

Ski Racers Go All Out In Test Runs

SQUAW VALLEY, Calif. (AP)—International ski racers cut loose at high speeds today testing their skills against perilous downhill courses where Olympic championships will be decided this week.

After two days of testing the men's and women's courses at lower speeds, this was the day set to go all out.

The Olympics open Thursday with the men's downhill slalom and Friday and the women's on Saturday as two early features of the 11-day program.

The men will race the full two-mile course with crash helmets required. They'll start at intervals of one minute to one minute, 15 seconds.

Training runs for the women won't be on such a formal basis, but probably Tuesday they'll zoom under the same conditions.

An estimated 6,500 visitors swarmed through this 2½-mile valley Sunday in warm sunny weather to watch the athletes ski and skate.

A practice hockey game between the United States and Japan went to the Yanks 10-0 in a battle marred by penalties and near fist-fights.

Japanese Capt. Yoshihiro Miyazaki hit the ice during a scuffle with Dick Meredith from Minneapolis, Minn. The Japanese jumped up and swung his stick at Meredith who was skating away. Both were sent to the penalty box.

American Coach Jack Riley then warned his men that the next one cited for roughness would go to the showers.

I think we should be improved because of added youth, speed and better defense. We have a number of boys up from our minor league farm system as well as some young players obtained through deals who should make us an improved club.

Once-Mighty Wings Tumble

DETROIT (AP)—The walls are tumbling down and the Detroit Red Wings can do nothing except watch and wait.

The once-mighty Wings are in danger of missing the Stanley Cup playoffs for the second straight year.

Before last season's last-place finish—the first time in club history the Wings had reached bottom—it had been 21 years since Detroit missed the post-season games.

Sunday night's 3-1 defeat by the Toronto Maple Leafs edged the Wings to the brink of fifth place. The Boston Bruins, by shutting out New York 3-0, swept past the Red Wings into third place. The first four teams in the six-team National Hockey League qualify for the Stanley Cup playoffs.

And the rising Chicago Black Hawks, getting perfect goaltending from Glenn Hall, climbed within a point of the Wings with a 2-0 victory over the injury-riddled Montreal Canadiens, Montreal, losing both weekend games, played without its first line.

Chiefs Outlast Gonzaga For Win

SPOKANE (AP)—Dave Mills scored 21 points to lead the Seattle University Chieftains to a 66-62 basketball victory over Gonzaga Sunday.

Mills' layin late in the game put the Chieftains ahead 64-62 after the score had been tied 11 times. Gonzaga blew its chances when it missed five straight charity tosses in the last four minutes.

Our prime need, however, is over-all depth. We still need help with the bat, particularly right-handed. We need better relief pitching. Our bullpen was not good enough last year.

I am pretty well satisfied with my four starters, Robin Roberts, Gene Conley, Jim Owens and Don Cardwell. We are hopeful that Curt Simmons, who underwent elbow surgery last year, will be able to give us sorely needed southpaw pitching strength. We are also looking for a greater contribution from Ruben Gomez.

Through trades and draft selections we acquired John Callison, a young slugger of great promise; 23-year-old Clay Dalrymple, B. G. Smith, Bob Malkmus and Ted Levocio. From our own organization, some of the players who helped Buffalo win the International League pennant are, we hope, ready to help us get out of last place.

Jim Coker—15 homers, 64 runs batted in, 290 average—looks like a major-league catcher. Bobby Del Greco—21 homers, 72 RBI comes up with Kerby Farrell's recommendation that he now can hit big league pitching. Henry Mason (12-3) could be helpful, particularly as a relief pitcher.

Our outfielders didn't have impressive years in 1959. Harry Anderson, a natural hitter, should be better. I look for Walby Post to bolster his .254 batting average and increase his slugging. Ed Bouchee, our first baseman, also should do better.

If these players come through, and if Conley and Owens continue where they left off last year, and if Cardwell can continue his improvement, then the contribution to team success from returning players could be impressive.

MOORE CONSIDERING BOUT DORTMUND, Germany (UPI)

Plans were underway today for a world light-heavyweight championship bout between titleholder Archie Moore and Erich Schoepner of Germany.

Schoepner fought a 10-round draw with Mike Holt of South Africa Saturday night, but New York promoter Humberto Fugazy had previously stipulated the German fighter would get the title fight with Moore as long as he was not beaten by Holt.

Old Hurler Nabs Link Win

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—"It was like winning a 1-0 ball game." That's the way Jim Hearn, former major league pitching star, described his one-stroke victory Sunday which made him new golf champion of major league baseball players.

The 36-year-old Hearn fired a closing round of 73 to finish with a 72-hole total of 301 and capture the National Baseball Players Golf Championship at Miami Springs Country Club.

Al Dark, veteran infielder of the Philadelphia Phillies and three-time champion of this event, was runnerup at 302. Albie Pearson of the Baltimore Orioles was third at 304.

It was the first time in the 20-year history of the event that competition was in medal play.

Hanson Surprise Open Champion

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—Beverly Hanson, who played out of the money last year, is the new St. Petersburg Women's Open golf champion.

The Palm Desert, Calif., golfer said "the cups were just bigger for me" as she toured the 6,118-yard Sunset Country Club Course four times for a 72-hole card of 287. Her windup Sunday included three birdies and 13 pars. Miss Hanson won \$1,247 in the \$7,500 tournament.
