BRISTOL, England (AP) — Arthur Gibbs, a 49-year-old news vendor, got three letters from the Bristol city government in the morning mail.

The first told him his newspaper shop was to be demolished to make way for an extension to a railroad bridge.

The second said his wife's newspaper shop was to be pulled down to make way for a new road.

The third told him his house was to come down under a scheme to build a new school.

Gibbs commented: "This is the ruin of my family. Five years ago I sank every penny I had in the Newsagent Shop and have built up the weekly take from 120 to about 400 pounds—\$336 to \$1,120—but the only compensation I will get is 144 pounds—\$403.20.

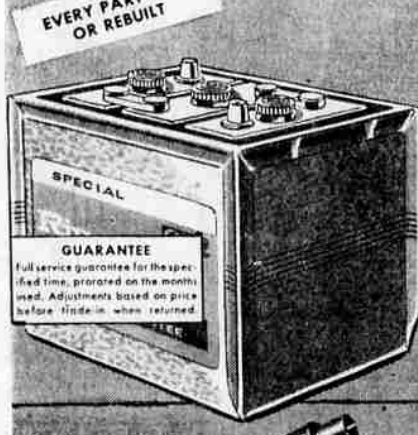
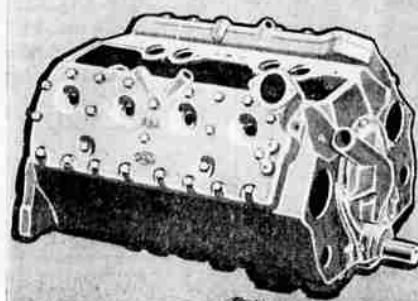
