Legal Chief Clarifies Law

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The state is making it clear Caryl Chessman still would be subject to the death penalty if he were retried and convicted of the 1948 Los Angeles kidnap and robbery charges.

Atty. Gen. Stanley Mosk told a joint meeting of Oakland service clubs Wednesday night an amendment to the state kidnap law in no way has changed the penalty for kidnaping involving bodily harm.

Chessman, scheduled to die at San Quentin Feb. 19, is asking federal courts to grant a writ of habeas corpus. The defense has suggested his execution is scheduled under a statute no longer on the books.

The law under which Chessman was convicted still stands with one amendment, Mosk said. "It is still a capital offense to forcibly kidnap a person and to do bodily harm to the person kidnapped."

The amendment, he said, removes a technicality when robbery is involved and does not "affect Chessman's case in any way."

Weekly Paper Appears In NW

PORTLAND (AP) — A new weekly newspaper made its first appearance in Portland today.

It is the Portland Reporter, sponsored by the unions idled by the strike against the Oregon Journal and The Oregonian.

The first issue was an eight-page tabloid. Editor Robert A. Lee said 50,000 copies were printed at a commercial plant. He said he hoped to expand the paper in size and circulation, but said the weekly was not a forerunner of a third daily newspaper.

Lee said it would be produced only until settlement of the strike, which began Nov. 10.

Youngsters Take Tour Of KF Area

Nearly 60 first and second graders from city and county schools got a private tour of the Klamath Falls area in a Southern Pacific Shasta Daylight car Wednesday afternoon.

A crack train crew whisked them gently over "clickless" welded rails to the Car-Ad-Co mill, then south to Midland and back for a ride on a turntable and a guided tour through the roundhouse and the engineer's cab of a diesel locomotive.

They saw the last steam locomotive the line used locally. It hasn't been used in two years, but its boilers are fired up once a week and huge rotary vanes in its nose are kept well oiled for heavy snowplowing duty.

They saw the muscles of a big switch engine, its six cylinders towering six or seven feet.

They saw genuine hobos cooking mulligan near the tracks.

And all but 13 of them were getting their first ride on a train.

They saw all that because they took good care of their teeth during the past year.

The tour was sponsored by the Klamath Dental Society and the County Health Department, and donated by SP.

It was first prize for second graders of Roosevelt, Henley and Fort Klamath schools who proved to examiners that they knew how to brush their teeth better than youngsters in all other second grades in the city and county school districts.

The contest is sponsored annually and prizes are awarded during National Dental Health Week.

Earlier, another second grade from Henley, was awarded a tour through dental offices on South Sixth Street as second prize, and pupils of a second grade at Riverside School each received an apple donated by the Pacific Fruit and Produce Company as third prize.

Some first graders from Roosevelt School accompanied second graders because they study together in the same room, and their teacher didn't want them to feel left out.

Air Building Opens Today

Public use of the first floor of the new terminal building for the municipal airport at Kingsley Field, being completed at a cost of approximately \$120,000, is scheduled for Thursday.

The unofficial opening includes traffic through the fully equipped lobby which faces the landing field, business transactions at offices of West Coast Airlines, the Avis and Hertz car rental headquarters, and the Federal Aviation Agency Maintenance Department.

Also moved from the old terminal building, now being torn down, is the office of Harold G. Jones, airport manager.

The restaurant and lounge on the second floor are still under construction. Opening date for the second floor is set for March 1 by city officials and Mike May who will operate the restaurant.

An official opening date will be set later, following dismantling of the old building, surfacing of the parking area and final work on the new building.

Jury To Mull Slash Case

Robert Huit, a man accused of slugging a police officer with a pocketknife during a traffic arrest, was bound over to the grand jury Wednesday after preliminary hearing in district court.

Two city police officers testified Huit refused to leave a pickup truck parked in the intersection of Main and Seventh streets early January 26. They said Huit attempted to use a 2-month-old baby as a shield.

Defense witnesses said Huit was beaten by at least six police officers using blackjacks. Defense witnesses were Mrs. Lila Amos, Mrs. Thelma Knight, who was with Huit in the truck, and Huit. Mrs. Knight forfeited \$100 bail in district court earlier this week on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon, a .22 revolver.

Huit was bound to the jury on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, and was released on continuing \$1,000 bond. Immediately after the preliminary hearing before Judge D. E. Van Vactor, Huit was arraigned on a charge of driving while his right to apply for an operator's license was suspended. He pleaded not guilty and asked for a trial without jury, scheduled for 10 a.m. February 23.

Officers said Huit was arrested while driving on U.S. 97 January 25, the day before his assault arrest. Records show his driver's license was suspended December 18, 1958, after a drunk driving conviction.

City, County Given Okay By Board

The board of directors of the Klamath Auditorium agreed Wednesday night to okay city-county use of the old armory as a community center.

But the program will not get underway until the fiscal year begins July 1, and some problems must be worked out in the meantime.

The most pressing is the need for a schedule of activities. That will be handled by the Klamath Falls Park and Recreation Department under Director George Price.

Other problems, such as finance and maintenance, probably will be wrapped up soon.

Price, City Manager G. S. Vergeer and other city and county officials met with the armory board. Price and Vergeer informed the board that no detailed schedule of events has yet been worked out.

The board had requested such a schedule during a previous meeting, but Price and Vergeer said the job of compiling such a schedule was impossible in the few weeks since the board first met to discuss the community center proposal.

The motion to grant use of the building, on Main and Spring streets, to the project came from Board Member Hal Ogle.

He represents the county in the five-man board composed of a city councilman, a county commissioner and two others.

Ogle at first stated he feared the county was not being adequately represented. He said he had heard nothing of the community center idea until he read about it.

Vergeer, however, explained that though the idea was first promoted by the park and recreation department, the proposal was brought before both the city council and the county court, and both tentatively budgeted \$1,000 toward the project.

The community center would not be discriminatory toward residents of the county, he stressed, since none of the city's recreational facilities ever have been.

He said, as an instance, that a count of swimmers at the municipal pool one month last summer showed 48 per cent of those using it were from out of town. Moore Park and all other facilities have also been open to anyone without question.

"But we think we ought to get more and better use of all city and county recreational facilities if possible," he added.

The motion was passed unanimously by the board. They all agreed to meet as often as needed to iron out a program. They reserved the right to cancel any community center activities with advance notice to make room for conventions, dances, or other functions the auditorium now accommodates.

The board decided to meet with two members each from Price's department, the city council and the county court. No date was set.

Weyerhaeuser Reflects Gain

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) — Weyerhaeuser Co.'s net income for 1959 amounted to \$60,407,000, a 22 per cent increase over the previous year, but 7 per cent below record earnings of 1958, according to the annual report released Thursday.

Shareholders received dividends of \$1.10, compared with the \$1 payments of the last four years.

The Klamath County treasurer was named to the board of directors, at last summer's convention in Detroit. She will be accompanied to San Diego by her daughter, Mrs. Earl E. Jones.
