Circuit Jury Action Due In Klamath Morals Case

The trial of Frank G. Sutton, a millworker accused of making improper advances toward his own 7-year-old daughter, was expected to reach a circuit court jury this afternoon.

BOTH STATE and defense attorneys had rested their cases late Monday, the trial's first day, but both attorneys offered additional witnesses today.

Much of today's morning session was devoted to questioning and cross-examining Dr. Gerald Haugen, a Portland psychiatrist who examined Sutton during the noon recess Monday.

Dr. Haugen incorporated into his report findings made by Dr. Henry Dickson of Portland, another psychiatrist who had examined Sutton earlier. Dr. Haugen said Sutton had been exposed to an increasing amount of tension in the last few years, and had manifested this tension in insomnia, lack of ability to relax, and fainting spells.

Sutton himself was on the stand Monday afternoon, the first defense witness offered by Attorney Glenn D. Ramirez.

The state's key witness, presented by Deputy District Attorney Philip Engelgau, now of Portland; Mrs. June Trimmel, temporary employe of the district attorney's office; Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon, and Sutton himself, who was called to the stand in absence of the jury to establish conditions re-

Pair Jailed On Charges Of Beating

Two Klamath Falls men were jailed early Monday morning for disorderly conduct after a local woman complained she was beaten about the head with a club at a Klamath Avenue tavern.

The men, Robert Stigall, 25, 608 Broad Street, and Johnnie Scott, 29, who lives in a local hotel, were sentenced to jail \$25 each or spend five days in jail in municipal court Monday.

The woman, Thurea L. Burke, 534 Broad Street, was treated at Klamath Valley Hospital for numerous head lacerations she said were caused by a club wielded by Stigall.

She told police the two men were making remarks to her and her husband. He turned and Stigall hit him with the club. When she attempted to intervene, Stigall pushed her out the door and began to club her while Scott flashed a knife menacingly, she said.

Witnesses called police. City police also possess a no-account check written to Vera's Candies, 1066 Main Street, last week by a man who signed his name John Leo Cleary.

The man bought \$10 worth of candy and paid for it with a \$20 check, the management reported. The suspect is believed to have passed several other checks in town recently, posing as an Air Force doctor or a Catholic priest. In this instance, he played the medic's role.

In other action, officers learned from Nick Randazzo, 710 Lippincott Avenue, that someone stole four hubcaps from his car sometime between Saturday and Monday afternoon while the car was parked near his home.

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
