Proposal Rejected
GENEVA (AP)—The Soviet Union today flatly rejected President Eisenhower's proposal for a partial ban on nuclear weapons tests but offered new concessions for a ban on all tests.

Soviet Delegate Semyon K. Tsarapkin told the three-nation talks that Eisenhower's Feb. 11 proposal is totally unacceptable to the Soviet Union and cannot be the basis for any agreement.

Chief Unveils New Program For Mail Hike

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower unveiled today a proposed postal rate increase program calling for a one-cent boost for first class letters, postcards and airmail.

If approved by Congress this would mean 5-cent letters, 4-cent postcards and 8-cent airmail.

The President spelled out his proposals at his weekly meeting with Republican Congressional leaders. They indicated they gave the President a pessimistic report on the prospects for congressional approval this year of the postal rate increases.

As reported by Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen (Ill.) and House GOP Leader Charles A. Halleck (Ind.), the program would increase postal revenues by \$54 million dollars a year toward erasing the estimated deficit of 600 million dollars.

They said the program sought to raise 400 million dollars by the proposed one-cent rate increase for first class letters, postcards and airmail.

The program also included 46 million dollars to come from an additional one-half cent charge for handling each piece of second class mail—newspapers and magazines. Another 85 million dollars would be raised by higher rate for third class mail.

Israel Adamant; Won't Back Down

JERUSALEM (AP)—Israeli Foreign Minister Golda Meir says her government will continue to challenge the United Arab Republic's refusal to let Israeli shipping through the Suez Canal.

Referring to the U.A.R. confiscation of Israeli cargo on the Danish freighter Inge Toft, Mrs. Meir declared:

"We have no intention of acquiescing to President Nasser's performance in this international waterway."

The freighter sailed into the Mediterranean from Port Said Monday after unloading the cargo, which was originally consigned to the Far East. The ship had been tied up at the canal entry port for nine months.

The U.S. Navy men have been authorized to board Argentine warships if they are asked to do so, but they are to act only as advisers.

Wet Weather, Snow, Rain Hit Nation

Wet weather, with snow and rain, spread across the lower Mississippi Valley and lower Ohio Valley today as cleanup operations continued in snow-stricken areas in the East and South.

A snowstorm which swept across sections of the southern Plains spread into Arkansas and hit areas in southern Illinois, parts of Kentucky and Tennessee. The storm, which left a covering of nine inches on parts of Oklahoma, was expected to dump from two to four inches in Kentucky and Tennessee.

Southeast Kentucky was hard hit by the weekend snowstorm which raked wide areas in the South and East. Mountain areas were blanketed with heavy snow and most schools in eastern Kentucky remained closed.

The weekend storm death toll in Kentucky mounted to five Monday when the bodies of an elderly brother and sister were found in a cabin near Glasgow. Doctors said both probably froze to death.

Belated reports across the storm belt, hit by gale-force winds, snow and sleet, showed at least 34 deaths attributed to the weekend stormy weather, which was winter's worst in many areas. Pennsylvania reported the most deaths, 15, including a 7-year-old boy whose sled crashed into a stone house in Philadelphia. An estimated 100 children were injured in sledding accidents in Pennsylvania in two days.

Temperatures were higher than 24 hours earlier in most parts of the country. The 30s were the rule in interior sections and the 40s and 50s along the West Coast and in Florida. Sub-zero marks in Michigan were replaced by temperatures in the 20s.

Vaccine Test Under Scrutiny By Physician

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The nation's pioneer mass attempt to check polio through oral vaccine is on here under the interested eye of the vaccine's originator.

Dr. Harold Cox, who developed the cherry-flavored potion to suppress the program's public opening in the Greater Miami area.

"Although one million people have taken the vaccine already," he said, "saving the life of one American will make more of an impression than saving the lives of a million Russians. That is why we think the Dade County program is so important."

A similar type vaccine is being used in the Soviet Union.

Payola Probe Continuing
WASHINGTON (AP)—House payola probes today called record distributors, a government auditor and a musically inclined deputy sheriff for questioning about radio-TV disc jockey programs.

As hearings resumed Monday, the testimony about payments led Chairman Orea Harris (D-Ark) of the investigating House subcommittee to appeal for federal action to "protect the American people from this rotten stuff." He called it "commercial bribery" to get records on the air.

Nixon To Enter Wisconsin Race

MARINETTE, Wis. (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon will enter Wisconsin's presidential primary, apparently at the urging of state Republican officials who want to use his standing in an effort to restore the Wisconsin GOP fortunes damaged by Democratic victories two years ago.

Nixon's entry into the April 5 primary makes him the third major candidate in the race. Others are Democrats Sens. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) and John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.).

Uruguay Address

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower will address a joint session of Uruguay's National Congress during his March 2 visit to that country, the White House announced today.

Details of the visits to Brazil, Argentina and Chile will be made available later.

Reeder is the 10th announced candidate for the county court. In addition to the four aspirants for the four-year term, three persons have filed for county judge and three have filed for the two-year term as commissioner.

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—A spectacular gasoline barge fire threatened the industry-lined Houston Ship Channel today but was brought under control before spreading to nearby storage tanks holding 220,000 barrels of oil.

One tugboat crewman was injured, and another was missing. A barge holding 9,500 barrels of high-octane gasoline was wrecked, and a tugboat was damaged severely. Another gasoline barge and two others loaded with sand did not catch fire.

