The rampaging Malin Mustangs continued to prove that they were the league's number one contender — which they are — in the county tournament commencing next Thursday on the Oregon Tech basketball court. Friday night they posted their 15th consecutive victory in a home game against Bonanza, 63-45. The scoring duel between the Antlers' Butch Crume and the Mustangs' Randy Miller, ranked one-two in the league respectively, found Mustang Jim Long stealing the spotlight with 25 points, as compared to Miller's 16 and Crume's 11.

Chiloquin found traveling to Merrill a pleasure, if not in the least exciting, as they emerged from a seesaw battle with a 45-44 success Friday evening. The Panther and Mustang wins failed to upset the league standings as Bonanza and Merrill are still tied for third with six wins and five losses apiece.

Sacred Heart crossed town to play in Pelican Court against the KU Wildcats and won a come-from-behind thriller, 59-51.

Other action on Friday evening saw Henley's second unit massacre visiting Bly, 54-21.

Malin 63, Antlers 45

Jim Long of the Mustangs bolstered his total scoring for the season when he dumped in 25 counters to pace his teammates.

As has been the case in Malin's last several games, they found themselves behind at the end of the first quarter; this time at an 11-6 tune. But the league champions began to toe the mark in the second period when they squeaked ahead 24-23 at the half. From then on it was Malin all the way, as they increased their lead to 40-31 by the end of the third canto.

The Mustangs' superior height allowed them to control the boards with Long picking off 17 and teammate Dave DeMerritt following with 11. The Malin five grabbed a total of 46 from the boards for the evening. Chet Schooler scooped up 13 for the Antlers.

Tailing Long's 25 in scoring was Randy Miller with 16. Bonanza's league leading scorer, Butch Crume, managed to hit for only 11 tallies for the evening. Chet Schooler led his Antler squad in scoring with 23 markers.

The Malin Junior Varsity eked out a 56-53 thriller over the Antler JV's in the preliminary match.

Chiloquin Thunderbirds Earn Split In Basketball Twinbill

CHILQUIN (Special) — The Thunderbirds found themselves unexpectedly playing in a double-header against two visiting clubs Friday night and managed to split the bill of fare. In the first game, the Thunderbirds clobbered the University of Oregon Mudhens, 41-24, with Fred Townsend paving the victorious path with a team high of 12 points for the Birds.

The Chiloquin five led all the way and enjoyed a 26-16 advantage at the end of the first 20 minutes of play. The Thunderbirds allowed only two points for the Mudhens to collect in the third quarter, as they forged their way into a 34-18 lead.

The Mudhens dropped only eight baskets through the cylinder from the field and collected seven more from the foul line. The Thunderbirds hit 18 field goals and 8-13 free shots.

However, two games in the same evening proved beyond the Thunderbirds' limit, as they dropped an 84-68 encounter to Warm Springs. Although the Chiloquin squad fell behind 25-7 at the end of the first canto, they began forcing their way slowly back into

third quarter, and Ed Parnall twisted his knee in the same frame leaving the Huskies at a tremendous height disadvantage. However Dean Haskins kept the fire burning as he ended up with a high score of 20 points to lead his teammates in the point gathering department.

Frank Heglund hit 16 to pace the Panthers.

Chiloquin tossed in 17-27 field goals which provided the eventual margin of victory. The Huskies hit 12-21 from the foul line, but their missile range was off and they hit only 16 out of 62 field-goal attempts.

Maury Wills Signs Pact

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Little Maury Wills who plugged a hole at shortstop for the Los Angeles Dodgers last season and did some flashy hitting in the stretch run for the National League pennant, has signed a 1960 contract, it was announced Saturday.

Wills was the 26th Dodger to sign. Fourteen remain outside the fold.

The scrappy switch-hitter received a substantial pay hike, it was indicated.

Wills will still have to battle Don Zimmer, Bob Lillis and Bobby Aspromonte for the shortstop job when spring training starts next Saturday at Vero Beach, Fla., the Dodgers said.

Coming up from Spokane in early season 1959, Wills had a batting average of .260 for the Dodgers. He had a fine streak at the plate in September when he batted .389 in the last 10 games of the season.

The Pelicans treated themselves to a 24-11 first quarter lead Friday night at Central Point, were glad they had, when they had to hustle for all they were worth in the final five minutes of play to escape the revenge-seeking Comets. They won 62-54.

After making point — production look like a cinch in the breezy first stanza, the KU quint came up hard against an aggravating

zone defense when the second period opened and collected only four points, two field goals, in the full eight minutes preceding the half. The Comets fared little better during the interim, hitting only six points off a field goal and four free throws, so the count stood 28-17 for the Pels at the halfway point.

The Central Pointers continued the zone tactics during the third period and managed to outscore the Whitebirds again, the frame

ending 40-30.

The zone disappeared at the start of the fourth quarter and the Comets went into a determined full — court press. This also paid off for the Crater five as they crept up slowly but surely on the Pels until they had closed the gap to 49-44 with just a shade over three minutes to go.

Some very necessary sharpshooting on the parts of Paul Bishop, the game high pointer with 21, Bruce Brinkner, the number two Pel scorer with 19, and Gary Patzke, number three with 14, saved the KU bacon, as the club settled down from the pressure.

Bishop's 21, seven field goals and 7-10 from the foul line, was the big total of the night, but Brinkner, who pulled in 20 rebounds and hooked, tipped and rebounded eight field goals plus 3-6 at the foul line, stole the Pelican show.

