## Techmen, Vikings Vie Here

Portland State College and Oregon Tech both moved farther out front in the Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball race Saturday night, but something will have to give because the two teams meet Friday night.

Portland State, 5-2 in conference play, is a half game ahead of Oregon Tech, 5-3. The Portland team whipped Eastern Oregon 87-58 and Oregon Tech beat Oregon College of Education, 79-53.

Southern Oregon and Eastern Oregon meet this weekend.

The Owls, proving coach Wally Palmberg's pre-season comment that they had the potential and would move when they found themselves, blistered Oregon College twice to sweep past idle Southern Oregon.

Although the Friday night game was won, more or less, by continued use of the "unit" system, Palmberg tempered his substitutions Saturday night, calling on individuals as he needed them.

The two-unit plan had been inaugurated in a successful effort to loosen the Owl squad, and Palmberg had stated that it would not necessarily continue, once it had served its purpose.

Including the weekend series with Portland State, the Owls have 10 games left on the league schedule.

## John Thomas Soars To Indoor Record

NEW YORK (UPI) — John Thomas, the space age self-propelled human rocket, appears to have an all-expenses-paid trip to Rome this summer clinched if he can avoid such man-made lifts as elevators.

Thomas produced the top high jump in track history Saturday night — indoors or out — when he cleared seven feet, 1 1/2 inches at the Millrose Games.

The feat, topping by a quarter of an inch, the mark he set in the same arena last Feb. 21, led the sellout crowd of 16,000 to give the 18-year-old Boston University youth one of the loudest ovations even heard in Madison Square Garden.

It was a cheer that probably will be repeated in Rome when the world's top amateur athletes gather in August for the Olympic Games. About all John has to do to win a berth on the United States team is avoid injuries such as the elevator accident of last March 27 that almost wrecked the left foot that may become the most famous in high jumping annals.

John's leaps of 7 feet, 1 1/2 inches

and 7 feet, 1 1/2 inches cannot be submitted for recognition as official world marks because they were produced indoors. The International Amateur Athletic Federation recognizes only records set outdoors.

"I don't know if I'll ever clear 7 1/2. I'm not even sure if I can do 7-2 1/2," Thomas said after his Saturday night display. "I'm just going to keep on jumping and see what happens."

"I can only do one of two things—make it or miss it."

The "leapers" stole the Millrose show. Don (Tarzan) Bragg, who won the pole vault by clearing 15 feet, 4 inches, barely missed becoming the first man to clear 16 feet when he brushed off the bar in his last try at that height.

Once more a University of Oregon distance runner has flashed across the finish line first in a race of national prominence. Jim Grelle was the latest to do so.

Grelle, Oregon graduate student, won the Wanamaker Mile at the Millrose Games in Madison Square Garden Saturday night. He did it with flashing speed in the final lap.

## SO Trio The Class Of Preps

With the high school basketball season past its halfway point, three southern Oregon teams are well on their way toward establishing themselves as the class of the state.

They are Marshfield of Coos Bay, runnerup to Franklin of Portland in the state class A-1 tournament last year; Medford and Klamath Falls.

Marshfield, built around 6-9 Mel Counts and ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press poll all season, ran its record to 13-0 last weekend with two more Midwestern League wins. The victims were Willamette of Eugene, 75-35, and Springfield, 53-47.

Medford, which got off to a slow start while basketball-playing members of its state championship football team were making the transition, beat Grants Pass, 89-65, Friday. The record for Medford, No. 2 in the poll last week, is 11-3.

Klamath Falls, ranked No. 3 last week, now is 12-2 for the season after weekend victories over Ashland, 63-50, and Grants Pass, 78-69.

Medford and Klamath Falls are in the Southern Oregon Conference but both appear sure of berths in next month's tournament at Eugene, regardless of which wins the conference title.

With Roosevelt's 46-42 upset of eighth-ranked Jefferson Friday, Cleveland—No. 4 in last week's poll—went into first place in the Portland league as it downed Washington.

