

KU Matmen Suffer Defeat At Medford

MEDFORD (Special) — Friday, for the first time in the history of wrestling competition between Medford and Klamath Union High School, the Black Tornado squad handed a Pelican crew a defeat.

The Pels, who led going into the final two bouts on the varsity card by a score of 21-13, saw a pair of consecutive pin victories scored by the Medfordites prove their 23-21 undoing.

Chuck Holt, a Medford 177 pounder, picked up the Tornado's first pin of the match when he nailed Klamath's Sam Henzel in 1:24 of the third round. Following his victory, heavyweight Chuck Shaw repeated the process on KU's Charleton Currin, stopping him in :52 seconds of the third, and the damage was done.

The only salvation of a day that eventually saw four squads of Pelican athletes lose contests to the Medfordites, was the Pel Jayvee wrestlers' 36-32 conquest of the Medford Juniors. In the evening the KU Wildcates, the Junior Varsity and the Varsity Pelican basketball teams went down to successive defeats.

When asked for a comment at

ter the varsity wrestlers' loss, coach DeLance Duncan stated wryly, "No comment."

He did note that Billy O'Neil, who represented KU in the 157 pound class, did a commendable job in decisioning Bill Charley of Medford, 4-0. Others drawing praise included Milo Crumrine who decisioned Clay Varney in the 106 pound class; and Art Mills, 168, who earned a 2-0 decision over Medford's Bob Rix.

The Pelican grapplers won five of the 12 matches and accepted draws in a pair of bouts. The only Whitebird pin was credited to Larry Wishart who nailed Larry Gunn in 1:44 of the second.

Duncan was impressed with the showing of the junior varsity squad which compiled its victory by winning 10 of 18 matches, three of which were pins scored by Gary Bishop, 123; Dale Crumrine, 140; and Steve Shults, 167.

The Tech squad won the first five bouts on the Friday card before the 'Jacks cracked the scoreboard with a pin, the first of two they were to get for the night. Their only other triumph was a decision won by California state 177 pound ex-prep champion Allen Hagerstrand over the Owls' Wendell Winterbottom, also a state title holder. Although the Hornet squad led the entire action they came close to blowing it in the final minute of the game when the invaders came within an ace of knotting the count. However, the stingy Hornet defense held, and a two-painter with seven seconds left put the contest on ice.

The Hornets jumped off to an early first quarter lead of 19-9 and stretched it into a five-point margin at the half. However, Phoenix came back strong in the third quarter which ended 32-30 in the Hornets' favor. The victorious quint applied rigid ball control and held down the pesky visitors for the eventual win.
