

Jump Champ Thomas Eyes Higher Mark

BOSTON (UPI) — Young John Thomas tries for another world record high jump mark Saturday night in the 71st Boston A.A. track meet at the garden.

The teenage Boston University sophomore leaped 7 feet 1 1/2 inches at the Millrose games in New York last Saturday night to set his latest record. Not 19 until next month, Thomas now has cleared the seven foot barrier five times during his brief but fantastic career.

Thomas, who entered his second year at BU last Monday morning after making up a semester following his mangled left foot accident last March, will have stiff competition from Charlie Dumas and Sweden's Stig Pettersson.

Dumas, the Southern California athlete who was the first person ever to clear seven feet, tied for first place with Thomas last year at the B.A.A. meet, both clearing 6 feet 10 1/2 inches. Pettersson, who has jumped 6 feet 11 1/2 inches, will be making his first American appearance of the season. He finished fourth in the 1956 Olympics, Dumas winning the event.

Dumas has cleared seven feet twice, jumping 7 feet 1/2 inch in the Olympic tryouts in June 1956 and seven feet even last May.

Weight Lifting Champion Sets February Ring Debut In Garden

NEW YORK (UPI) — Paul Anderson, the one-time boy derick of weight lifting, headed toward a boxing career today and while he may not be the heaviest heavyweight of them all he seems a cinch to be the strongest.

Anderson, who won the 1956 Olympic championship by lifting more freight car wheels than Casey Jones had ever seen, will make his pro debut in a four-

rounder at Madison Square Garden on Feb. 19. His go with one Ray Batey of Jamaica, B.W.I., probably will draw more attention than the main bout in which Eddie Machen meets Sweet Billy Hunter.

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Young Cagers Slate 4th Annual Jamboree

Saturday night, beginning at 6:45, 16 teams representing each of the Klamath Falls grade schools and both Altamont and Fremont Junior High Schools will converge on Pelican Court for the 4th annual grade school basketball jamboree.

The grade school age cagers, plus the smaller sized eighth graders from the junior high schools, will pair off in a series of eight 15-minute games. The whole affair is expected to be concluded by approximately 9 p.m. and each player on each team is scheduled to see action.

The big event is being sponsored by the Pelican Booster Club, the KU backers group, in conjunction with the city school athletic department, under the direction of Jim Johnson.

Admission charges are 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for young-

sters. Referee services are being donated through the courtesy of the Klamath Falls Officials Association. Program official scorers and timers will be furnished by the Booster organization. Concession stands will be in operation throughout the entire evening.

Altamont and Fremont will be represented by two teams, one of which will be comprised of eighth graders falling within certain size and weight classifications. The grade schools represented are Riverside, Conger, Pelican, Mills, Fairview and Roosevelt.

At 6:45, Altamont and Fremont A teams begin the action. They are to be followed at 7 p.m. by a contest between the Fremont and Altamont eighth graders. At 7:15, Mills and Fairview A teams tangle followed immediately by a match pitting the B squads from the same schools.

At 7:45, the Pelican and Roosevelt A's will mix, the game to be followed by the B altercation at 8 p.m.

The Riverside and Conger A teams are scheduled to start at 8:15 and the B clubs from the same two schools are paired in the finale.

Stilt Passes 2000 Mark

Wilt Chamberlain, the Philadelphia rookie who is well on his way to re-writing the National Basketball Assn. record book, joined a very select group today after playing only 53 games in the circuit.

The Stilt became the third player in NBA history to go over the 2,000-point mark in one season Thursday night when he scored 43 points as the Warriors bowed to the Syracuse Nationals 137-110. The 43 gave him a total of 2,011.

George Yardley, now of the Nats, and Bob Pettit of St. Louis are the other members of the exclusive club. But neither hit the mark until their fifth season of pro competition. Yardley scored 2,001 points two seasons ago and Pettit raised the record to 2,105 during the 1958-59 campaign.

The hapless Cincinnati Royals went down to their 11th straight defeat, losing to the Detroit Pistons 121-102.

Henley Hornets Face Phoenix Five Tonite

The Henley Hornets return to action against an A-2 opponent tonight on the Henley mapewood, after a long spell of waiting for the dust to settle in the battle across the Green Springs where their fellow leaguers are fighting it out for playoff berths. Saturday night the Hornets play host to the Gilchrist Grizzlies.

