Timber Firm Names Clapp

TACOMA — Norton Clapp, Pacific Northwest business leader, this week assumed the presidency of Weyerhaeuser Company upon retirement of F. K. Weyerhaeuser.

From offices in Tacoma, Clapp will direct the company's tree farm and forest product operations located in 30 states. Its sales in 1959 amounted to more than 450 million dollars, compared with 324 million dollars when F. K. Weyerhaeuser took office three years ago.

Weyerhaeuser will become chairman of the board, a post formerly held by Clapp. The change was voted by the company's board of directors at a meeting last November. Clapp is president of Laird, Norton Company of Winona, Minnesota. He serves as a member of the national executive board of the Boy Scouts of America and as

trustee of the College of Puget Sound, Tacoma, and the University of Chicago. The new president joined the Weyerhaeuser board of directors in 1946, and became a vice president and member of the executive committee in 1955.

Seven Perish In B52 Crash

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) — A U.S. Air Force B52 Stratofortress crashed and burned at Ramey Base Monday night, and the Air Force announced all seven airmen aboard were killed.

Names of the seven crewmen were withheld.

The giant eight-jet bomber crashed just short of the air base runway during landing practice. An Air Force spokesman said the plane was a "total loss." The weather at the time was described as ideal.

An investigation was ordered.
