Honkers Pull 68-65 Upset

LAKEVIEW (Special) — The Lakeview Honkers pulled the biggest upset of the year last night when they downed previously unbeaten John Day 68-65 after losing the night before to the same club 75-67 on the Honkers court. Jerry Parkinson hit a season high in the second game with 25 counters and was closely followed by teammate Frank Egenhoff's 21 tallies. Parkinson hit 14 buckets and collected 7-10 free shots. Egenhoff gathered 7 field goals and hit 7-8 from the foul marker. Egenhoff was a standout on grabbing off rebounds for the Honkers. It was a tight see-saw battle all the way. The Prospectors were down 20-19 at the quarter mark but sneaked ahead at the intermission 35-33. The Owls started to narrow the distance but the clock ran out on them, just three points short of a badly needed win. In spite of Ashland coach Earl Iba's "platoon" system of attack and a pressing defense Saturday the Pelis had an easy time reaching a 14-4 margin by the close of the first stanza. By halftime they were out front 37-13 and at the end of the third period they held a 57-29 bulge. KU coach Dean White substituted freely throughout the game but in only the fourth period did the Grizzly cagers break even in point production with the Whitebirds. The primary reason for this scoring thrust on the part of the Ashlanders was big Bob Hardy, the game high-pointer with 16 markers. Hardy, who collected only three points in the first half of the test, found the range and literally "kicked" off six field goals from approximately 20 feet out during the second two stanzas. He added two for three tries from the charity mark. Hardy's jump shot seemed to call for an extra both-foot kick as he got the ball away, but it worked. Of the 13 Pelicans who got into the action at one time or another only two failed to score. Paul Bishop collected 13 during his tenure and junior Bruce Brickner was next with 12. Sophomore Gary Patzke contributed 11 to the Pel cause. The Pelis, led by Brickner who pulled down 18, out-rebounded the Grizzlies 60-42, although they collected just one more than the Ashland total in the second half. Off the cuff notes from OTI: Owl athletic director Rex Hunsaker has a point. He says, "You'll never convince me that the long pull up the OTI hill in the winter is the thing that keeps Klamath Falls people from attending our basketball games. Take last Tuesday night for example—We played Southern Oregon, our fiercest rival, in one of the most important games of the season. And we played at Klamath Union High School... right downtown. So... there were darn few new faces in the audience, if any. In fact, we have drawn better on the hill. Nope, there has to be a better reason."

Another item Hunsaker mentioned, "Even in the face of the fact we had a championship football season (actually two in a row), the sale of season tickets to just the faculty members of Oregon Tech alone outnumbered, 135 to 80, the number of those sold over the entire city of Klamath Falls."

With the wrestling program firmly entrenched now at Oregon Tech I can't help but wonder if perhaps both basketball and wrestling might do better, fan-wise, if they were incorporated into the same program. For an example: three of the eight bouts on the usual intercollegiate card could be staged prior to the beginning of the game, two could be held during the intermission, and the last three could follow the end of the game. The mats are easy to move. Naturally... being a true "Scot" I would be a firm advocate of no increase in admission prices. This could work at Klamath Union just as easily. If you like TV type "rasslin," college and prep wrestling may not hold much appeal for you. Of course, you'll never know until you see the boys wrestling once. But if you like good, honest competition and skill, situations in which the athlete can't "Let George Do It" and has to depend entirely upon himself, you'll like wrestling. It makes it much nicer for the boys competing, in any sport, if there are a lot of people in the stands who care whether he wins or loses. And from the fans' standpoint, the added attraction sure gives them their money's worth. I'd welcome letters concerning Klamath area sport fans' thinking along this line. Well... now I know... last week's letter concerning the purported miscasting of boys in basketball suits was no jest... Got a letter this week that proves (it contained a buck, good substantial proof) the author is serious. The meet is one of three from which the Pacific Northwest Ski Assn. team will be selected to compete in the junior alpine national championships at Aspen, Colo., next month. Engen made three runs down the course in a total time of 80.8 seconds. Second place went to Jack Morbeck of Seattle, 82.2, and third went to Mike Alleop of Bellingham, 85.4.
