

Woman Killed As Jet Plane Hits Home

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Calif. (UPI)—Mrs. Margit Halmi and her family faced death many times in their search for freedom.

Her husband, Deszo, 49, was an underground leader during the Hungarian revolt of 1956. Mrs. Halmi and their two sons all fought beside him against Communism.

They survived the Red Army's brutal counterattack on Budapest and when the revolt failed the family sought freedom outside the Iron Curtain.

They came to America three years ago, and settled here, just 25 miles south of San Francisco. Halmi was employed as an electronics engineer, and the two boys—now 20 and 16—registered for high school.

Mrs. Halmi had put aside her rifle and once again became a housewife. She was washing the breakfast dishes Monday while Navy Lt. (j.g.) George Blake was making an approach at Moffett Naval Air Station in his crippled single-engine jet bomber.

The young lieutenant fought to control the plane as it zoomed over Mountain View—where he lived with his wife just a few blocks from the Halmi residence. Blake spotted an open field in the cluster of homes and remained with his plane in an effort to avoid disaster. When it was apparent he could not reach the clearing, the pilot ejected—but it was too late.

The bomber and its pilot plunged into the Halmi home with a fiery blast that leveled the house.

Halmi and the two boys had departed for work and school earlier, but Mrs. Halmi was at the kitchen sink. Her body was found in the charred debris, not far from that of the young pilot.

Blast Probe To Continue

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Robert Vernon Spears, 45, the heavily injured ex-convict once believed killed in a mysterious airliner crash, is going back to prison.

But the portly Dallas naturopath, who Monday received a five-year sentence for interstate transportation of a stolen car, won't be forgotten.

The FBI said it would keep trying to learn whether Spears planted a bomb on the National Airliner which plunged into the Gulf of Mexico last Nov. 16, killing all 42 aboard. He is wanted in Los Angeles on two counts of abortion.

Spears was listed as a passenger on the ill-fated flight from Tampa, Fla., to New Orleans and was carrying \$100,000 in travel insurance.

Following Spears' arrest in Phoenix Jan. 20, his wife quoted him as saying a fellow ex-convict, William Allen Taylor of Tampa, had taken his seat on the plane.

U.S. Dist. Judge Dave W. Ling gave Spears the maximum term for driving Taylor's car from Tampa to Phoenix without the owner's permission.

ALENCON, France (UPI)—Arlette Paris couldn't stand the quiet of country living but she was too devoted to her aged employers to resign as cook.

Arlette took up the job of cooking for Count Chevrel de Frieseuse, 80, and his wife, Elizabeth, 73, soon after completing psychiatric treatment.

She thought of quitting, she told police, but her employers doted on her and she was fond of them. Maybe if she would do something they didn't like, she thought, they would fire her.

The solution dawned on her last Saturday while she was cooking a pot of the soup her employers liked so much. Spoil it, she said to herself, and she will be away from the eerie atmosphere.

She found three bags—rat poison and a weed killer. The weed killer, she said, appeared to be the least harmful so she dumped some in the soup.

"I just wanted to make it taste bad," she said. "I just wanted to make them discharge me."

Shortly after dinner Saturday night the Count's son stopped by to see his parents. He found his father dead, his mother writhing in agony. She died shortly after. Arlette was returned today to psychiatric treatment.

STELLA, Mo. (AP)—The people of Stella would like a new school bill, if you please, now that Sen. Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.) has adopted the original as a vehicle for civil rights skirmishing in the Senate.

"Chances are the present one is going to be delayed a long time," said Mayor Orville Pogue. "I think it would be best to introduce another bill now."

He spoke for a town of 177 in the southwest corner of Missouri. A flash fire destroyed Stella's school Jan. 15, 1959.

At Ft. Crowder, an inactive Army base nine miles away, the Army said it would be glad to rent the Stella school board a three-story brick officers club. The charge, of course, would be nominal.

TV Sleuth Files Suit

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A head injury actor Roger Smith says he received in a fall at his home last June has resulted in suits for and against the TV sleuth.

Smith, who co-stars as one of the private investigators in "77 Sunset Strip," sued Dr. Frederick Amerongen and two other physicians for \$260,000 Monday. He charged they negligently diagnosed major injuries as minor.

In another action, Dr. Amerongen sued Smith; Smith's wife, actress Victoria Shaw, Look magazine and others for \$1,950,000. The physician alleged that a Look article about the injury defamed him and invaded his privacy.

Labor Boosts Race Equality

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Organized labor today stepped up a drive to promote racial equality among workers.

AFL-CIO leaders broadened a campaign to drop union membership color restrictions after accusing a government anti-discrimination committee headed by Vice President Richard M. Nixon of being too soft on employers.

Nixon is chairman of President Eisenhower's Government Contracts Committee assigned to enforce standard clauses in all government contracts.

Meany's comments had political overtones because many AFL-CIO leaders say Nixon has won support among the federation's 1 1/2 million Negroes by strong public pronouncements against racial bias.

Meany, himself a member of the Nixon group, advocated tougher government policing of the contract requirements—to the point of canceling the contracts of violating employers.

Federation leaders arranged a new racial equality compliance system of assigning members of the Federation Executive Council, composed of top union leaders, to work on segregation problems as they arise.
