SALEM (AP) — Col. William C. Ryan, secretary of the state Board of Control, announced today he would retire March 15.

The board named Julius N. Peet, 34, assistant secretary since last September, to succeed Ryan. Peet, a graduate of the University of Iowa after he served three years in the Navy, has worked for the state since 1952.

Nikita Leaves Moscow For Journey To India

MOSCOW (AP) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev took off today for visits to India and three other Asian countries, trying to build up Soviet prestige and to match the impression President Eisenhower made in the area.

Khrushchev, members of his family and a group of top Soviet officials boarded the big turboprop Ilyushin airliner after greeting diplomats and some 300 Muscovites who braved bitter cold weather to see them off.

Khrushchev's plane was to refuel in Tashkent, then fly over the Hindu Kush and Himalaya mountains to land in balmy New Delhi Thursday morning.

Khrushchev made no departure speech. Muffled in a heavy black coat, Astrakhan collar and fur hat, he turned and waved before entering the cabin of the plane, the last to board.

SEEK SPACE TRIP

LONDON (UPI) — A Russian woman scientist Alla Masevich, said Friday more than 15,000 persons had written to the Soviet government from all parts of the world asking to be shot into space in a Russian rocket.

Mrs. Khrushchev, who is not going on this trip, was not seen among the wellwishers at the flag-decked airfield.

With Khrushchev were his two daughters, Julia and Rada, and the latter's husband, Alexei Adzhubei, editor of the government newspaper Izvestia. He was also accompanied by a granddaughter, Julia, whose father was killed in World War II.

Also in the party were Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, Culture Minister Nikolai Mikhailov; Georgi Zhukov, chairman of the Committee for Cultural Relations with Foreign Countries; Semyon A. Skachkov, chairman of a similar committee dealing with economic relations and foreign aid, and Pavel Satukov, editor of the Soviet Communist party newspaper Pravda.

Khrushchev will remain in India until next Tuesday, then push on to Burma for a brief stop. On Feb. 18 he goes to Indonesia, where he is expected to spend a week before returning home with a stopover in Afghanistan.

The Soviet press has been full of articles for the past two months

telling how much aid the Soviet Union has given to India.

Without comparing Soviet aid with the more extensive help given by the United States, the Soviet government has made a great show of steel mills, chemical plants and oil refineries built or planned for India with Soviet help.

But the visit to India will pose problems for Khrushchev. Indian officials feel he is the only one who could induce China to give ground in the bitter dispute over the frontier between India and Tibet. This is expected to be one of the main topics Prime Minister

Nehru will take up with his Soviet guest.

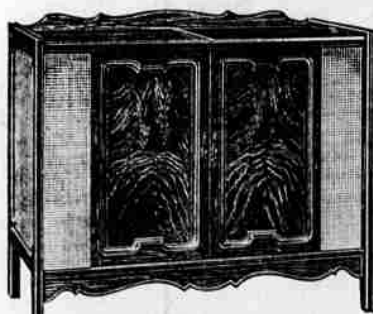
