Stocks WALL STREET NEW YORK (AP) — Motors paced a sizable stock market recovery late this afternoon. Trading was moderately active. Volume for the day was estimated at 3,200,000 shares compared with 2,820,000 Monday. Pivotal issues were up from fractions to about 2 points. The more speculative stocks or wider moves gained as much as 6 or 7. The market was up from the start in the second day of rebound from the steep January drop. Prices improved and were about at their best in late dealings. American Motors rose more than 2 points and Ford had a point while other motors had fractional gains. Jones & Laughlin was about 2 points higher. Up more than a point were U.S. Steel (ex dividend), Bethlehem and Republic.

Three Given Prison Terms By Circuit Court Judge

Three persons were sentenced to penitentiary terms in brief circuit court appearances before Judge David R. Vandenberg today. Two defendants were a man and wife from Loomis, California, who once worked for the Iron Mountain Lumber Company yard in Diamond Lake. MRS. MARY ANN BOYER, 27, whom Attorney William Bradshaw said had five children in California, was sentenced to a two-year term. Bradshaw told the court she had no prior convictions. Allred Edward Boyer, also 27, was sentenced to a six-year term. The couple pleaded guilty last week to forging a \$67 payroll check stolen from the company of October 9. Officers said 18 payroll checks had been stolen, and several were cashed here and in Burns where the couple was arrested. On their persons, officers said, were 11 uncashed payroll checks. A two-year sentence was imposed on Richard E. Davison, 23, 813 Pine Street, whose probation on bad check charges was revoked last week. DAVISON HAD BEEN given probation for one year last June, but subsequently admitted having written more checks. District Attorney Arthur Beddoe said these checks amounted to eight no - account checks and seven or eight checks without sufficient funds. Attorney Richard Smith appealed to the court for leniency because Davison had had difficulty keeping a job. The attorney said Davison had worked for Southern Pacific for a month, then was ordered to resign because of his record. Smith said SP officials here and in Dunsuir appealed to the head office, but without avail. The sentence was two years in the penitentiary. Frank Lounsbury Jr., 21-year-old tire repairman accused of shooting a fellow employee with a .22 caliber revolver, asked for additional time before entering a plea

Ranchhand Enters Plea Of Innocence

William Olen Gairson, a 40-year-old ranch hand accused of beating a baby to death, pleaded not guilty to a first degree murder charge in circuit court today. At the same time Gairson's attorney said he would ask that the murder trial be moved to another county. These proceedings followed by approximately an hour Gairson's sentence in district court on two cruelty convictions. There he had been found guilty of severely beating two babies of the woman with whom he lived. District Judge D. E. Van Vactor imposed on Gairson the maximum time sentence the law allows and half the maximum fine—a year in jail and a \$500 fine in each case. The sentences are to run consecutively, so Gairson will serve two years in jail and be fined \$1,000. Gary Lee Bursik, the 11-month-old son of Mrs. Ethel Myrtle Bursik, was involved in both cases. Gairson was accused of killing the child December 17 by beating his head against the floor of the tenant home he and Mrs. Bursik shared. Gary Lee was one of two babies Gairson was convicted of beating in the cruelty trials. The other was 3-year-old Jody Breeding, who was brought to the Klamath County juvenile home the next day and yesterday was placed temporarily in a foster home. Warren Lesseg of Medford, Gairson's attorney, informed Judge Van Vactor he would appeal the cruelty convictions and sentences to circuit court. A formal appeal has not yet been filed. Upstairs, Gairson faced Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg, and entered a simple "not guilty" plea to the murder charge. It was then that Lesseg said he would move for a change of venue. The case was continued until February 9, when Lesseg expected to have the "rather voluminous" motion prepared. Gairson was returned to the county jail where he and Mrs. Bursik, 21, are serving a six-month term for lewd cohabitation.

On a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. Time was set for 10 a.m. Friday and Lounsbury was freed on continuing bail. Lawrence Walter Mose, 21, Chilquin, charged with assaulting Marcella Allen with a knife January 5, pleaded not guilty to the assault with a dangerous weapon charge. Time for his trial will be set by a judge assigned to the case. Mose was represented by Attorney David R. Vandenberg Jr.

Evangelist Sets Services

Evangelist Warren D. Combs of Yakima, gospel singer and trumpet-player, and former Klamath Falls pastor, will begin special revival services Tuesday night, February 2, at the Klamath Gospel Center, 1625 Mitchell Street at Snasta Way, according to the Rev. Melvin R. Griffith, pastor. Services will be conducted nightly at 7-45, except Monday and Saturday, for a two-week period, concluding on Sunday, February 14th. Immediately after graduating from Bible College, Mr. Combs accepted the pastorate of the Klamath Gospel Center here in 1941. At that time, the local congregation was in the process of building the present church, which at the time of his arrival was about 20 per cent completed. The church was finished under his leadership. The Combs had one son, Larry, born in Klamath Falls, who is now a sophomore in one of Yakima's high schools. They now have four children. Since leaving Klamath Falls, Mr. Combs pastored Assembly of God Churches near Yakima for nine years, holding pastorates at Buena and Toppish. At the latter place a new church valued at 275,000 was constructed during his stay. He left his Toppish pastorate three years ago, and has since conducted revival meetings in Ohio, Illinois, North and South Carolina, Missouri, Florida, and Washington, and in Hood River, Spray, Irrigon, Baker, and Lebanon, Oregon. Special instrumental and vocal music will be a special feature of each night's service. Pastor Griffith extends a cordial invitation to those of this city to attend.