Henley, relegated to an orphaned position because of its geographic relation to other schools its own size, has had a shot at only two A-2 clubs, not counting games with the Klamath Union sophomores, the entire season. And one of these, Lakeview, has been played twice. In their 14 starts to date the young Hornet squad, one of the smallest in the recent history of the school, has registered six wins.

Their Saturday foe, the Grizzlies, is ranked number six in the seven team County B loop. The Gilchrist five has a 4-8 record for overall season play but has won only one while dropping five in conference action.

Although the Henleyites are standing on the shady side of .500 mark for their efforts so far, a check on scoring figures show them only 3.3 points per game less efficient than their collective opponents. The Hornets have scored 592 points and given up 638. They have counted at a 42.3 per game clip while they have permitted 45.6 per game against them.

Guard Ray Jackson, in addition to his defensive strength, is leading the Hornets in point production. In 14 tests he has scored 155 points for an 11.1 average. The number two Henley scorer is Bert Albritton with a total of 115 and an 8.2 mark.

The Grizzlies boast a pair of double figure scorers in the persons of Gerald Warren and Charles Russell. Warren, fifth among county shooters with 179, carries an 11.9 average. Russell, number nine, has counted 153 for a 10.2 mark.

Hopes that the Pelican varsity basketball team might face the Medford Black Tornado at full strength tonight were dashed completely Thursday when coach Dean White was forced to chase off guard Freddie Biehn and bench center Bob Lewis.

Biehn, who missed two days of school because of an attack of the flu, stuck his head in the door at the chalk-talk session prior to Thursday practice, and was hurriedly sent packing before the "bug" might get a chance to jump to other members of the squad.

Lewis, who chipped an ankle bone in the Ashland game last week, was thought to have been progressing satisfactorily, but a close examination at the whirlpool Thursday killed hopes that he might play.

White has chosen Steve Traylor, Dean Dunson, Paul Bishop, Gary Patzke and Bruce Brinkner to carry the starting responsibilities tonight. Since the Pelicans have already dropped a pair to Medford, the second ranked school in the state, White had previously noted that the Whitebird squad had trouble with the Tornado when at full strength and that going in short one or two players would add to the problem.

"We get one break though — tomorrow night off," observed White thoughtfully.
Medford, unbeaten since its first three games, is reportedly at full strength. Probable starters include Lowell Dean, Jerry Anderson, Ken Durkee, Dick Ragsdale and Bob Quinney or Jerry Shults.

The game will be broadcast in Klamath Falls by sportscaster Floyd Wynne over radio station KFLW, beginning at 8 p.m.
Prior to the varsity test, the Pelican Jaycees will clash with the Tornado juniors on the Hedrick

court while the KU Wildcats are busy with the Medford sophomores at the Medford High School gym.
The Pelican cagers left Klamath Falls in two groups this afternoon, the sophs and Jaycees getting off at 3:30 p.m. followed by the varsity at 4:30.

In the only other conference game Thursday night College of Idaho, the foe of Lewis and Clark tonight, handed Pacific a 60-46 defeat. It was the 26th consecutive defeat for Pacific. Tonight Pacific is host to Whitman.

Fox tipped in a rebound and McDaniel sank a free throw with two minutes gone to put Lewis and Clark ahead and on the road to the victory. The winners swept both backboards and applied a tight man-to-man defense against Whitman.

Pacific jumped into an early lead and led 25-23 at the intermission. But 9 minutes and 17 seconds after the second half started College of Idaho took the lead 35-34 on a set shot by Ed Merritt, quickly padded that to 6 points and coasted to victory.

Spahn Expects Better Season

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Warren Spahn, the highest paid pitcher in baseball, expects to have a great year in 1960 and won't accept the contract offered him by the Milwaukee Braves.

The 38-year-old veteran southpaw who drew about \$70,000 in 1959 told the Milwaukee Sentinel Thursday night he was "very much disappointed" with the contract offered him. He declined to say whether he had been asked to take a salary cut.

Spahn had a 21-15 record last year. It was the 10th season in which he had won 20 or more games.
Spahn said his left knee, on which he underwent surgery Nov. 2, is fine and his legs feel better than ever.

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