North Bend, No. 5, rebounded from a loss to South Eugene with a 77-51 defeat of Cottage Grove in the Midwestern League Saturday. Its season record now is 11-3.

Sixth-ranked Hermiston, after humiliating Pendleton, 68-35, lost a non-league game to Walla Walla, 41-37, Saturday night. It now is 13-2 for the season. La Grande, No. 7 and Hermiston's chief rival for the Intermountain title, took two one-sided weekend league victories from Baker.

Roseburg, No. 9 in last week's poll, won two Midwestern League games, over North Eugene and Willamette of Eugene.

Springfield, No. 10, broke even in two Midwestern contests, beating North Eugene but losing to Marshfield.

# Big 'O' Should Set College All-Time Record Tonight

Tonight's best basketball bet is that Oscar Robertson will climax a weekend spree of team and individual record-busting by setting an all-time major college career scoring mark.

The Cincinnati All-America has been sub-par — for him — lately but would have to collapse entirely to fail to pass Frank Selys' three-year scoring record of 2,538

when Cincinnati entertains Drake. Oscar has 2,335 and needs only four points against Drake to erase Selys' standard.

If Robertson hits anywhere near his average per game of 35.8 points, he'll move within easy range of the major college four-year scoring high of 2,587 set by Dick Hemric at Wake Forest.

Robertson, with 573 points in 16 games this season, is rolling to-

ward his third straight national crown but Tom Stith is setting a hot pace in second place. The 6-5 St. Bonaventure junior set a Buffalo (N.Y.) Memorial Auditorium record of 46 points Saturday night while sparking a 93-80 triumph over Marshall (W.Va.) College. Stith, who has 427 points, cracked the old auditorium mark of 42 shared by Larry O'Connor of Canisius and John Clunde of Navy.

The William and Mary Indians and Ohio State Buckeyes enjoyed record-smashing Saturday games while the Marquette Warriors gave fourth-ranked Bradley a scare before bowing in overtime, 62-59. Capt. Mike Owens scored four of Bradley's last five points before a record 11,140 fans at the Milwaukee Arena.

William and Mary struck a blow for all the Southern Conference teams that have taken West Virginia's dust for years when it upset the third-ranked Mountaineers on a neutral floor at Norfolk, Va., 94-86. The defeat snapped West Virginia's conference victory streak at 56 games. Jeff Cohen, a 6-5, 225-pound junior from Los Angeles, collected 34 points and 20 rebounds for the winners. Jerry West, West Virginia's All-America star, fouled out with 5:18 to play after scoring 42 points.

The idle Virginia Tech Gobblers replaced West Virginia in first place when the Mountaineers suffered their first league defeat since bowing to Richmond on Feb. 4, 1956.

Ohio State, ranked fifth by the United Press International Board of Coaches, set a school scoring mark while crushing Michigan State in a Big Ten game, 111-79. The Buckeyes, with Jerry Lucas scoring 25 points, cracked the team high of 109 they set recently against Delaware.

Second-ranked California, the defending NCAA champion, fell behind Oregon State in the opening minutes but the nation's top defense began clicking and the Bears posted a 67-48 victory at Berkeley, Calif.

The only other two teams in the top 10 which saw action Saturday posted impressive road triumphs. Sixth-ranked Georgia Tech clobbered Alabama, 60-48, and seventh-ranked Villanova downed Canisius, 75-66.

## AFL's Oakland '11' Searches For Coach

OAKLAND, Calif. (UPI) — Oakland, now certain of a spot in the new American Football League, started hunting today for such necessary items as a coach, general manager, home field and some players.

"Things are very indefinite right now," said Chet Soda, one of the team's well-heeled backers following Saturday's surprise decision by the new loop at its Dallas meeting. "Our first order of

business is to find a coach and a general manager."

The big stumbling block is the team's lack of a home stadium. There is none in Oakland, although Soda thinks that the city will pass a 15-million-dollar bond issue in June to build one.