School Bus, Truck Collide

A busload of Ferguson grade school children enjoyed a little excitement this morning when their bus was involved in a minor accident. Civil Suit Asks \$66,000

LAKEVIEW—A civil suit asking judgment for \$66,431.25 and criminal complaints charging forgery and arson have been filed here against Melmon Willis Fletcher. The civil suit was filed January 29 by Attorney T. R. Conn for R. M. Singer, F. M. Binnion, J. V. Foreman and Frank Fernholz, doing business as the Lakeview Manufacturing Company, employers of Fletcher for more than 12 years. The complaint alleges that between January 1, 1955 and December 1, 1959, Fletcher embezzled \$66,431.25 in company funds. He was a bookkeeper for the Lakeview firm. In the arson charge, Fletcher is accused of burning certain papers belonging to the company and the forgery charge accuses him of signing the name of F. M. Binnion, company manager, to a check for \$1,686.48. District Attorney Chick Chaloupka said Fletcher appeared before Justice of the Peace O. C. Gibbs and waived preliminary hearing. He was bound over to the grand jury on the forgery and arson charges. The new charges are in addition to 13 felony charges and one misdemeanor charge previously filed against Fletcher. He is under a one-year jail sentence and \$500 fine after a plea of guilty on the misdemeanor. He pleaded guilty to one of the felony embezzlement charges and sentencing has been postponed pending receipt of a pre-sentence report by the State Board of Parole and Probation. Fletcher is represented by Attorney Forrest E. Cooper.

Klamath Teenager Arrested On Check Forgery Charge

A 14-year-old high school freshman was taken into temporary custody Monday by city and county juvenile officers for questioning concerning forgery. Officers said the youth admitted forging names on two checks totaling \$11 in November. With money from one check he bought a knife with which he planned to defend himself from a fellow student who had been threatening him, the youth told police. Police singled out their suspect when they were notified Friday of the forgeries by the U.S. National Bank. The checks had been drawn from the account of a local woman and made payable to the Herald and News. City Police Juvenile Officer Ray Howard determined which newspaper carrier boy handled the route and compared his handwriting with that found on the checks. The specimens were identical, he said. County juvenile officers will determine disposition of the case soon. Other cases handled by city police included attempted breaking and entry reported by Frank Franklin of Frank's Shoe Repair Shop, 621 Pine Street, Tuesday. He told officers he was sleeping in his quarters behind the shop when he heard glass breaking. On investigation, Franklin spotted a tall man smashing a window on the shop door with what appeared to be the butt of a pistol. Franklin shouted and the man fled. He and officers followed a trail of footprints in fresh snow, but the trail vanished when snow gave out in an alley. Police also received a report of a forged \$30 check Monday made payable to William Pierson and "endorsed" by a Klamath Falls woman. Two other such checks were reported over the weekend. Officers are questioning a suspect whom they jailed for traffic charges, and tentative charges of parole violation and forgery. He was arrested over the weekend by state police. He is William Joseph Peterson, 35, of Central California. The latest bad check was reported by Clancy Canine of Clancy's Texaco Station, 301 North Ninth Street, Monday. In other action, police jailed a 16-year-old Chilquin lad Tuesday on orders of county juvenile officers. The youth was taken into temporary custody for questioning in regard to hit-run driving and drunkenness in an auto Monday. He was apprehended by Chilquin police. The youth is suspected of hitting a car, then running on foot from his disabled vehicle. Officers also investigated a minor auto accident Monday afternoon, involving cars driven by Charles I. Robertson of Lakeview and William Lightfoot, 1900 Fremont Street, at the corner of South Sixth Street and East Main Street. The Robertson car slid into the rear of the Lightfoot car, they said. Little damage and no injuries resulted. No citations were issued.

Trial Opens In Court

The lewd cohabitation trial of Philip Duane Jackson, 23, and Bernadine Dickens, 18, both of Bonanza, opened in district court today before a two-woman, four-man jury. Jackson and Miss Dickens, accused of cohabitation on or about December 20, were represented by Attorney Robert Redding. The state was represented by Deputy District Attorney Ernest Gordon. Witnesses called by the state included Jackson's grandmother, Mrs. Anna May Copperfield; Miss Birdie Joy of Bonanza; Deputy Sheriff Robert Hartley, and Bonanza Marshal Lewis Van Sipes. Hearing the trial before Judge D. E. Van Vactor were Thelma Scott, Irene Klus, Bryant Williams, Julian Eccles, Carl Schubert, and Walter Moore, all of Klamath Falls. Jackson faces two additional charges filed at the same time. He is accused of assault with a dangerous weapon upon Mrs. Copperfield and assault and battery upon Miss Joy.
