KU Treks To Bend For Test

There hasn't even been time for the usual intersquad competition for berths on the varsity wrestling squad this week since the Klamath Union High wrestling team has been so busy correcting the mistakes, both mental and physical, committed last weekend when they were dumped by the Medford Black Tornado.

The defeat, the first in the history of competition between the two schools, left a definite impression on the KU team, especially as outlined by disappointed Pel coach DeLance Duncan.

This weekend the Whitebears get an opportunity to redeem themselves when they travel to Bend for a Saturday match with the Lava Bears.

Although paper comparisons show the Pelicans with a definite edge over the Bears, Duncan is reserving any optimism for after the matches. "Sure, our boys can win it, but whether they do or not remains to be seen."

This afternoon the team will get around, ultimately, after some more workouts, to deciding who will fill varsity slots. The choosing should be completed Friday afternoon.

The Saturday bout is slated to begin at 1:30 p.m. in Bend.

Houston Closer To Major Status

Cus D'Amato Rapped

Ingo-Floyd Rematch Day Of Decision Due

NEW YORK (UPI)—Today may be the "day of decision" for the Ingemar Johansson-Floyd Patterson heavyweight title fight.

Officials of Feature Sports Inc., expect to receive its long-awaited promoting license from the New York State Athletic Commission.

If they don't get the license today, they'll begin planning a shift to some other city, it was learned.

Feature Sports applied for a promoter's license more than a month ago so that the return Johansson-Patterson fight could be staged at the Polo Grounds on June 22.

Final, way-clearing action was expected today at (1) the offices of State Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz, and (2) at the athletic commission.

The attorney general's office was expected to announce an arrangement whereby Floyd Patterson Enterprises, Ltd.—which holds the return-bout rights to television, radio and movies—will transfer those rights to Feature Sports, Inc., (as a controlling agent at least) so that the rights may be put up for open bidding by television companies.

Johansson and the commission and the attorney general's office have been demanding open bidding. Feature Sports wanted it, also, but not if any more time were required in getting it.

Meanwhile, the attorney general's office scored a victory over one stockholder on Floyd Patterson Enterprises, when Cus D'Amato—de-licensed manager of ex-champion Patterson—was found guilty Wednesday in special sessions court of failing to obey a subpoena.

Sentencing was set for April 8, and his \$2,500 bail was continued. D'Amato, whose license already was revoked by the commission, faces penalties ranging up to one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

He and his attorneys announced immediately they will file an appeal to the appellate division of the New York Supreme Court.

After two days of trial, he was found guilty by three judges of failing to answer a subpoena from the state attorney general's office on Nov. 18 for questioning in connection with allegedly monopolistic contracts for last year's Johansson-Patterson fight and for the return bout.

Fred Spiegelberg, football coach at Medford High School, was named man of the year in Oregon sports by the association.

Spiegelberg's team last year beat Jefferson of Portland for the Class A-1 Oregon High School football title.

Dick Hosking, Washington State University Northern Division swim champion, and Jerry Staley, Chicago White Sox pitcher, were named award winners for Southwest Washington.

The late Vernon Gilmore, Salen, was honored for his outstanding community playground youth work. His son accepted the award.

Sid Milligan, Eugene, was cited for his efforts to promote golf throughout Oregon. He is the University of Oregon golf coach.

The Henley Hornets finally broke over the .500 mark for the first time this season following their 62-51 victory over Sacred Heart of the County B League last Tuesday evening. The Hornets have won their last four ball games, and success is largely due to the tremendous scoring and defensive prowess of Ray Jackson. OTI Faces Clark JC, Vikings

The undefeated Oregon Tech Owl wrestling squad heads north Friday morning for what may well be the toughest matches it has encountered yet in its youthful mat program. Friday afternoon the OTI groaners cross the Columbia for a set of bouts with little known Clark Junior College, then return to Portland where they tangle with the powerful Portland State Vikings on Saturday afternoon.

The Techmen, winners over Southern Oregon College and Humboldt State in their only other decided underdogs in Portland State action since the Vikings, perennially a mat power, are ranked high among Pacific Coast Colleges.

Last year in Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Association competition the Viks were second only to the powerful Oregon State Beavers.

The Clark JC squad is a relative unknown so far as the 1960 schedule goes. They were scheduled against Oregon College some time ago but it is thought that the match was postponed because of storm conditions at the time.

Making up the eight-man traveling squad are Owls John Weaver, 177 and Lyle Fowler who will handle the heavyweight assignment. Gary Gathright, 147, may make the trip as an alternate.

Weaver, Kubesch and Williams have scored eight points each so far; Shamion has seven. Winterbottom, Fowler and McNe have five while Gathright and Spence each have picked up one in the previous matches. A total of 10 is necessary over the short OTI schedule in order that the wrestlers may earn a letter.

Portland boasts a pair of unbeaten threats in the persons of Martin Larsen, 157 pounds, and heavyweight Chuck Cassidy, a massive 6-5, 240-pounder. Fowler, his opponent, will weigh in at approximately 190.

The Owl team will return home Sunday.

Wilt The Still All Shook Up

An injury to scoring ace Wilt Chamberlain has the Philadelphia Warriors hurting all over today.

"We're just going to have to wait on the doctors' report before we know when or how much he can play," said General Manager Eddie Gottlieb after Chamberlain was knocked out of Wednesday night's 125-117 loss to the New York Knickerbockers at Madison Square Garden. "All we know now is that he was pretty well shaken up."