Patzke was the number two board-man with 10 rebounds. He also hit five field goals and 4-8 from the free toss line. Comet Chuck Turner kept the Pointers in reach of the Pels, and he did it primarily from the foul line plus a neat job off the backboards. He connected on 11 of 15 free throws, hit four field goals and pulled in 10 rebounds.

In the Friday prelim the KU JV's, headed by Kent Hunsaker's 18 points, dumped the aggressive Comet juniors 66-47.

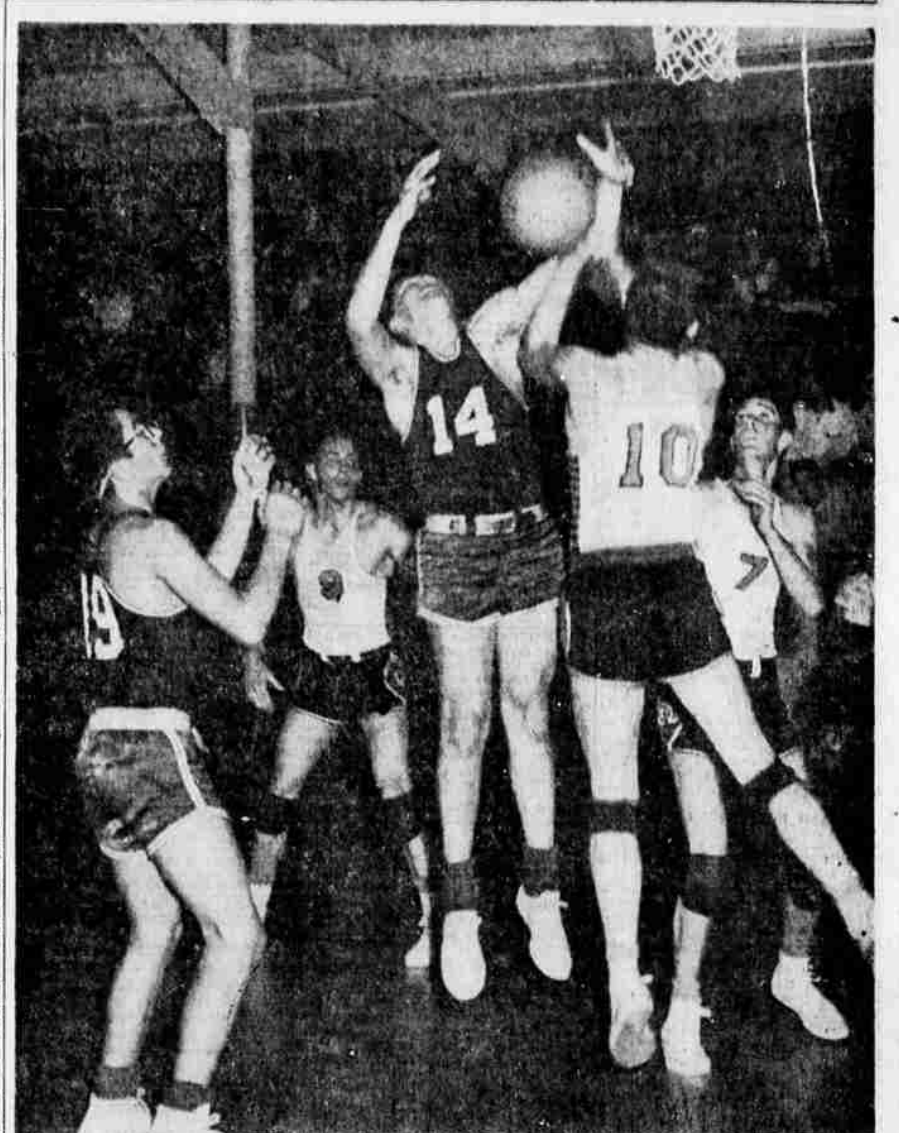

18-6 lead and managed to stay out front until late in the final period.

The Owls, who had trouble settling up a defense that accounted for much, and never really jelled an offense, managed to get within five at the half, 28-23. They finally grabbed a lead that they stretched to live points with five minutes left to play but the determined Mounts wouldn't give up.

With 30 seconds to go the Owls clung to a one-point lead, but lost it when Owl guard Dennis McKee got caught hacking EOC's Frank Chase. Chase calmly sank both his gift tosses and the Techmen saw their hopes for a clear-cut OCC championship take on a decidedly dim aspect.

Troy Koonitz was the high shooter for the Owls with 14 points he collected off five field goals and a perfect 4-4 at the free throw line. McKee, with 13; six field goals and one giftie, was next. Jack Horton hit four from the floor and 4-5 at the foul line for 12 points while guard Roy Johnson was next with nine.

Ron Hunt was the big gunner for the night with 15 points he amassed off six field goals and a perfect 3-3 from the charity line. Chase hit a total of 13 and Mel

Holmes added 11 for the winners.

The Owls out-rebounded their much shorter foe, 33-27 and Koonitz led them all with nine off the boards. EOC's Hunt, only 5-8, pulled down seven as did Chase and Bob Olinger.

Owl Paul Layher, 6-7, was held pointless and hauled down only four rebounds.

The Owls held the edge at the free throw line hitting 10-15 as compared to EOC's 13-23 but the Mountaineers were credited with the best mark from the floor. They notched a .421 off 24 completions in 57 tries. The Owls' mark was .385, 25 for 65.
