Court Begins Grocer Trial

Sutton was indicted by the October grand jury.

Car Accident Injures Two

TULELAKE—Two young women from Klamath Falls, Joanne Peterson and Janice Guiley, suffered minor injuries early Monday morning in a one-car accident and were taken to Klamath Valley Hospital by Tulelake ambulance.

In reviewing the accident, William Skelton, California Highway patrolman who investigated, said the young women with Norbert Anthis and Jerry Peterson, both of Tulelake, had gone to the Ronnie Peterson home for the evening, in Anthis' car.

Anthis and Ronnie Peterson took the Peterson car to Tulelake on an errand and when they did not return immediately the young women entered the Anthis vehicle and left alone. They drove into a dead end road, lost control of the car when there was no place else to drive except an open field. The car was badly damaged.

Miss Peterson suffered a deep cut across the forehead and bruises and Miss Guiley, bruises and shock.

Thefts Plague City Police

3-Man Panel To Hear Plea By Chessman

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Caryl Chessman's latest appeal goes today before a three-man panel of the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals, four days before his eighth date with death in the gas chamber.

The 38-year-old convict - author asked that the nine-member court sit en banc to overrule its chief judge, Justice Richard H. Chambers, who last Monday in Tucson, Ariz., turned down the same appeal, saying Chessman had "beckoned his keeper long enough."

Chessman, convicted in 1948 of kidnap, robbery and forcing two women into perverted sex acts in Los Angeles, has been on death row in San Quentin Prison for 11½ years and is due to go to the gas chamber Friday.

His attorney, George T. Davis, says the appeal argues that a federal rule on the books 32 years is unconstitutional. It requires a person to obtain a certificate of probable cause from a single judge before an appeals court can, as a whole, consider an appeal.

Davis claims Judge Chambers' ruling denied Chessman due process of law.

Chessman also has prepared another appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court—it would be his 15th—asking for certiorari and mandamus requiring the circuit court to grant a hearing and issue a stay of execution, said Davis.

U.S. Supreme Court Justice Hugo Black on Saturday refused Chessman a stay of execution, saying he found no substantial federal question involved.

On Sunday, the California Democratic Council in Fresno passed a resolution urging abolition of the death sentence in California. This was after Joseph Wyatt Jr., CDC president, had ruled out of order a proposed resolution urging Gov. Edmund G. Brown to commute Chessman's sentence to life imprisonment. Brown already has refused to do this although he says the case is still open.

Congressman John F. Shelley of San Francisco argued that if Brown were formally urged to commute the sentence he could be accused of succumbing to political pressure in case he did so.

Al Hart, 2222 Union Avenue, told police early Saturday morning that an unidentified driver clipped his jeep as it was parked at home. He got a description of the car but no license number.

Two hours later patrolling officers spotted a car answering the description and hailed Jones. He admitted the accident they said. He was jailed in lieu of \$105 bail and was sentenced to pay \$50 or spend 10 days in jail on the hit - run charge and \$25 or five days for failure to carry an operator's license.

The Hart vehicle received considerable damage.

Another hit-run was reported by Kenneth Joslen, 915 East Main Street, Friday. He said he parked his car at 2532 South Sixth Street and saw a car clip his, then drive away. Damage was slight.

Dorris Clerk Files Again

DORRIS — Incumbent Mrs. Virginia Hamilton has filed nomination papers for reelection to another four-year term as city clerk.

During her first year in office, Mrs. Hamilton set up a modern filing system and installed the first comprehensive bookkeeping system for the city. She collects water payments, taxes and city license fees. Another of her duties is to listen to complaints and correct them if she can.

Mrs. Hamilton is active in Salvation Army work and lends assistance to old age pensioners with the Siskiyou County Welfare office. On her own time she helps elderly persons with their property and income taxes. She is a member of Butte Valley Grange and holds responsible chairmanships with the Dorris Federated Women's Club and other civic organizations.
