Farm Crisis Hits France

PARIS (UPI) — A new farm and labor crisis boiled up today in France and turned government attention away from the mounting Afro-Asian criticism of its atomic bomb test and the threat of a series of diplomatic ruptures.

Another sharp split was reported within the cabinet with Finance Minister Wilfrid Baumgartner and Industry Minister Jean-Marcel Jeanneney at odds over how to treat with growing demands for revised price policies. Thousands of farmers rioted last Thursday in the northern city of Amiens against government price freezes and new mass protest rallies were called for this Thursday in Clermont Ferrand and Chartres.

Against the demand for higher farm prices were demands from powerful unions that the government make good its pledge for an across-the-board raise in the big state-run gas and electric industry.

While President Charles de Gaulle struggled with the acute economic problems at home, dangerous developments were reported in Africa where a series of diplomatic breaks threatened if he goes ahead with plans for further atomic tests.

Informed sources said France would follow up its first atomic test with the explosion of a tactical nuclear weapon within two months despite the diplomatic reaction.

The first major reaction came from Morocco, 360 miles north of the French Sahara Desert bomb site at Reggane, which recalled Ambassador Abdellatif Bendjeloun Monday and renounced a Franco-Moroccan accord of May 28, 1956.

Protests poured in from Ghana, the Sudan, Japan and other Afro-Asian nations and the Algerian rebel government announced it would make an "important declaration" sometime today.

Former Washington Bishop Views Situation In Asia

LONDON (AP) — The Right Rev. Stephen F. Bayne, former Protestant Episcopal bishop of the Western Washington Diocese of Olympia, arrived Monday to take over the new post of executive officer of the Worldwide Anglican Communion.

He will be the first American bishop in Church of England history to set up an office in Lambeth Palace, residence of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

The 51-year-old bishop flew from home after a six-week tour of the Orient and the Midwest. He told London airport newsmen:

"It annoys the hell out of us westerners to see the way people have to live there (Asia). It shocks us. The symbol out there is still the man balancing a rod on his shoulders bearing two loads. Man was not made to carry stones."

"I know from statistics that three-fifths of the people in the world do not get enough to eat. But it is different when one sees it for one's self."

Asked about the Christian church in the Orient, he said "there will not be many more years when it is possible for the West to move freely, spiritually, in the Orient." Western missionaries will be under increasing difficulties, he added.

"In their (Asians) view," he said, "the Western missionary represents the old force and therefore he must go."

The bishop was asked if, in light of his Asian tour, the report to the 1958 Lambeth conference on family planning would still stand.

Bishop Bayne was chairman of the committee on "the family in contemporary society" which supported birth control.

He said the report "would be written even more strongly today" and added:

"Population control is going on in the Orient in ways that are shocking to the Christian community. There are more than one million abortions a year in Japan."

As executive officer of the Anglican Communion, Bishop Bayne takes an assignment which will make him one of the most influential church figures.

He will be executive officer of the Anglican Advisory Council on Missionary Strategy, a new central planning body for the Anglican Communion's 40 million members.

In addition, he will exercise general supervision of the executive body which functions during the ten-year intervals between Lambeth conferences.

Also he will continue to serve the Episcopal church in the United States as bishop in charge of its 11 congregations in Europe. He has been bishop of Olympia diocese since 1947.

Detroiters See Slender Nixon

DETROIT (AP) — Detroiters saw a slenderized Vice President Richard M. Nixon Monday. He was 15 pounds lighter than during his last appearance in Michigan nearly 17 months ago.

His wife, Pat, told newsmen he lost about 15 pounds early in 1959 after "he picked up a bug of some sort" during an African tour. His health is fine, Mrs. Nixon said. It's just that he never regained those 15 pounds. She said he now weighs about 170.

Wildlife Aide Gives Talk

PORTLAND (AP) — A team effort is needed to protect the nation's wildlife resources, Assistant Secretary of the Interior Ross Lefler said here Monday.