Until then, however, the team may have to resort to seeking the use of Kezar Stadium or Candlestick Park in San Francisco.

The San Francisco Forty Niners, well entrenched members of the National Football League, play their home games in Kezar and Mayor George Christopher of that city has said "we won't do anything to hurt the Forty Niners."

The other city-owned stadium would be Candlestick Park, which will be opened to the San Francisco Giants for the coming baseball season. But Christopher also has said he would not sanction spending money to convert the playing area for football.

Horace Stoneham, president of the Giants, favors the idea of the Oakland team playing there.

"Fine! We'll be happy to have them, as long as they pre-empt our dates," Stoneham said Sunday.

## Souchak Nets Golf Victory

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — The slimmer he becomes, the fatter his bankroll gets.

That's Iron Mike Souchak, the heavy-hitting golfer from Grossinger, N.Y., by way of Duke University where he played quite a bit of football.

Mike came from one-stroke behind Sunday to win top prize of \$2,800 in the 72-hole San Diego Open, beating out young Johnny Pott, the former Louisiana State collegian who led at the end of three rounds.

Souchak's 72-hole total of 269 was a record for the San Diego Open as was Pott's 270. The old record was 271.

Pott collected \$1,900 for his second place. He won about \$12,000 last year and his biggest jackpot was in the Chicago Open when he took second place and won \$4,400. He had led for three rounds before Ken Venturi nipped him by one stroke. So history repeated itself in a measure here.

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## Game Commission Announces Final 1960 Rulings, Changes

Back to last year's deadlines went the rules for salmon anglers at Oregon City Falls, steelhead and salmon anglers at McNary Dam, boatmen on the McKenzie River, and trout anglers given year-around fishing on the Snake River under the angling regulations adopted by the game commission Friday, January 22, for the 1960 season.

In all, the game commission

made only five changes in the tentative rules as announced two weeks ago. The final change extended the salmon season on the Umpqua River two weeks from October 31 through November 15. All other tentative rules were retained.

Under the final rules, the general trout season will open on April 23 and run through October 31, except streams in Zones 1, 3,

and 4. Trout opener for the coastal streams was set for May 28 and will extend through October 31 in Zones 1 and 3 and to October 2 in Zone 4. Trout season for the high lakes was set for May 21 through October 9. Good news for steelhead fishermen was retention of the extended winter season which will run through March 31 in all open streams in Zone 1.

In a lively session that lasted throughout the morning, the game commission listened to numerous requests and proposals from anglers concerning the proposed regulations.

Salmon anglers from Oregon City made a strong appeal to replace the deadline to its original position. The commissioners then rescinded the original order but gave strict instructions to the director to call an emergency closure at the falls if low water hampered upstream salmon migrations or if deliberate snagging and foul hooking of fish became a problem.

The commission also listened to an appeal by McKenzie River bank anglers and replaced the boating deadline to its original position at Blue River. Boatmen were also present urging the commission for the additional boating water, but the commission's vote went in favor of the bank anglers.

Despite an urgent request from central Oregon groups and PGE officials, the commission stuck to its guns on the delayed trout opening at Lake Simstutus on the Deschutes River. A correction was made in the length of the season which will run through October 31 instead of October 9 as previously listed. This was not an extension of the season but merely a correction as previously proposed.

The commission's stand on the Pelton Dam Reservoir followed considerable study which showed that the bulk of the early season catch in late April and May was young downstream migrant steelhead running from six to nine inches in length. Considerable numbers of young chinook salmon were also tallied in the early season catch. By late May and early June these young migrants moved through the reservoir and appeared only incidentally in the angler's creel.

Snake River steelheaders received a breaker under the new regulations which allows them to keep trout during the winter months in that section of the river below Pine Creek. Summer bag limits will apply.

## Owl Hoots To Meet

The Oregon Tech booster association, the Owl Hoots, will welcome coaches Wally Palmberg and George Miller to their regular weekly meeting session tonight at 6:30 in the Chuck Wagon restaurant for reports on their successful campaigns over the past weekend.

