

KF Athletes Ready For Heavy Weekend

Nearly every prep and college athlete in Klamath Falls will see some heavy duty this weekend with the exception of the Oregon Tech basketball team which will take a three-day rest following their practice this afternoon.

Owl boss Wally Palmberg has some big plans for the invasion of Southern Oregon College Tuesday night but the Tech club will hold off on them until Sunday night. OTI has given up its gym to the three-day County B cage tourney which begins Thursday at 1:30 p.m.

All seven of the County B schools plus the orphaned Paisley Broncos will appear at Oregon Tech in quest of the sub-district 5B championship.

Coach George Miller's Owl wrestling squad plays host to the Humboldt State Lumberjacks on Saturday although the exact time for the matches has not yet been released. The meeting is the second for the two schools this season.

Meanwhile, at Klamath Union High coach DeLance Duncan and his varsity wrestling squad will tangle with the powerful Grants Pass Cavemen in a return bout Friday night on Pelican Court beginning at 7 o'clock. The following day Duncan and assistant coach Jack Peterson will pack up the KU frosh mat squad for a trip to Grants Pass where the team will enter the annual Southern Oregon frosh wrestling tourney.

Freshmen squads from six schools, McLoughlin and Hedrick of Medford, North and South Grants Pass junior highs, Central Point, Ashland and Klamath Falls, are entered. The meet will begin at 10 a.m.

The Pelican basketball team faces another tough series this weekend. Friday night they travel to Grants Pass for an all-important game with the Cavemen and on Saturday night they return to their home court for their final match with the state's top-ranked Medford Black Tornados.

Coach Dean White plans rugged defensive drills for the Wednesday practice session and a light wrap-up on Thursday.

White warns that the Grants Pass game is equally, if not more important than the Medford tussle. The Pels could clinch a tourney berth by defeating the Cavemen, where a win over Medford would not necessarily guarantee one.

Said White, "The other reason it's important is the fact that it comes before the Medford game. And we've got to play them one at a time. Grants Pass really drills that basket in their home gym."

Mostly for kicks, Tomahawk Ski Bowl will feature giant slalom races for youngsters Saturday.

The races aren't sanctioned by the Pacific Northwest Ski Association — the God of Thunder for competition skiers around here. But if they turn out well, more probably will be scheduled in this and future years, and perhaps the PNSA will someday sponsor events here.

The bowl corporation and Tomahawk instructors have wanted to try something like this for quite a while. They want, for one thing, to erase a sort of inferiority complex they think may be working on some young local ski patrons.

The instructors say there are plenty of youngsters skiing at the bowl these days who might surprise themselves in competition.

Boys and girls will compete separately in categories for those up to 10 years old, those 11 through 14, and those 15 through 18.

They will ski down the main face, the younger ones beginning somewhere about the middle of the big rope tow, the intermediates about at the end of it, and the teenagers at the top.

The race should not be dangerous because the numerous gates will slow skiers down to a safe speed, say Jack Nichols and Bob Charles, instructors. Entrants, nonetheless, must submit entry forms signed by parents or guardians. The forms are available at the bowl.

Races begin at 1 p.m. Sunday and, of course, the public is encouraged to come and watch or ski.

No entry fee is required. First, second and third winners will receive ribbons.

Lew Burdette Braves' GM To Have Chat

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — When Milwaukee Braves' general manager John McHale arrives here to discuss contract terms with Lew Burdette next week, he'd better come well stocked with vocal ammunition.

The right-handed pitching star of the Braves vowed today he'd either get an increase in salary or he'll sign only when Milwaukee's County Stadium freezes over.

After reaching a career high of 21 victories in 1959, he felt certain he'd get a raise over his \$36,000 salary. Instead, he said, he was offered a cut—a healthy one, too.

The proffered 1960 contract called for \$23,000, a 22 per cent reduction. "This is ridiculous," he said. "You win 20 and you get cut. That's because the club didn't win the pennant, they say. Well, I did my best."

"Imagine being a 20-game winner on a second division club? I guess they don't even bother to send you a contract?" Burdette returned the first contract and received a second the other day. This one restored half the proposed cut.

