

Partisans See Johnson Win

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Can Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson win enough national convention support from the big, pivotal states to capture his party's presidential nomination? Democrats who want to nominate him for the presidency do not yet have a convincing answer to this question.

However, Johnson partisans believe he can manage a civil rights bill this year so deftly that he will win applause from such politically important states as New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois and California. And they believe he can do so without offending the South, where he must look for his basic strength.

America Rules Turbits Roost

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans apparently have forged ahead of the British in a field where they once ruled the roost—in turbits.

A turbit is a pigeon. But it is not an ordinary sort of pigeon. The new variety is reared by foster parents. Because the turbit normally has a very short beak, the young bird can't insert its beak into that of its parent to get food as the ordinary pigeon baby does.

So breeders mate two turbits and two long-beaked birds of another breed at the same time. When the eggs are laid, the breeders switch them. This long-beaked parents bring up the turbits and short-beaked turbit parents bring up the long-beaked youngsters.

The turbit, a hard bird to breed, got started about two or three centuries ago and was highly developed in England in the last century.

But according to the top turbit breeder in the country, in the last 50 or 60 years the Americans have changed the bird, using different standards from the English.

"We feel we've gone way ahead of them," said Philip L. Roof of nearby Hyattsville, Md.

Roof is executive assistant to the architect of the United States Capitol, a building with a few pigeon problems.

Roof isn't exactly enthusiastic about the common old type of pigeon. They're the same the world over, he said, from the U.S. Capitol dome to the sun-baked village squares of India.

But show birds—that's another matter.

Roof has been breeding turbits for 20 years and has won the grand national championship for the last 10 or 11 years except one year when he was a judge.

He raises about 100 young birds a year and says he knows them all individually, even from their coos if he can't see them.

Cops Speechless

PICKED WRONG SPOT

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI)—John Edgar, 42, said he felt ill after a salesman's party and stopped his car "to sleep it off." Edgar didn't realize that the spot he picked was in front of the Wimbledon police station. He was fined \$70 on a charge of drunk driving.

As a Texan, Johnson still wears a southern label unacceptable to many Democrats outside the South. But he is usually rated as a liberal among southerners and as a middle-of-the-roader in the entire spectrum of the Democratic Party.

Although he is not a declared candidate, Democrats generally expect him to make a serious bid for the nomination. His congressional mentor and fellow Texan, Speaker Sam Rayburn, is in command of a Johnson-for-president campaign.

Unless his southern strength slips away before convention time Johnson can hope for a bloc of about 400 delegate votes, including support from border and western mountain states. Only Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) appears to have hopes for a larger bloc.

The majority vote needed to win the nomination will be 761.

Woman Rescues Neighbor Family

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—"It was what anyone with her own children would have done," said a housewife after leading six neighbor children to safety from their burning home.

Lula Mae Cross's son, Billy Joe, spotted the smoke and flames billowing from the frame home Sunday.

"I knew there were children in there, so I went around to the back and opened the kitchen door," said Mrs. Cross, 32.

"The front of the home was a wall of flames and the kitchen was full of smoke. I saw the kids hiding in a corner and picked up the babies and herded them all over to my house."

The youngsters' mother, Mrs. Leslie Broussard, said she was away from home borrowing money from another neighbor.

The Negro woman said she was unemployed and that her husband was in California.

Mrs. Cross, who is white, kept the children in her home until their mother returned. The fire gutted the front of the house.

General Shows Some Recovery

NEW YORK (UPI)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur, hospitalized with a urinary disorder, is feeling better. He has been sitting in an armchair enjoying an occasional game of parchisi with his wife.

The five-star general, who was taken to Lenox Hill Hospital Jan. 29, has shown gradual but steady improvement in the past week.

MacArthur will undergo surgery to correct his prostate condition when further laboratory tests show he has overcome the infection and kidney involvement caused by the urinary block.

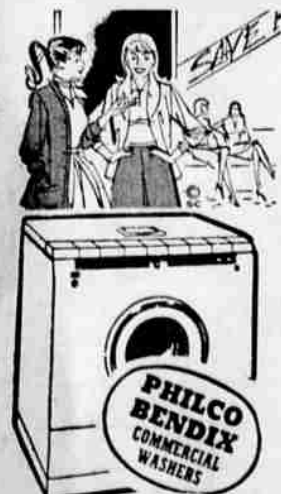
BATH BOWS OUT

Storm Kills 3 Students

SILVERTON, Tex. (AP)—The bodies of three Texas Tech students, missing four days, were found in rugged country near here Sunday by a search party.

The trio last Wednesday told friends at the Lubbock, Tex., college, 80 miles southwest of here, that they planned a field trip into the canyons along the Cap Rock escarpment of northwest Texas.

They said they would collect wildlife specimens and return that night. But a snowstorm swept the area Wednesday night and continued into Thursday. The snow quickly melted.

All three of the youths died of exposure, but County Judge J. W. Lyons, acting as coroner, said John P. Arden, 21, of Waxahachie, Tex., suffered a fractured skull in a fall from a cliff before dying.

The other students were Kelton R. Conner Jr., 21, of Dallas, and Robert A. Keplinger, 21, of Waxahachie. Conner was a student of Texas wildlife who made frequent expeditions into the Cap Rock country to collect zoology and biology exhibits. Keplinger and Arden were engineering students.

A rancher found their locked car Saturday, 18 miles north of here on the edge of the Cap Rock, of the Texas Panhandle.