Answer Due On UFO Seen Sunday

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)—A silvery object flashed through western Alaska skies late Sunday belching flames and leaving a dozen unanswered questions in its wake.

Was it a jet plane? If so, whose? Was it an unidentified flying object?

The Alaska Air Command hopes to come up with some of the answers today.

The flame-belching object was reported by several persons from Nome to St. Michael about 150 miles away. They said it appeared from the direction of Siberia and hurtled southeasterly.

The reports were conflicting, said Maj. Roy E. Haines, public information officer at Elmendorf Air Force Base.

"Some had it low and slow. Some had it high and fast," he said.

A spokesman for the North American Air Defense Command at Colorado Springs said the agency had no report on the object.

"If it were an 'unknown,' we certainly would have a report on it."

Pete Walsh, Wien Alaska Airlines employee at Nome, said the object was traveling at tremendous speed about 2,000 to 3,000 feet above the earth. He described it as silvery and tubular, somewhat like a jet plane, with orange flame shooting from the tail.

Mrs. Stanley Molitor of Nome said "it had the appearance of a large star and was a very, very brilliant white." Neither she nor Walsh could tell whether it had wings.

Observers said the mysterious object curved up and away as it approached Cape Nome, as if it was manned and controlled.

Haines said an investigation was started immediately. Radar records of two stations north of Nome were to be checked. Officers also were trying to determine whether any planes from either Elmendorf or Ladd Air Force Base, Fairbanks, might have been in the vicinity at the time of the sightings.

New Dive Slated By Bathyscaph

SAN DIEGO (UPI)—The Navy's record-setting bathyscaph Trieste is expected to make a new dive in the Marianas Trench sometime within the next two weeks.

Dr. Andreas B. Reuchner of the Naval Electronics Laboratory made the announcement Monday shortly before he and two Navy lieutenants left for the Pacific diving area near Guam.

Reuchner said he and Kenneth MacKenzie also of the lab, will be in the little craft during the new dive.

L. W. "Swede" Harroun, a former state police officer, is the second announced candidate for Klamath County sheriff. Harroun, a Democrat, filed his candidacy Monday afternoon.

THE 40-YEAR-OLD FORMER officer came to Klamath Falls as a top sergeant in the Marine Corps during World War II. He joined the state police force and was stationed here during all of his 11 years of service. For the past three years he has been an insurance agent.

Harroun said he felt his combination of police experience and business experience made him well qualified for job of sheriff. He pledged greater service at lower cost, and said he would employ trained deputies.

The only other announced candidate is Dale "Snuffy" Smith, justice of the peace for the Sprague River District at Bly. Incumbent Sheriff Red Britton has not yet announced his intentions. Both Smith and Britton are Democrats. No Republican has filed for the office.

The filing deadline is March 11; the primary election is May 20.

"As property owner and taxpayer of Klamath County," Harroun said in a formal statement, "I am vitally interested in the welfare and good government of its people. In this light, I feel compelled to file for the office of sheriff."

"I BELIEVE that my successful police and business experiences have given me the highest qualifications for the office of sheriff. I believe I can give Klamath County greater service and protection, at a much lower cost, than it has had in the last few years. I will insist on trained deputies. I will cooperate wholeheartedly with all other law enforcement agencies."

Harroun, his wife Ruth, and their four children live at 1320 California Avenue.

The candidate became district agent for the Prudential Life Insurance Company three years ago. He had come here with the Marine Corps after service in the South Pacific. After discharge he joined the city police force. He was on that force briefly before joining the state police force.

Harroun has been active in Boy Scout work for eight years and presently is adviser for Explorer Post 50. He is vice president of the Klamath Basin Insurance Writers Association.

Ike Requests \$4 Billion In Alien Aid

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower asked Congress today for \$4,175,000,000 in foreign aid to bolster the Free World's military and economic stand against Communist threats which he said continue despite Soviet peace talk.

The chief executive's request, 944 million dollars more than Congress approved last year, included a proposal for stepped-up assistance to India and Pakistan as part of an effort to help America's friends live in economic "decency" as well as in peace.

Eisenhower told Congress in a special message that his mutual security proposals, about half of which would be for military assistance to non-Communist nations, reflect needs which "we cannot afford to ignore."

"The fact, if it is a fact, of reductions in Soviet military manpower, does not alter the need for the maintenance of our collective defense," Eisenhower said.

Eisenhower said that even though Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev had promised a reduction in Russia's armed manpower, the Communist leader's own statements make clear that "Soviet military power...remains great."

"While its recent department and pronouncements suggest the possible opening of a somewhat less strained period in our relationship," the President said, "the menace of Communist imperialism nevertheless still remains."

He said that while Soviet military power "continues to grow" there also is an "increasingly important" growth in the military and economic power of Communist China.

He said the United States is "giving close and careful attention" to a program of increased aid for the Chinese Nationalist government on Formosa to help the anti-Communist government prove the superiority of freedom over totalitarianism.

Nehru told the lower house of Parliament his letter inviting Chou to come to New Delhi to talk over the dispute as suggested by the Chinese Premier three months ago followed the "identical line of approach we have always taken."

"We have always taken the position it is our policy to meet anybody and everybody to find a peaceful solution of our problems," he declared.
