Build Permits Show Decline

Building permits issued in Klamath Falls dropped 34.5 per cent during December compared to December a year ago.

That was announced by the University of Oregon Bureau of Business research.

Permits issued also fell 68.7 per cent during December, compared to November, 1959.

During the month, builders filed for permits to construct \$13,000 worth of new residences compared to \$55,500 the previous month, and \$28,000 during December, 1959. New non-residential construction requested was judged worth \$1,000. Additions, alterations and repairs during December totaled \$19,282.

Total expenditure during December: \$33,282; for November, \$106,525, and for December, 1959, \$50,821. The December, 1959, total for the state was \$17,497,313.

Theft Trial Postponed

The trial of Leonard Thomas Powers, accused of robbing a Medford man of about \$100 at knife-point, has been postponed on further order of the court.

The trial was scheduled for Wednesday but was delayed by the illness of Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg, who has influenza. No definite time has been set for the trial.

Powers, 25, was accused of robbing William Jones and forcing Jones from his car near the Merrill gravel pit December 28.

The district attorney's office has been attempting to locate a witness for the trial, driver of a light colored Ford station wagon who drove Jones into Merrill between 4 and 4:40 that afternoon. The witness should call the district attorney's office, TU 2-3434.

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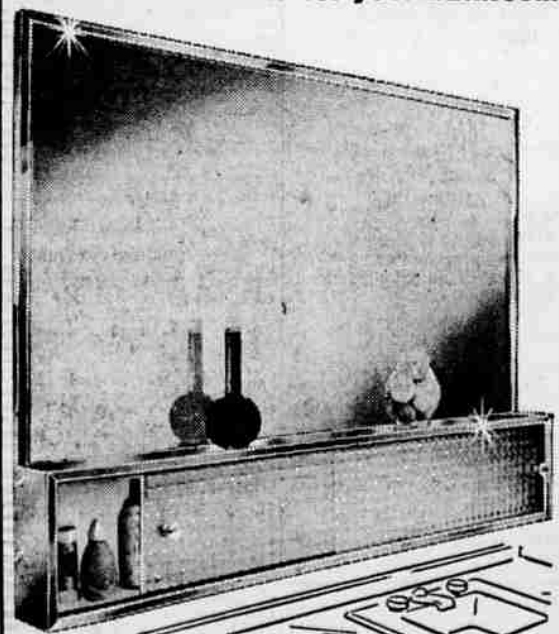
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