Chamberlain, the 7-foot, 2-inch whiz who snapped the National Basketball Association's single-season scoring record Tuesday night, was injured when accidentally struck in the mouth by New York forward Willie Naulls' elbow. Wilt fuzzily took the two free throws coming to him but then retired from the game just before the end of the first period after scoring five points.

Also in the NBA, a last-second field goal by Larry Costello climaxed a drive in which the Syracuse Nationals overcame a 16-point deficit in 6½ minutes to beat the Minneapolis Lakers, 110-109, in the first game of the Garden doubleheader.

Toronto Fans Applaud Kelly

TORONTO (UPI)—Red Kelly was as "jittery as a rookie" in his first game with the Toronto Maple Leafs.

Acquired from the Detroit Red Wings in one of hockey's most confusing deals, the 32-year-old defenseman was given a tremendous ovation by 14,532 fans Wednesday night at Maple Leaf Gardens when he skated out for his first turn against the Montreal Canadiens.

The Leafs bowed to the defending Stanley Cup champions, 4-2, but it wasn't Kelly's fault. He was all over the ice as Manager Coach Punch Imlach of the Leafs alternated him at defense, left wing and center.

Two goals by ageless Maurice (Rocket) Richard in the second period carried the Canadiens to victory before the season's largest turnout at the Gardens. Ralph Backstrom and Claude Provost also scored for Montreal while Billy Harris tallied both Toronto goals.

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Gene Littler, who generally makes a payday on his visits to Arizona, and Arnold Palmer, the year's top money winner, were the favorites today as the touring professionals teed off in the \$22,500 Phoenix open tournament.

Littler, of Singing Hills, Calif., has won this tournament twice—in 1955 and 1959—and has finished in the money four of the past five years.

Palmer, the 30-year-old stylist from Ligonier, Pa., has pocketed \$15,300 in prize money so far, with \$12,000 coming "for last week's victory in the rich Palm Springs desert classic."

Hex Works On NIT Clubs

Maybe those teams which jumped at the chance to get into the National Invitation Basketball tournament would have been better off waiting until their regular season schedules were further along.

In the past week five teams, Detroit, Providence, Dayton, Memphis State and Villanova, accepted bids to play in next month's NIT in New York.

Then the trouble started. Detroit lost to Toledo 69-61 Saturday. Providence was beaten by St. Bonaventure 90-89 in triple overtime Tuesday. And Wednesday night, Dayton was upset by Duquesne 79-66. Only Villanova and Memphis State have emerged unscathed since saying "okay" to the NIT.

On paper Dayton figured to have an easy time against Duquesne. The Flyers had a 16-3 record. Duquesne had lost seven in a row for a 4-11 mark. However, the Dukes raced to a 40-26 lead at halftime and had no trouble the rest of the way. George Brown paced Duquesne's attack with 22 points.

In other major games, 11th ranked Toledo beat Bowling Green 76-56; Kansas edged Kansas State

64-62 and knocked the Wildcats out of the Big Eight Conference lead; Marquette downed Louisville 78-70 and Maryland nipped Virginia 44-43.

Toledo moved into a tie with Ohio University for the Mid-American Conference lead. The Rockets took the lead for keeps early in the first half and led 35-27 at the intermission. Toledo has a 16-2 record.

Kansas swept to a 20-point first half advantage, but had to beat off a Kansas State rally for its fourth victory in seven conference starts. The setback dropped Kansas State a half game behind Colorado, the big eight leader. Mike Wroblewski of the losers was the game's high scorer with 22 points. Bill Bridges led Kansas with 16.

Maryland beat Virginia Tech at its own slowdown tactics in the first half. However, the Cavaliers moved to within 42-41 in the closing seconds. Then Paul Jelus, Maryland's top scorer, scored on a layup for the clincher. It was Maryland's fifth triumph in eight Atlantic Coast Conference titles. Virginia is 1-8 in the ACC.

Marquette trailed Louisville by eight points in the second half and then scored 12 straight points to take a 65-55 lead. Don Kojis

had 21 points and Walt Mangham 20 for the winners who broke a five-game losing streak and put their season mark at 10-8. Fred Sawyer was Louisville's ace with 29 points.

In a Philadelphia doubleheader, Jack Egan scored 29 points in leading St. Joseph's (Pa.) to a 78-73 victory over St. Peter's of Jersey City, N.J. and Bill Kennedy scored six points in the final two minutes to lead Temple to a 68-60 triumph over Muhlenberg.

Elsewhere, the Feldman twins, Jon and Jeff, scored six of eight overtime points for George Washington to spark a 78-67 victory over Georgetown (DC). Al Butler connected for 39 points as his Niagara team walloped Syracuse 83-64; Washington State beat Montana 74-70 and Arizona defeated New Mexico 64-62.

In other news, New York University accepted an invitation to play in the NCAA tournament. The Violets, 11-3, will play as an at-large representative in a triple header at Madison Square Garden March 8. They will face the Atlantic Coast Conference champion for the right to advance to the next round at Charlotte, N.C. March 11-12 against the Mid-American Conference winner.

A-2 Schools, Six-Man Squads Included On East-West Teams

PENDLETON (AP)—They've gone to bigger schools—and smaller ones—to get players for this year's East-West Shrine all-star football game here.

In the previous eight games, rosters were filled from the outstanding players of Oregon Class B high schools.
