Hoffa Snipes At Kennedy

WASHINGTON (AP) — President James R. Hoffa of the Teamsters Union is spending his Sundays stirring up opposition in Wisconsin and other states to the presidential aspirations of Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass).

Hoffa is opposed to every member of Congress who voted last year for the new labor control law — he calls it the Kennedy-Landrum-Griffin Act. But Kennedy, a leading candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, is Hoffa's prime target.

Some other labor leaders share Hoffa's dislike for Kennedy's stand on the labor bill. Still others, among them AFL-CIO President George Meany, credit Hoffa with eliminating some of the provisions most opposed by organized labor.

Hoffa said in an interview it is too early to say who the Teamsters Union might favor for president in either party, although he's busy picking and choosing among congressional candidates.
