Food Clerks Slate Vote

The National Labor Relations Board will conduct an election on February 24 to determine the representation of the retail food clerks of the Medford-Ashland-Grants Pass area, according to Dan Parker, international representative of the Retail Clerks International Association, AFL-CIO. Parker, who was here Monday to confer with Clyde Laver, international representative, said that approximately 300 food clerks are eligible to vote in the February 24 election. Voting will be by secret ballot conducted in each unit involved and results are expected to be announced the same night. "Purpose of the election is to determine whether the retail clerks union, local No. 263, AFL-CIO, or the teamsters union, local No. 962, in the Medford area will represent the food clerks there," Parker said. "A petition has been filed with the National Labor Relations Board for the Klamath Falls area, also," Parker stated.

Legislator Announces Deer Hunting Committee

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Assemblywoman Pauline L. Davis (D-Portola), chairman of the Assembly Fish and Game Committee, today appointed a 15-member group to probe either-sex deer hunting in California. She said the committee represented all interests and areas in the controversial subject. "The purpose of the advisory committee is to attempt to resolve some of the differences of opinion regarding California big game policies," Mrs. Davis said. She said Fish and Game Committee field trips had shown her that "there is diversified opinion among sportsmen's groups, the Department of Fish and Game and other agencies." She failed to appoint to the committee a representative of the Department of Fish and Game but said this was not necessary. "Although the Department of Fish and Game is not a part of the advisory group, one of their representatives will be in attendance to provide technical information services." "Additionally, while there will be no chairman or officers of the group, I have asked the legislative council to furnish the services of an impartial moderator at all meetings." Appointment of the committee was suggested by a resolution adopted at a recent meeting of Mrs. Davis' committee. It was formulated by Assemblyman John C. Williamson (D-Bakersfield) as a solution to the controversy over the advisability of doe hunting in California — in dispute among sportsmen. Members of the citizens group are:

Research grants and fellowships totaling nearly \$30,000 were approved by the Oregon Heart Association during the past year, according to Dr. H. M. Amsberry of Klamath Falls, Klamath County chairman for the association's February Heart Fund campaign. Amsberry pointed out that in addition to research receiving direct support from the association, there are millions of dollars' worth of projects supported by Oregonians through the American Heart Association, which receives a part of the Heart Fund contributions in the state. "Heart research cannot be 'localized' any more than heart disease is limited to a specific community or state," Amsberry explained, "and that is why a certain percentage of the funds collected in our February campaign are allocated to the national organization, which studies and approves research projects wherever they might be. The principal objective is to find the answers to diseases of the heart."
