

# Jealous Swain Stabs Woman

SANTA ANA, Calif. (UPI) — A jealous suitor fatally stabbed a 28-year-old mother 43 times before the eyes of two of her small children and a baby sitter Monday and then said the Lord's Prayer over the dead woman's body, sheriff's deputies reported.

Mike Bufarale, 33, of National City, Calif., surrendered meekly after the slaying of Mrs. Joan M. Moore, Garden Grove, Calif., and was booked on suspicion of murder.

The slaying took place a block from the main entrance of busy El Toro Marine Base after Bufarale forced Mrs. Moore's car to the side of the road.

He leaped from his own auto, pulled open the door of Mrs. Moore's car and repeatedly stabbed her with a green-handled six-inch knife.

# Loss Of House Causes Suicides

NEW YORK (AP) — Ten bank books showing deposits totaling \$62,000 have been found in the modest apartment of two spinster sisters who hanged themselves rather than move out.

The sisters — Helen and Margaret Horvath — were found hanging in their apartment Saturday. They were clad in black, turn-of-the-century clothes. Their Old-fashioned china and crystal were carefully packed away.

The bank books, found Sunday, led police to theorize there might be even more wealth in the apartment. They continued their search.

# Graham Visits Tiny Village

NUGU, Nigeria (AP) — Billy Graham brings his crusade to this capital of eastern Nigeria today after successful meetings in the predominantly Moslem northern provinces.

In one tiny mud-hut village in the north the 6-foot American evangelist preached in a makeshift church with a straw roof so low he had to crouch.

Graham was told by the chief that rival tribesmen had attacked the village only a few days before and demanded the villagers burn down the church and give up their homes.

The chief, a Christian, defied the invaders and told them, "Take our food and burn down the village but do not take Christ from us."

Graham sang hymns with the villagers and in his sermon said, "Lord bless this brave village, its people and its homes."

During the nine-day crusade in northern Nigeria, Graham's aides said more than 7,500 Africans rededicated themselves to Christ and about 2,000 others, including Moslems and pagans, made first-time decisions.

# Arab States Hold Meeting

CAIRO (UPI) — The foreign ministers of eight Arab states meet today to discuss "the Palestine problem" and Israel's intention to divert waters of the Tiber Jordan to irrigate the Negev Desert.

Arab observers said it was possible the Arab League meeting would set in motion plans to organize a "Palestine army" from among the ranks of Arab refugees from Israel.

The meeting of the Arab states, planned last September, took on extra importance today because of recent clashes along the Syrian-Israeli border. It was reported that United Arab Republic and Israeli troops continued to mass along the demilitarized zone frontiers.

# Hawaiian Pit Oozes Lava

PAHOA, Hawaii (UPI) — Molten lava began oozing out of famed Halemauiau fire pit in Kilauea Volcano Sunday for the first time in six years, but experts said there was no immediate danger of violent action.

The latest activity occurred several hundred feet below the rim of the crater. It boiled up after the lava flow from the Puna eruption almost ceased.

The Puna eruption, which began on Nov. 14, stopped for about eight hours Saturday. Then a lone fountain began shooting lava about 100 feet into the air.

The present fire pit activity is at the same place a photographer was killed in 1924 when a steam explosion threw huge boulders into the air.

# Fire Damages Heppner Inn

HEPPNER (AP) — Fire severely damaged the Heppner Hotel Sunday night. The building was saved, but the hotel knocked out of operation until repairs are made.

There was no immediate estimate of the amount of loss. The fire broke out about 9:30 p.m., routing occupants from the three-story, 48-room hotel. Flames burned the stairwell and ate into a half-dozen rooms. The other rooms suffered smoke and water damage.

No one was injured. The Heppner Fire Department fought the blaze until 1 a.m., getting aid from Lexington and lone fire departments.

The hotel is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Darrell Shei, who bought the building about three months ago. They are former Portlanders.

# Extra-Marital Affairs Related By Dr. Finch

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Dr. R. Bernard Finch, who has admitted being intimate with at least three women prior to the slaying of his estranged wife, today faces prosecution cross-examination about the details of how he killed Mrs. Barbara Jean Finch.

It was romance day at the sensational murder trial Monday and Finch took the occasion to wittily characterize himself as a sophisticated man of the world. The spectators liked his wisecracks about his intimacies with two married women and a divorcee, but whether the jury felt the same appreciation remained to be seen.

The 42-year-old doctor went in to detail about his love affair with Carole Tregoff, 23, his red-haired co-defendant for the murder of Barbara Jean, 36, at the luxurious West Covina home of the Finches last July 18.

Finch admitted without an outward trace of embarrassment previous love affairs with two other women, identified as Mrs. X and Mrs. Y, beginning in 1953. The point made by prosecutor Fred N. Whichello was that, at one time, Finch was cheating both on his wife and a mistress in behalf of Carole.

Today Whichello will attempt to discredit Finch's claim that his wife was killed accidentally after he struggled with her for possession of a gun. Finch testified he wrested the pistol from his wife and that when he threw it away it discharged accidentally and the bullet struck Barbara Jean in the back.

But Monday, romance was the topic and some of the cross-examination went like this: Whichello drew the admission that Finch had sex relations with Mrs. X and Y, both employees at his medical center — as was Carole. The first was married, the second a recent divorcee. Whichello asked the doctor whether he told the first two women he loved them.

"Under those circumstances, I would think it would be the routine thing to do," Finch replied. The courtroom rocked with laughter and Carole smiled.

Whichello asked how often he had sex relations with Mrs. X — once a year, once a week, once a day?

"Well, I know it wasn't once a year and it wasn't once a day," said Finch.

The prosecutor asked him whether he didn't think society — let alone his wife — would disapprove of setting Carole up in an apartment.

"I didn't expect the rest of the world would find out about it the way the rest of the world is now," Finch replied.

Finch has testified he reached an "armistice agreement" with his wife in November, 1956, under which he could do what he liked because of her sexual frigidity, but he admitted his first affair, with Mrs. X, began in 1953.

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# Attorneys Preparing 14th Appeal

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Attorneys for Caryl Chessman today prepared a 14th appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court in an effort to stay the convict — author's execution, scheduled for Feb. 19.

The high court has rejected 13 previous appeals on behalf of the 38-year-old Chessman, who was convicted in Los Angeles in 1948 on 17 charges of robbery, kidnaping and rape.

Attorney George T. Davis said he planned to file a motion with the Supreme Court by Thursday for an original writ of habeas corpus and stay of execution.

He added that by Monday he would ask the California Supreme Court to exercise its pardoning power, which includes the power to commute a sentence.

Davis announced his intentions just hours after a federal judge in Tucson, Ariz., denied Chessman's latest bid to sidestep his eighth execution date with the gas chamber in San Quentin Prison.

Chessman has managed to avoid seven previous dates through legal maneuvers during his 11 1/2 years on Death Row.

Monday's denial by chief Judge Richard H. Chambers of the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals was one of the most forceful. The judge described Chessman as "an arrogant, truculent man spewing vitriol on one persons after another."

Chambers also criticized Federal Judge Louis N. Goodman for a report that he suggested Chessman should receive executive leniency.

Goodman was said to have made the suggestion to California Gov. Edmund Brown in San Francisco last week.

FDR JR. BACKS KENNEDY  
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) won a declaration of presidential support Monday from Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., son of the late president. Roosevelt, a former congressman, said Kennedy "is a winner."

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
