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Petition Asks Study Of Problems

DORRIS—A petition asking the Siskiyou County Committee on School District Organization to make a study of school problems in Butte Valley has been sent to Union School Superintendent W. E. Roberts.

The action resulted from an 11 to one decision reached by the Butte Valley High School Study Committee in a meeting this week. The county committee's study may lead to an election to decide if Butte Valley High School will withdraw from the Siskiyou Union High School District.

The county committee will include trustees from Dorris, Macdoel and Red Rock grade school districts and Siskiyou Union High School District. The next step is for the committee to hold public meetings in the area to go over existing problems and potential ones in case of withdrawal. Each school board will have one vote in the group's decision to remain in the present district or bring a reorganization plan to vote. If the county committee decides an election should be held, its findings would be sent to the State Board of Education. If approved at state level, an election would be called.

Mrs. Don Griffen, chairman of the local committee, said figures furnished by the county school office show the Siskiyou Union High School District, with Yreka area already withdrawn, will have a deficit of about \$170,000 for the coming fiscal year, if the remaining schools are operated at their current expense rate. She said her committee had spent much time going over the financial end of the high school operations, but that it was seeking a way of getting the most educational value for the tax dollar rather than merely trying to cut school taxes.
