## Marshfield, Tornado, KU Rank 1-2-3

With the Class A-1 tournament at Eugene five weeks away, Marshfield and Medford appear solidly established as the favorites for the Oregon high school basketball championship.

They remained overwhelming choices today as the No. 1 and No. 2 teams in the Associated Press poll after two more victories each last weekend.

Marshfield, finalist in the tournament last year, disposed of North Bend and North Eugene to extend its undefeated string to 15 games. It was ranked No. 1 by 13 of the 15 sports writers and broadcasters who voted in the poll.

Medford was decisively second after sweeping a pair from Klamath Falls, still ranked No. 3, and Central Point.

Cleveland, which strengthened its hold on first place in the Portland league with two more victories, holds down fourth place again. And Hermiston clings to the No. 5 spot after two more week-end wins.

La Grande, No. 6 last week, has to share the spot this time with Springfield, which advanced a notch from seventh. Both teams won twice last Friday and Saturday.

South Eugene jumped two rungs, from 10th to No. 8, after two victories. One of them was by a three-point margin over Roseburg, which retains its No. 9 rating.

North Bend slipped from eighth to No. 10 spot after losses to Marshfield and Springfield.

The also-ran list is topped by such pre-season favorites as South Salem and Jefferson, the 1959 Portland league champion.

## Illini Vote Puts Crusher On Bowl Pact

CHICAGO (AP)—Chances of another Rose Bowl tieup involving the Big Ten appear dead following Illinois' vote against a new contract.

Illinois' decision Monday night was believed the decisive one, killing all chances of renewing the New Year's Day football series. Five schools are for renewal and five against in a matter which needs a majority vote.

Illinois, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Ohio State have announced their stand against the post-season game. Northwestern has voted against it in the past and is expected to do so again.

One Northwestern spokesman put it this way: "We've always been against and there is no indication at all that it will be otherwise."

Hopes for continuing the series were revived last month when the Big Ten decided at a joint meeting of athletic directors and faculty representatives to renew an other vote after possible renewal of the series was killed in a 5-5 deadlock last spring.

But with the founding of the Athletic Assn. of Western Universities to replace the Pacific Coast Conference, a new invitation was extended to the Big Ten to continue playing in the Rose Bowl. Michigan State, Michigan, Purdue, Indiana and Iowa are in favor of continuing the series. However, there are indications Iowa will swing against it another vote is taken at the school.

Another pair of Kingsley Field intramural basketball teams fell by the wayside after losing Monday night tournament battles.

## Squaw Valley Site Damaged By Rain

SQUAW VALLEY, Calif. (AP)—Snow at a critical hour averted possible disaster at this site of the Winter Olympic Games. Yet a threat remained today.

Should temperatures climb above freezing, flood danger could return.

A blizzard raged through Squaw Valley Monday, but shortly after the danger of flooding and damage to ski race courses became critical, rain turned to snow and the threat subsided. Temperatures had dipped just enough—to 32 degrees, the freezing point. Rain melts snow with a resulting runoff of both.

Early in the day H. D. Thoreau, managing director for the games, stated, "The Squaw Valley site of the VIII Olympic Winter Games is now in serious condition because of the continued unprecedented rain storms in the Sierras. All possible measures are being taken to protect the Olympic facilities from the potential damage."

Protective measures helped but nature provided the real answer when temperatures dropped in early afternoon and snow fell.

Still the compacted snow parking pad was nearly washed out and some ski runs were damaged. Trees crashed down in winds ranging from 50 miles an hour in the valley to 100 miles per hour on the peaks.

Located in a relatively isolated area 200 miles east of San Francisco and 40 miles west of Reno in the High Sierra, Squaw Valley is surrounded by 9,000-foot mountain peaks.

## Big 'O' Won't Quit, Drills Hoop For 62

There's one thing about Cincinnati's Oscar Robertson — he just doesn't know when to leave the record books alone.

Take Monday night. The Big O, who already is college basketball's all-time scorer, hit a personal all-time high with 62 points against

North Texas State, as the top-ranked Bearcats now 18-1, easily won, 123-74.

That raised his career total to 2,662 as he continues to improve on the old mark of 2,587, which he broke last Saturday night. Now he seems intent on seeing to it that no one is going to break his for a long time.

The Big O's giant-sized output also broke the Missouri Valley single game mark of 57, by Oklahoma State's Bob Kurland, in 1946. In addition, Robby's 23 field goals improved his own personal record by one and his total points broke his previous high of 36 against Arkansas in 1958.

Robertson's tremendous performance overshadowed another fine job by West Virginia's Jerry West, who scored 33 points in leading the Mountaineers
