## Strike Begins Fourth Month

PORTLAND (AP) — The Portland newspaper strike entered its fourth month today with no end in sight.

The Oregonian and the Oregon Journal continued to publish a joint edition at The Oregonian plant with non-union help.

The unions continued to picket the plant.

The strike started Nov. 10 with the stereotypers walking out when negotiations failed to produce an agreement two months after expiration of their contract. Little progress has been reported in mediation sessions since. No meeting between the two parties has been held in some time. None is scheduled.

Other unions refused to cross the picket line and several have declared a strike of their own as their contracts expired.

The strike has idled 850 union members.

APL Secretary-Treasurer Vincent J. Murphy attacked GOP-introduced legislation which would block benefits to women who become unemployed because of pregnancy, childbirth or miscarriage.

NEWARK, N. J. (UPI) — The state AFL Sunday accused Republican state senators of being "officially opposed to motherhood."

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UPI) — It was "looking at girls" that started the trouble for Aaron Artson.

That's what Artson, 29, said he was doing when he made an illegal turn and was picked up by a traffic policeman. Police then discovered while checking his records that Artson had accumulated 14 traffic citations since Dec. 5.

Artson was sentenced to 30 days in jail and fined \$140.

YREKA — The State Judicial Council has appointed Judge George Tyler of the Yreka Judicial District Court acting Siskiyou County Superior Court judge from February 10 through March 3 during the absence of Judge James M. Allen from the Superior Court bench.

Judge Tyler will attend normal routine judicial matters in the county superior court in addition to whatever cases Judge Allen may assign to him.

ONE LOOK TOO MANY

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Northwest and Pan American for a substantial portion of the increases in air transportation between the Pacific Northwest and Hawaii.

The Hawaii lieutenant governor said the Pacific Northwest air route now provides 18 per cent of all Hawaii visitors, against 13 per cent in 1951.

"Diversification of Hawaii's economy requires maximum development of our tourist market," he said. "We are investing millions of dollars in new hotels and other facilities, and we are dependent in great part on air transportation to make these investments produce ..."

"It seems axiomatic to me that with two carriers promoting tourism out of the Pacific Northwest, far greater development will be accomplished than if the service is left in the hands of one carrier."

Rep. Pelly cited figures showing that passenger traffic between the Pacific Northwest and Hawaii had increased 600 per cent since service was inaugurated in 1948. In comparison, he said, domestic traffic generally has increased 200 per cent and California-Hawaii traffic 250 per cent.

Pelly said adoption of the examiner's recommendation would be a retrogressive step in another sense, cutting Seattle off of Pan American's Australia-London global route.

Washington and Lt. Gov. James Keoloha of Hawaii were among those asking for reversal of a CAB examiner's recommendation that Northwest Airlines be given the Seattle-Portland to Honolulu route exclusively and that the temporary operating authority of Pan American World Airways be terminated.

Examiner Ferdinand D. Moran concluded that both airlines were losing money on the route.

Also urging that both airlines be given permanent operating authority on the route were Sens. Hiram L. Fong (R-Hawaii) and Oren E. Long (D-Hawaii), Reps. Daniel K. Inouye (D-Hawaii) and Thomas M. Pelly (R-Wash.) and Mayor Gordon Clinton of Seattle.

Hawaii's spokesmen emphasized that the islands are uniquely dependent upon air transportation for economic growth, and credited 10 years of competition between

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
