one with a good start, you connect the fire hose to the hydrant, string hose out to the fire, water is turned on. You turn water on fire, drag hose here, then drag it there. You eat smoke, you swallow dirty water. After about six hours of this with no coffee breaks you are hungry, wet, cold and tired and would like to take a rest but you know you can't as the fire will not wait.

This is why firemen seldom die of old age, most firemen die of heart attacks. So do not send your son, brother or uncle to the fire department to get a job if he has a heart ailment.

Firemen drill with the equipment outside the fire station, which includes laying of hose, putting up ladders to second floor windows of station, and having water turned on, they are timed with a stop watch as this has to be done in about 40 seconds.

Inside the fire station they have school on fire equipment that is carried on each truck, know where it is and what it can be used for. We hold schools on streets and house numbers, where each hydrant is located, and have what we call prefire fighting. We choose a building downtown, pretend it is on fire, decide what hydrants to use, how many hose lines to lay to keep it from spreading and get it put out.

Firemen have to take first aid courses and keep their cards up to date. A fireman's life is not all fire fighting. Today, we get calls when a person is caught in a piece of machinery or in a car wreck and help drag the car or lake.

The public is welcome to come to the fire station and get acquainted with the firemen and learn about their equipment.

Negro Church Has Troubles

EAST ORANGE, N.J. (UPI)—A Negro Baptist congregation that struggled 18 years against almost every conceivable obstacle to build a new church is now praying that it won't have to be torn down.

The imposing red-brick Calvary Baptist Church, which was opened in 1957 and now has a congregation of about 500, is standing on land which the Federal government may want for a new freeway.

Among the troubles encountered by the congregation while it was trying to get the church built were these:

A contractor absconded with \$21,500 of church funds in the early 1940's and, although he was later sent to jail, the money was never recovered.

Banks refused to give the congregation a mortgage and a would-be financier died on the day he was supposed to wind up an agreement to help build the church.

In 1953, construction began, but it took a while to solve the problem of the basement, which was flooded at every rain.

Finally, the church was opened at a cost of \$215,000—plus an estimated \$100,000 in volunteer work done by its parishioners.

And now, its pastor, the Rev. William R. Bailey, says: "We don't know where we stand. We may be saved and we may be destroyed. We will be praying for help from the Lord."

Virus Found Joking Matter

DES MOINES (UPI)—Gov. Herschel C. Loveless was recently bothered by a virus infection which temporarily paralyzed the left side of his face.

The infection did not slow up the Democratic governor but it did alter his features, giving him the appearance of squinting through one eye.

During one speech, he brought up the subject himself to put the audience at ease. "I feel much better than I look," he said. "Some Republican bug has just caught up with me."

He said the ailment gave him a "unique opportunity" which he explained this way:

"There stands before you a politician who can talk to you out of just one side of his face."

Will Return Be Checked?

WASHINGTON (UPI)—What are the chances that a Treasury agent will check your tax return?

As far as arithmetic goes, every return is checked. It pays to go over your addition and subtraction an extra time before mailing your return.

You can't tell whether a Treasury agent will dig into your return to see if you have omitted income, taken excessive deduction or made some other mistake, accidental or otherwise. Returns get a full audit on a random basis. The chance goes up with income. Returns which are flagrantly fishy are more likely to get a going over.

In 1958, the Revenue Service examined about 1 in 50 of the short-form returns and about 1 in 21 of the long-form returns.

The service says it will check about as many this year, but that agents also will be looking closely for reporting of dividends and interest.
