

Lad's Return Causes Ire To Magistrate

NEW YORK (AP) — An angry magistrate Wednesday held 16-year-old David Campanella for trial on a petty larceny charge, saying the former baseball star's stepson deserves "whatever he gets."

The boy was sent back to jail where he has been held since his arrest Jan. 25.

Magistrate James LoPiccolo was angered because the Campanella youth was in court after his third arrest in less than a year.

When a grocer allegedly robbed by Campanella and two other Negro youths offered to drop his complaint, the magistrate would not allow it.

"I have no pity for the Campanella boy," he said. "He's been in and out of courts in a short space of time and should have learned his lesson. He has humiliated his family. He has violated his curfew."

David Campanella is on probation in a case involving the burglary of a Queens drugstore last spring. At the time of that burglary he already had been adjudged a juvenile delinquent on charges growing out of a street fight.

The youth, son of Mrs. Roy Campanella by a previous marriage, is accused with Ronald Carnett, 18, and Isadore Fisher, 20, of stealing \$40 worth of merchandise from a Queens grocery Jan. 25.

Roy Campanella, former catcher for the Dodgers, has been semiparalyzed since an auto crash two years ago.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP)—The marathon craze has returned and this time it has invaded the fine old game of bridge.

Four students of New Mexico University claimed a world record Wednesday of 75 hours and 5 minutes of continuous bridge playing.

The four, Sam Gray Jr. of Santa Fe, N.M., and John Fink, Jim Brown and Terry Duffy of Albuquerque, said they broke the record of 72 hours set recently by a foursome at Cambridge University in England.

They played 887 hands at a table in a downtown hotel lobby. Parents and girl friends brought them food.

Gray almost fell asleep at the 63-hour mark saying, "I don't remember how to play bridge."

Moscow radio was expected to broadcast abroad the terms of the document.

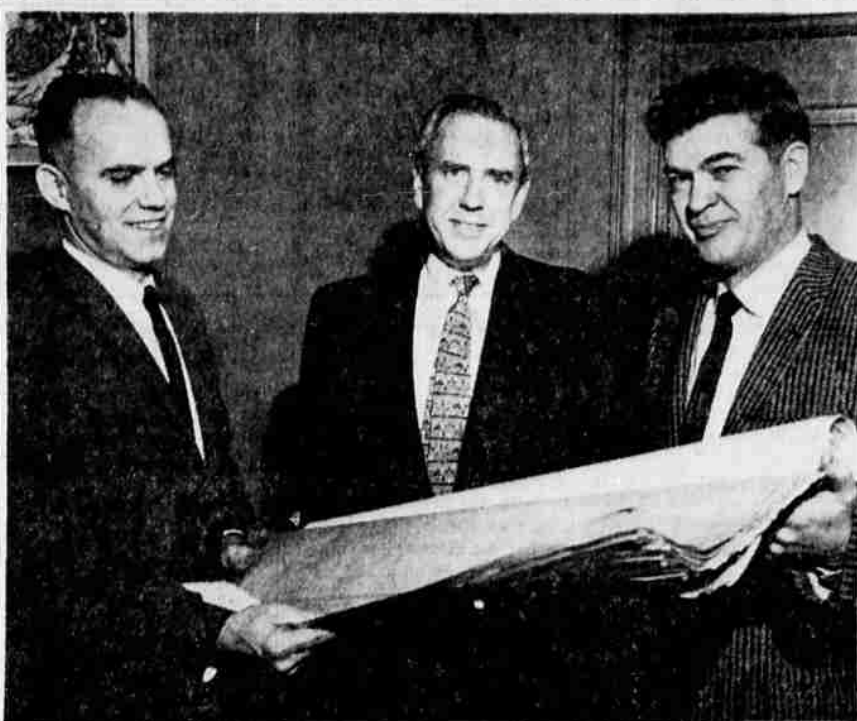
Present were representatives of four Eastern Communist states, Red China, North Viet Nam, North Korea and Mongolia. None of these four signed the statement.

Trip To Algiers Halted For Now

PARIS (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle postponed his Algerian trip and began a sweeping round-up today of ringleaders of the revolt against his government. Armed with near-dictatorial powers, he will preside over a special Cabinet session here Friday instead of going to North Africa as planned.

De Gaulle was reported planning a drastic shakeup of civilian and military leaders in Algeria in the first step to bring the uneasy French African territory back under the firm control of Paris.

Beck Suffers New Setback

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP)—Dave Beck, former president of the Teamsters Union took another setback Wednesday when the State Supreme Court upheld his conviction on a charge of stealing \$1,980 in proceeds from sale of a union-owned automobile.

Beck's attorney, Charles S. Burdell, said in Seattle he will ask the court for a rehearing.

Beck, 65, said he had been confident of a reversal on grounds he did not get a fair trial. He was convicted in King County Superior Court Dec. 14, 1957, on a grand larceny charge. He was sentenced to 15 years in the state penitentiary, but has been free on bail.

AF Sheepishly Withdraws Manual For Enlisted Men

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force has sheepishly withdrawn a nicely illustrated manual telling enlisted men how to wash the general's dog, set his tea table, make drinks for his guests and shine his shoes.

Members of a House Manpower subcommittee pounced on the blue-bound brochure Wednesday and read portions aloud to Stephen S. Jackson, deputy assistant secretary of defense.

Addressed to enlisted men assigned as aides or stewards to general officers, it said at one point: "Occasionally pets require baths. The best way to accomplish this is by using soap, water and plenty of elbow grease. The fingers are better than any mechanical device for applying soap. Rinse the animal thoroughly by pouring water over him, then keep him warm until he is dry."

Jackson and Brig. Gen. Albert E. Clark, Air Force personnel director, listened uncomfortably. The red-faced Clark conceded the manual was a mistake, especially the part about the dogs. Jackson said it would be withdrawn, and a new directive would prohibit "assignment of enlisted personnel to duties which contribute only to the personal benefit of officers."

But the subcommittee members made them squirm for awhile before they reached this stage. Rep. Frank J. Becker (R-NY) sarcastically quoted this from the manual: "Your contribution to the over-all mission of the Air Force can be even more important than that of an aircrew member, a mechanic, or any other individual airman."

If the manual had been written by a Communist, snorted Becker, it couldn't have been better calculated to destroy morale.

"Answer the door properly and invite the guests in," it said. "At times you will be called upon to prepare beverages such as cocktails. Generally it is only necessary for you to know how to mix a few of the most popular ones."

"Shoe polishing isn't a large task, but does require some exacting effort," said the manual then went on for five paragraphs on the proper way to polish shoes.

Police Quiz Suspects

PORTLAND (AP) — Portland police continued methodically today to question persons who might have had a motive to dynamite 10 newspaper-carrying trucks Sunday night.

"There are no suspects tied in with any definite evidence," said Sgt. John Fraser, adding that the police were questioning persons with some knowledge of dynamite who might also have had a motive.

He said his special six-man investigating squad was getting tips from a number of sources on possible suspects.

The trucks were owned by firms that hauled newsprint or newspapers for the Oregon Journal and The Oregonian, where a strike began Nov. 10.
