Our relations with Latin-America are none too cordial. Talk like this can do us an immense amount of harm. It could easily be true that we need more foreign aid money with which to counteract this dangerous communist drive to gain a foothold in the Western Hemisphere.

We mustn't forget that under the Monroe Doctrine we are pledged to keep such dangerous foreign influences out of the Western Hemisphere. If we can't do it by peaceful means, we'll have to do it by war.

So —
You see —
We may need this extra billion dollars of foreign aid money. If so, we should ask ourselves this question:
WHAT CAN WE DO WITHOUT?

When YOU are very deeply in debt, but just HAVE to have something, what do you do? You know what you do. You DO WITHOUT something you have been having.

So —
If we have to have another billion dollars of foreign aid money, LET'S DO WITHOUT SOME OF THE WASTE WE HAVE BECOME ACCUSTOMED TO.

Goodness knows there is PLENTY of waste in our government.

Thieves Foiled; Eastern Bank Holdup Proof
BESSEMER, Pa. (UPI) — The three masked gunmen entered the bank and announced "this is a stickup." The tellers looked at the guns and grinned. The bandits went about their business anyway — unaware they were trying to rob a "holdup proof" bank. It all happened Tuesday afternoon at the People's Bank of Lawrence County in this peaceful Western Pennsylvania town not far from the Ohio state line. Under normal circumstances, being confronted with a shotgun and a couple of revolvers in the hands of would-be stickup men probably would have resulted in some trace of fear among bank employees. But not on this occasion. The tellers, clerks and safes had a complete feeling of safekeeping. The gunmen didn't know at first, but their intended victims were protected by a five-inch thick shield of bulletproof glass. A customer, noticing the bank's intentions, calmly advised: "This bank is holdup proof. That's bulletproof glass and you can't get inside the teller's cage." While the bandits stood dumbfounded, one of the bank employees leisurely picked up a telephone and called police. The gunmen looked at each other, shrugged and decided they had better leave. They did—empty handed. Bank officials said the bulletproof glass had been installed about 10 years ago and Tuesday was the first time anyone attempted to rob the bank since that time. In typical bankers' fashion, the officials expressed belief that the heavy glass had been a sound investment.

Electric Firms Indicted By Grand Jury
PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Twelve electrical equipment manufacturers including the country's two largest, General Electric Co., and Westinghouse Electric Corp., were indicted by a federal grand jury today on antitrust charges of price-fixing. Tuesday the grand jury indicted five companies—General Electric and Westinghouse among them—for conspiring to fix prices and rig bids in the sale of heavy electrical equipment. Four indictments were returned today by the 20-member grand jury. They involved the sale and distribution of bushings, distribution of lightning arrestors, intermediate lightning arrestors, station lightning arrestors, arrestor-cutoff combination units, insulators, and open fuse cutouts. Court Given Shasta Case
SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A Southern Pacific Railway reduction on its Shasta Daylight train was taken into U. S. District Court here Tuesday by the California Public Utilities Commission. The railroad was authorized by the Interstate Commerce Commission last May 6, 1959, to reduce the Shasta Daylight from daily to tri-weekly service between Jan. 15 and May 28 and between Sept. 16 and Dec. 14. The rest of the year the Shasta Daylight, which runs from here to Portland, is daily—that is, during the holiday and vacation periods. The PUC contends the ICC permitted the reduction merely by the expiration of a four-month time limit between the time the SP initially proposed the reduction and its actual date. Such ICC action, the state commission alleges, blocked the PUC's right to contest the ICC May 6 order in a court.

Chessman To Rest Case On Brown's Conscience
SAN QUENTIN, Calif. (UPI) — Caryl Chessman, 38, rebuffed for the 15th time by the U.S. Supreme Court, today gave up legal efforts to escape his scheduled execution date Friday and rested his case on the "conscience" of Gov. Edmund G. Brown. Brown said in San Francisco that "I may have something to say later tonight or maybe Thursday." He added that he would not see Chessman's attorneys today, as had been previously planned. In a press conference here, the convict — author emphasized that his latest action was not an appeal to the governor. During the meeting with newsmen, Chessman dictated a telegram that was forwarded to the governor. "I ask you to do what ever your conscience dictates you should," it said. "Mine tells me that I again must affirm the fact that I'm not the Red Light bandit even if the price for that affirmation must be death." Chessman said he had instructed his attorneys not to make any more legal moves. Chessman said he had been under "extreme and intense pressure" from his attorneys and friends to seek clemency from the governor. Brown turned down Davis' bid for clemency for Chessman last week. SACRAMENTO (UPI) — The weight of world opinion was running 2-1 today against execution of convict — author Caryl Chessman Friday in California's gas chamber. Gov. Edmund G. Brown, a freshman in the executive chair, was a man caught in the middle. His office was deluged by thousands of letters—nobody tried to count them—for and against death for Chessman, convicted Los Angeles "red light" bandit. Brown, who opposes capital punishment, returned from a trip to Southern California and planned to remain here today. Cecil Poole, the governor's clemency secretary, said about 5 per cent of the letters were from foreign nations. He said virtually 100 per cent of these favored clemency for Chessman. October, Davis contended today that the clemency request will remain in effect before Brown until Chessman is executed. But Brown said today, "He made an appeal, I had a hearing. I rejected it. In the absence of something that would cause me to change my mind, Davis wants to see me this morning and I probably will." "I don't regard the first request as a clemency appeal because after he was over Chessman said he never authorized it." Attorney Rosalie Asher made the 15th and "last chance" appeal to the Supreme Court in Washington Tuesday. Davis said Chessman requested that no more legal moves be made after the court handed down its ruling.