"I talked to McHale on the telephone," Burdette said, "and I told him I didn't see how he could cut the greatest pitcher in the history of baseball. He laughed and said, 'I know you've got a world of confidence in yourself, but even you can't figure you're the greatest pitcher who ever lived.'"

"Well, I said, 'the greatest game that's ever been pitched in baseball history wasn't good enough to beat me. So I must be the greatest.'"

He was referring to his 1-0 victory over Pittsburgh last May 26 — the night the Pirates' Harvey Haddix pitched 12 perfect innings, then lost in the 13th with a one-hitter. Lew allowed 12 hits.

Burdette, 33, a native of Nitro, W.Va., who now makes his home in Sarasota, had a 21-15 record last year. No other National League pitcher won more. He hurled 20 complete games and 290 innings.

Sportsmen Eye Water Problems

Proponents of the act will do well to have adequate water provisions written into the measure before submitting it to the electorate. Under present understanding, fish handling has not been mentioned in the measure beyond inadequate existing laws.

Chamberlain Collects 44, Leads Win

Chamberlain, who has accounted for a fantastic 2,233 points so far in his rookie campaign, collected 44 Tuesday night as the Philadelphia Warriors swept their nine-game season's series with the Cincinnati Royals, 117-112.

In other games, Boston whipped Minneapolis, 130-122, New York surprised Syracuse, 125-116, and St. Louis defeated Detroit, 111-104.

The Celtics used a balanced attack to overcome Elgin Baylor's 40-point performance for the Lakers. Bill Sharman led the Celtics with 26 points, Bob Cousy had 24, Frank Ramsey 22 and Bill Russell 20.

New York sped to its second win in nine starts with the Nats this season. Dick Girmaker led the Knicks with 33 points while Dolph Schayes' 26 paced Syracuse.

St. Louis, playing without Bob Pettit, staged a second half rally to overcome a Detroit lead. Cliff Hagan with 26 points and Clyde Lovellette, 24, helped make up for the absence of Pettit, who is being examined for "near exhaustion."

Gene Shue of the Pistons had a game high of 31 points.

Trapper Lists Fur, Game Kills

MOUNT SHASTA — John P. (Pete) Borgnis, predatory animal hunter and trapper, has announced that he has taken 10 bobcats during the fur season. Ten minks, all near the fish hatchery, have been trapped; and coyotes without number. Borgnis does not save the pelts of the latter, but never fails to kill all taken in his traps.

The trapper killed a 420-pound bear last fall with one shot with his deer rifle. He says that a mountain lion comes into the territory he covers occasionally. He plans making a special effort to take that arch deer killer this spring.

No Reason, Just Policy

Easy To Get Into Fort Knox As Compared With Olympics

SQUAW VALLEY, Calif. (UPI) — The public laughed when one California legislator suggested that the Olympic area of Squaw Valley be turned into a minimum security camp for first offenders after the games are over.

But there is another laugh going the rounds of the area now.

"It's already a maximum security camp," said one wag.

To get in and out of Squaw Valley these days a man driving a car is stopped oftener than a heavily-traveled main street full of traffic lights.

"I'm starting to believe that it's harder to get into Fort Knox," said Walter Brown of

Boston, a high Olympic ice hockey official. "I was stopped many times before I finally got here. Then we were turned off the road to a parking lot, where we had to pay \$1 for parking and then walk to the games area."

Brown laughed at the experience he had in getting to an important meeting—but to many visitors it is no laughing matter.

Sometimes it takes up to 15 to 20 minutes to travel a mile because patrolmen stop the car, turn the driver over to white helmeted Olympic guards who inspect the credentials, and then either wave the man on—or turn him back.

"It's a silly system," said one patrolman. "We are doing this because we were told to. But so far as we're concerned, we'd like to wave everyone along."

"Here we are trying to help the public—but, man, you should see the abuse we're taking."

The state Highway Patrol has assigned 40 officers to the area against the usual 11. And at times it seems the only cars traveling along the highways in the area are police cars.

A good guess is that the average number of stops on the two-mile trip from the entrance to the valley to the site of the games is five.

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
