Owls Nab 65-54 Friday Victory

Friday night the Owls went on a 21-point scoring spree in the first 12 minutes of the second half to overcome an intermission 36-33 deficit, and even though they slowed down in the final eight minutes of the scrap they never had to look back. The Portlanders who could collect only three field goals while Owls Dennis McKee, Paul Layher and Leon Wilson were so busy scoring, struggled up from 16 points short to narrow the lead to the final 65-54 count.

Although the Technicians outshot the Vikings 21-18 from the field over the distance, an outstanding 23 for 26 at the foul line was highly valuable in their big win. The Owls shot 11 straight free throws before making one of their three misses.

McKee, who hit seven field goals at a near 500 clip, added six successes in seven tries from the

foul line for the game high of 20 points. Layher, whose fabulous rebounding was a huge factor in the win, collected 10 points off four from the floor and 2-3 gifties. Wilson, Gene Branson and Troy Kooztz were next for the Owls with nine markers apiece, while Jack Horton, the Owls' number two rebounder with seven, added eight points.

Layher pulled in 12 defensive and six offensive rebounds to lead the Technicians to a backboard total of 48 while allowing the Vikings 27.

Portland State's high scoring Don Bridges, a slashing 5-9 guard, was second only to McKee in the scores column. He hit six of 14 tries from the field and 3-4 at the foul line. Bob Grant, the other front court Viking, hit for nine points and topped the PSC rebounders with six.

Both clubs started off red hot from the field, each scoring three

for three in the first minute and a half of play. Troy Kooztz scored the first Owl two-pointer and Bridges hit the Viks' first tally. The game was tied eight times during the first canto.

The Portland quintet held a 26-23 margin with four minutes left in the half but the Owls trimmed the bulk with a perfect 7-7 free tosses and field goals by Branson and Layher.

In the second half the Viks blew as cold as the Owls did hot.

T-Birds Fall To Papooses

CHILQUIN (Special) — The Thunderbirds struggled a hard-fought cage drizzle to Toppish, Washington, here Friday, 86-69, in a game which saw Tim Foster, the

Lose Lead In Third

Pelicans Scare Tornado, Before Losing Out 50-43

MEDFORD — For the second

time in as many starts the state's number two prep basketball team, the Medford Prep Tornado, got scared about halfway out of its equipment before finally managing to keep an undefeated Southeastern Oregon Conference skunk alive.

Friday night the Klamath Union Pelicans grabbed on to a lead when the game was six minutes old and held it until the third quarter was nearly over before finally losing 50-43 on the Hedrick Court.

The last time out the Medfordites had to burst into a brilliant last quarter spree to put down the Grants Pass Cavemen.

A rugged Pelican defense virtually nipped Medford's usually high-scoring Jerry Anderson to the floor, allowing him only eight points, and slowed the Big Wind to a whisper most of the distance.

At the close of the first stanza, after pulling away from an 8-8 tie with five minutes gone, the Pels were on top 16-12. They broke even with the Tornado in the second canto, managing a couple of six points leads before the intermission which ended 30-26 for KU.

Medford, capitalizing on a rash of fouls and an expert center tip

by Anderson, knotted the count 30-all after four minutes. From here on some offensive mistakes held the Pelicans back but the defense was still highly effective and the Medford squad got no farther away than the 50-41 count when there was 1:30 left to play.

Although the Pelicans couldn't buy a basket in the early part of the second half, they got little chance to shoot in the final minutes since Medford went into a ball-control, front court stall for better than half the final period.

Although the Pels went into the game short the services of two regulars, the Medford staff tactics served as a tribute to the Pelican squad that had been able to make the trip.

The five starters, Steve Binney, Paul Bishop, Deane Dunson, Bruce Brickner and Gary Patzke, went the entire distance without relief until the final 35 seconds of the game.

Bishop, who hit five jumpers in the first half, was the top scorer of the night with 16 points. Medfordites Lowell Dean and Dick Ragsdale were next with 13 each.

KU's Bruce Brickner and Medford's Booth Deakins were next with nine apiece.

Binney, who hit three field goals and a foul shot in the first half, was next with seven, although he failed to count in the last two

quarters. Patzke hit six for the Pels while Dunson, who was a shade off in his timing, added five.

Medford had the edge on the boards, collecting 36 rebounds to 31 for KU. Dean topped them all with 14 while Brickner and Bishop were next with 10 each.

The Pelicans hit 17 of 56 field-goal tries while the Tornado scored on 15 of 53 shots. The Pels, who had a little difficulty reaching the 1-1 free throw situation, scored nine of 12 tries. Medford counted 16 for 24.

In the Jayvee game the Pel juniors, despite 15 and 14-point efforts by Kent Hunsaker and Bob Lapsley, fell 37-39 to the Little Winds.

California Park Commission Adds Squaw Valley To System

SQUAW VALLEY, Calif. (UPI) — The California Park Commission voted Friday in favor of bringing Squaw Valley in to the state park system.

Members of the commission also laid long range plans to acquire ski lifts owned by the resort's president Alex Cushing, who was responsible for bringing the Olympics to the area.

During the all day session, the commission computed the annual operating costs of the area at "about" \$140,000.

"We have found that the operation of Squaw Valley as a state park will be much less expensive than most of our other parks," said Alfred Stern, commission member from Atherton. "Where we usually get back only 28 per cent of the costs of operation, at Squaw Valley we should get a return of 50 to 60 per cent," he added.

The commissioners said they hoped to acquire additional land and properties in the area.

The commission said the gross operating costs of the ski area were estimated at about \$400,000 a year. They said the income was expected to be about \$350,000, leaving a net operating expense of \$40,000. They stated this was much less than other state parks.

Commission Chairman J. R. Yreka (Special) — Billy Wilson, the talented 6-foot 6-inch center of the Yreka Miners, celebrated his 18th birthday by pouring in 40 points in leading his club to a 76-30 shellacking over Dunsmuir here Friday. The victory was the 17th in a row for the high flying Miners.

The Tigers made a valiant effort in the initial period and were trailing by a mere three points, 13-10. But in the second stanza Wilson and company settled down and racked up a comfortable 31-12 halftime lead. The torrid scoring pace set by the Miners never eased up, and the third frame ended 51-19.

The Yreka five was exceptionally hot from the field, as they connected for 33-79 field goals and 10-23 free throws. The Dunsmuir quintet hit 12-38 field goals and 6-13 from the foul line.

Wilson's 40 points was collected during 28 minutes of playing time. Dave Jordan was the Tigers leading point gatherer with eight.

Ryan Suffers Sprain, Decided By Rory

NEW YORK (AP) — Did he fall or was he pushed? The answer to that question about Rory Calhoun's sixth round "knockdown" of Billy Ryan was more interesting than the fact that Calhoun won a unanimous 10-round decision.

Ryan, nursing a swollen right ankle in his dressing room, claimed he wasn't knocked down. "It was no knockdown," he said. "I was pulling away from his right hand and twisted my ankle."

Dr. Harry Kleiman of the New York State Athletic Commission said Ryan had suffered a "bad sprain."