Palmberg's basketball team will host the league leading Portland State Vix here this weekend, while Miller's wrestling squad will tangle with Humboldt State in the Owl gym Friday afternoon.

## Yreka Miners Add 2 More

YREKA (Special) — The Yreka Miners notched their 15th straight win with an easy 71-47 triumph over visiting Anderson here Saturday night after collecting their 25th straight win on their own home floor Friday night at the expense of the previously unbeaten Weed Cougars.

Led by big Bill Wilson who hooked, jumped, tipped and rebounded 17 points Saturday and 28 Friday, the Yreka had little trouble with either of their weekend foe.

Friday night the Yreka's battled nip and tuck with the Cougars for the first half then blew the game wide open in the remaining two stanzas. At the quarter they led 17-6, were up 37-34 at the half-way mark, then zoomed off to a 53-38 spread by the close of the third.

Weed's Doug Blankenship, who counted 18, was the closest to Wilson's Friday mark.

The Cougars were allowed only three field goals in the second half of the Friday league game.

Saturday night Wilson sat out a lot of the ball game allowing Anderson's Bill Jones second place in the scoring with 15. Yreka Gary Gresham notched 11 for Yreka.

Yreka had its own way most of the time Saturday except for the third frame when they scored only seven points after the Jayvees took over.

Klamath Falls youngsters of all school ages are invited to attend. Boys must furnish gym shoes, trunks and towels, according to George Price, P & R director.

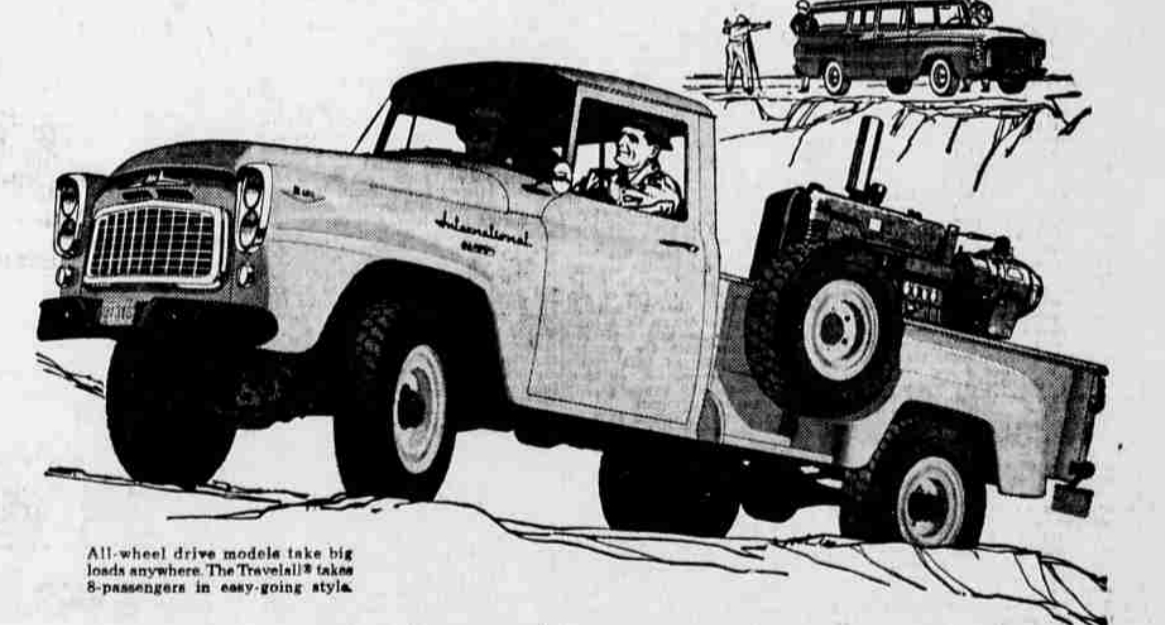
Qualified instructors in boxing, judo and other activities will be on hand. The newly-formed club will meet each Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from now on.

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
