Hostesses were Mrs. Arlene Schubert, Mrs. Elizabeth Peterstetter and Mrs. Blanche Gowen.

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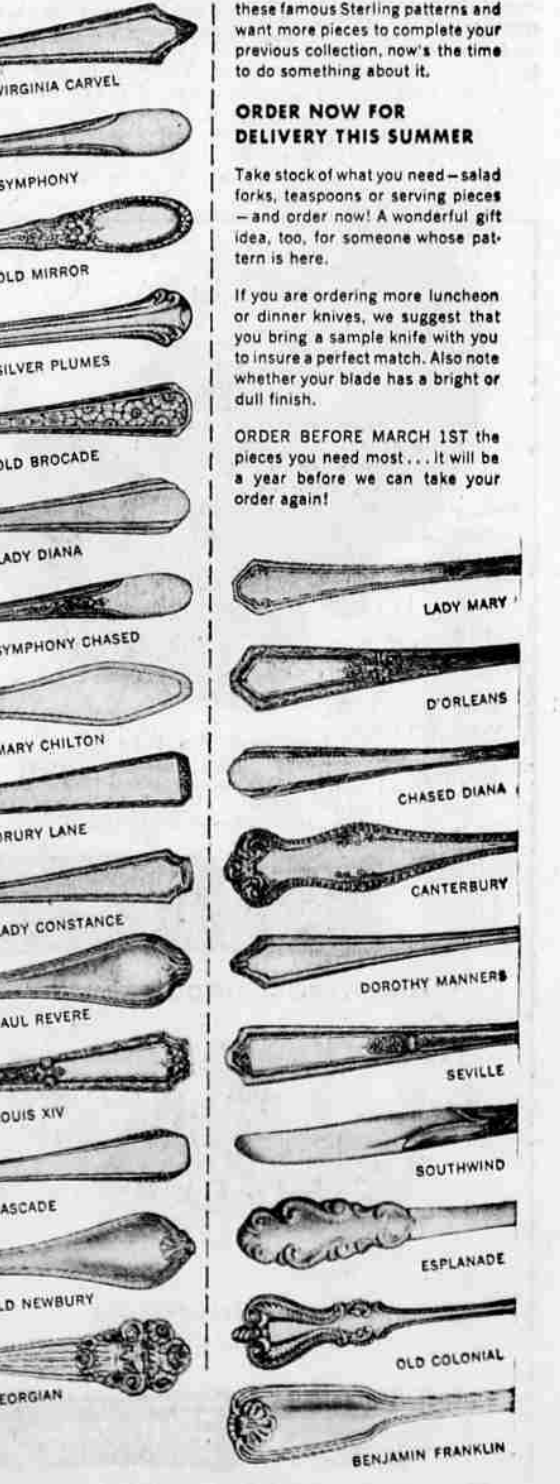
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Canton Crater Installation
