.

The other, the one of which we are speaking when we mention the Medford-style program, is the athletic program, after school hours, in which the boys work hour after hour for nothing more, materially, than a letterman's sweater. But this big K is important to the boy involved . . . and the chance to play and an opportunity to win against Medford, et al, is also very important.

Johnson, through some fine cooperation from the coaches of each of the city schools, inaugurated the program during the football season . . . and it is to continue through basketball, track, wrestling, all sports in school, with the exception of baseball.

Baseball is certainly not left out, however, because the tremendous summer program we have in Klamath Falls handles that sport nicely. Because of the usual un-baseball type weather we experience during the school year, the diamond sport is necessarily curtailed.

In the lower grades (we are starting in the sixth grade—not the fifth) stress is being placed on basic fundamentals of the sport. Lending guidance whenever asked are KU coaches Bob Williams (football), Dean White (basketball), DeLance Duncan (wrestling) and Jim Inglesby (track).

Granted no two coaches work exactly alike, nor is it expected

that they should . . . but, fundamentals of a game are exactly that . . . they don't change with a coach . . . and they have to be learned before a lad gets to high school where time runs out on him all too quick.

I'm glad the idea has started . . . it will take time but the ultimate result will show up well.

I found out the other day that a group of local skiers had given some thought to taking me out for a forced trial run (torture by snow) across the wintery slopes, because I didn't pay too much attention to skiing and didn't give their sport much on the daily page.

In a frantic effort to put down this sort of thing, I have talked Norm Cardoza (an embryo, but ardent skier) into writing a weekly column about skiing, "As He Skis It." This bit, which starts today, will run each Wednesday, throughout the season. Norm will try to keep fans posted as to what has happened, and as to what's going to happen—wherever there is skiing snow nearby.

GILCHRIST (Special)—The Gilchrist Grizzlies got back on the win trail as they blasted Paisley 59-37 in a non-leaguer at Gilchrist Saturday night.

Led by Gerald Warren and Charley Russell who hit for 21 and 19 points respectively, the Grizzlies led 14-4, 30-13 and 41-25 at the quarter marks.

The top scores for the Paisley five were Bill Plumb and Allen Coursey with 15 and 13.

Chet Emery added 12 to the Gilchrist cause. Warren's total came off 6 field goals and 9-14 at the foul line. Russell hit eight from the floor and 3-5 gitties. Emery collected only 3 field goals but registered 9-12 at the foul stripe.

In overall foul shooting Gilchrist registered 21-33 while Paisley hit 11-21.

## Duck Swimmers Sink OSC Squad

EUGENE (AP) — The University of Oregon swimming team posted its first victory of the season Saturday, defeating Oregon State 51-44.

PORTLAND (AP) — Portland State leading the Oregon Collegiate Conference, defeated Eastern Oregon 87-58 here Saturday night.
