

Tourney Plans Set By Chiloquin Jaycees

Plans for the 1960 Elimination and National Invitational All-Indian Basketball tournaments are complete according to an announcement from the Klamath Reservation Jaycees.

The elimination tournament, which is set for February 25, 26 and 27 at the Chiloquin High School gym, is comprised of eight teams, four local and four non-local teams. The top bracket includes the Chiloquin Thunderbirds, Klamath Nation All-Stars, Beatty Lakers and Klamath Agency, who will vie for the local entry in the big March tourney. The non-local teams in the bottom bracket are: Warm Springs, Oregon; LaConner, Washington; Fort Bidwell, California; and the University of Oregon Mudhens, the winner to represent the Northwest in the March Invitational.

Oregon Prep Coaches Quit, Jobs Open

Two Oregon high school football coaches resigned Thursday. Bob Douglas quit as head football coach at Grant High in Portland and Burdette Kindred stepped down from the coaching job at Hood River High School.

Douglas had been head coach at Grant High School since 1953. Although quitting the coaching job, he said he will remain in the Portland school system as a physical education teacher. Douglas was graduated from Willamette University and did graduate work at Oregon State College.

At Hood River, Kindred said he was giving up for reasons of health the head coaching job he held for nine years. Kindred said he will retain his position as athletic director and a teacher at Hood River.

Kindred said that ulcers and the pressure of coaching had forced him to give up the job. In his nine years at Hood River, his teams won 19 games, lost 50 and had 5 ties.

Californians enter '55 Ford With T-Bird Mill At Daytona

DAYTONA BEACH—If faith can be measured in miles, then Rick Henderson has 3,000 miles of it.

That's how far the young NASCAR champion of the Sportsman class drove from San Francisco to the Daytona International Speedway to race in the 250-mile modified-sportsman event on Saturday, February 13.

His faith rests in a car he and his backer, Nelson Kinney, have fashioned from a 1955 Ford chassis and a 1958 Thunderbird motor.

Neither Henderson nor Kinney has any knowledge as to how the modified model — Henderson will race in that category here — will perform over the 2½-mile speedway trial.

That's where the faith comes in. "We finished work on the car at 6:30 in the afternoon," Henderson said, "and at 7 it was on a trailer and headed for Florida by the way of Bakersfield, El Paso, Dallas, and Mississippi. I think it was. We didn't sleep too much on the way, and I hope the car wasn't as tired when it got here as we were."

Had the car never been tested at all?

"Not a foot. We even pushed it on the trailer," Henderson said. "Actually, we don't even know if it will go three miles an hour, much less the speed it will have to travel to."

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This tournament will get underway at 6 p.m. February 25, with the Thunderbirds against the Klamath Agency five. The other six teams will follow with four games on the first night. Friday night will see the winners meet in the semifinals and Saturday night will feature the championship game and the playoff for third place.

Lodge Grass, Montana, and Lapwai, Idaho, who each have won two consecutive titles during the last four years, will return for the March tournament to seek a possible third crown and permanent possession of the huge traveling trophy presented by the Jaycees to the first three-time winner. Phoenix, Arizona; Browning, Montana; Neah Bay, Washington; and Moberly, South Dakota, who finished behind Lodge Grass in that order, will also offer stiff competition for the crown.

Newcomers to this event are the Window Rock Navahs from Arizona and the Sioux of Pine Ridge, South Dakota. In addition to the elimination tourney winners, Toppenish, Washington, and the perennial Reno, Nevada, Palutes will round out the 12 team slate.

Opening games of this tourney will be at 1 p.m. Wednesday, March 16, to be followed by four days of basketball with the finals slated for Saturday night, March 19, on the Chiloquin High School maple.

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NFL Commissioner Notes Contract Woe

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — New National Football League commissioner Pete Rozelle was on record today with a description of the perils of signing an All-America football player and then losing him to another team — and league.

In the case of Billy Cannon, All-America halfback at Louisiana State, Rozelle said the Los Angeles Rams agreed to a suggestion the star had about giving him a bonus immediately after he was drafted. In that way, Cannon, who played in the Sugar Bowl game New Year's day, would not have so steep a 1960 income tax, said Rozelle.

Rozelle said he offered Cannon a \$3,000 bonus for signing and a three-year contract for \$15,000 a year. However, the bonus was upped to \$10,000 with the 1960 contract reduced to \$10,000, Rozelle said.

Rozelle gave a deposition Thursday to Cannon's attorney, Lowell Dryden, in his capacity as general manager of the Rams; Cannon signed with Houston of the American Football League after the Sugar Bowl game, returned the check for \$10,000 to the Rams and contended the agreement was not valid. The Rams brought suit to prevent Cannon from playing for any other team in 1960.

Rozelle testified he signed Cannon to a pro contract after the halfback was drafted by the Rams, and a month before the Sugar Bowl game. He conceded Paul Dietzel of LSU said "I don't want you to sign Cannon to a contract before the Sugar Bowl game."

"My reply," said Rozelle, "was that the Rams would do nothing to impair Cannon's eligibility for the Sugar Bowl."

Lions Asked To Clarify Positions

DETROIT (AP) — At least a dozen members of the Detroit Lions football team have been asked by the club to write letters to the front office, stating they are happy with the present management and want to play here again in 1960.

President-General Manager Edwin J. Anderson, who instructed Coach George Wilson to phone players and make the request, said it was "routine procedure."

He said the club is trying to ascertain if the players want to play here next season.

"We keep hearing and reading reports that some members of our team want to go to the Canadian league and to the new American Football League. So we decided we'd better find out just which ones want to play here," Anderson said.

He explained that when the National Football League meets in Los Angeles March 11, each club must present the names of three veteran players to the new Dallas club that starts operations next season.
