Artist Plays For Old Tutor

A Klamath Falls concert violinist Wayne Angel, Army specialist fourth class, performed recently in Germany for Walter Schulze-Prisca, the aging master who most influenced his style.

Schulze-Prisca, known around the world as a violinist and composer, taught Rex Underwood of Portland, under whom Angel studied.

Angel, 23, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Al Angel who both work for the city school districts. He attended Klamath Union High School and Portland State College before entering the service in 1958.

He began studying here at age 9 and continued his studies through college. While in Portland he played for years with the Portland Symphony—the youngest man ever to do so—and with other Northwest orchestras.

Angel presently is soloist for the Seventh Army Symphony, scheduled for two Berlin concerts soon.

He obtained Schulze-Prisca's address from Underwood and "just dropped in."

He plans to return to school when discharged next year.

Identification Of Trees Set

Camp Fire Girls will learn how to identify 10 local tree species during the 1960 segment of their three-year conservation project. They also will learn how the wood is used and other features of the species.

About 40 Camp Fire leaders from the Klamath council met recently for a training session in YMCA headquarters to learn how to direct girls in the project.

During a morning session, Donald L. Hummel, Weyerhaeuser Company forester, and Henry Davies, forester for the state Department of Forestry, taught leaders to identify these species: black locust, Chinese elm, silver maple, pin oak, Russian olive, white pine, cottonwood, Engelmann spruce, Shasta fir and cutleaf weeping birch.

Ted Durmont, Weyerhaeuser public relations director, showed one of the company's latest movies on forest management and its relation to wildlife management.

During the afternoon session, Bluebird and Camp Fire leaders met separately to discuss the program with professional staffers.

Revenue Sons Seek Taxes From 'Daddy'

Sweet Daddy Grace founded the House of Prayer for All People 33 years ago and since then his followers swelled to an estimated three million. Their contributions to the spiritual leader were enormous.

It is estimated he controlled as

sets worth about 25 million dollars when he died in Los Angeles Jan. 12 at the age of 78.

In a sweeping move Monday, the federal government placed liens against all the property of Daddy Grace, also known as Charles M. Grace, Marcelino Manoel Graca and Bishop C. M.

Grace, in 15 states and Washington, D. C.

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) claimed he owed \$5,966,000 in income taxes for 1945 through 1956. The IRS disavows any claims against "any houses of worship," but set its sights on non-exempt income it believed

Grace had.

The IRS claim was one of the largest ever entered against an individual. A spokesman said the IRS was preparing to prosecute Daddy Grace when he died.

The bulk of the Negro minister's estate has been willed to the church which has 350 houses of worship in 60 cities, all painted red, white and blue, the same color he painted his long, uncut finger-nails.

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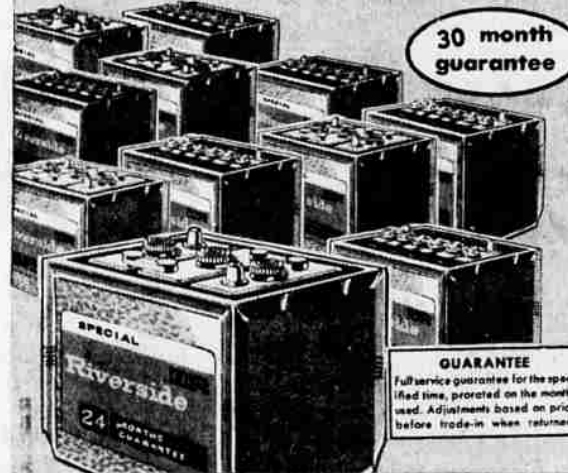
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