The task of preserving the resources, Lefler said, is too big for any one group. Rather, he said, there must be a united front by the federal government, the states, conservation groups and interested individuals.

In an address to a regional conference of the federal Bureau of Sports Fisheries and Wildlife, Lefler said:

The large increase in population means that the people will need more land, thus reducing the habitats for wildlife, with fewer places to hunt and fish, and at the same time there will be more people wanting to participate in hunting and fishing.

"We have a big job in protecting our resources," Lefler said. 45 million persons hunted and fished in the United States last year.

"Sport fishing and hunting is big industry," he said.

Lefler's address opened a four-day meeting of the federal agency.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Commerce Department Monday opposed any increase in the construction differential subsidies paid to builders of American ships.

John J. Allen Jr., the department's undersecretary for transportation, said the department does not believe it is necessary at this time to remove the present 50 per cent subsidy limitation.

The federal government pays up to 50 per cent of the cost of building U. S. merchant vessels in American shipyards, to protect the domestic industry from foreign competition made possible by lower wages and differing working conditions.

Allen said the department recognizes the system is sound but does not feel that it is necessary to raise the 50 per cent limitation now.

Allen agreed with Chairman Warren Magnuson (D-Wash.) that "substantial" amounts of foreign aid money have been used to improve foreign shipbuilding capacities.

"This makes it more difficult for U. S. shipbuilders and increases the subsidy costs we have to pay," Magnuson said.

The subcommittee is considering a bill to eliminate the 50 per cent limitation, sponsored by Sens. Magnuson and John Marshall Butler (D-Md.).

Miss Christine, billed as the Cat Girl, was charged in 1958 with obscenity and performing a lewd and indecent dance. The lower court had dismissed the case.

Dominican Republic Boss Battles Internal Strife

Editor's note: Morris W. Rosenberg of the AP's foreign staff has just visited the Dominican Republic, where Generalissimo Rafael Trujillo is fighting for survival after 30 years of iron-fisted rule.

By MORRIS W. ROSENBERG PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — Generalissimo Rafael Trujillo is trying to stem the rising tide of discontent before it engulfs the Caribbean's oldest dictatorship.

Encircled by foes in Cuba, Venezuela and Puerto Rico, the iron-fisted, 68-year-old dictator of the Dominican Republic is defiantly battling internal opposition which flared last month and nearly resulted in disaster.

Trujillo crushed a nationwide plot by a middle-class group of

lawyers, doctors and other professionals to assassinate him Jan. 21 at the opening of a cattle show. He retaliated with a wave of arrests.

But his action in jailing 1,500 to 2,000 persons drew fire from the Catholic Church. In a strongly worded pastoral letter, the church protested there was a lack of human rights in the country and deplored the suffering of the families of those jailed.

Many of those jailed were soon released, but 120 so far have been sentenced to 30 years at hard labor, the maximum under the law, and fines totaling more than one million dollars. All admitted participating in the plot.

Other home front troubles beset Trujillo in this 30th year of his dictatorship.

Businessmen complain that economic conditions are the worst in years. A drought last year which reduced the sugar and coffee crops was coupled with lower world prices. Government income was thus cut, but at the same time the regime was forced into extra military expenditures by the threat that exiled opponents of Trujillo would invade from Cuba. This caused a cutback in other government spending, particularly for public works.

Nixon Seen As President

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP) — Vice President Richard Nixon will be the next President of the United States, Idaho's Republican Gov. Robert E. Smylie told a Lincoln Day banquet here Monday night.

"I'm convinced Dick Nixon can beat any one of them (Democrats) or any combination of them and I'm sure he will," Smylie said.

He said the main issue of the 1960 campaign and "perhaps the mission of this century is wrapped up in the objective of peace."

Smylie blasted criticism of the nation's defense program and defended the record of the Eisenhower administration.

"Some poppycock is being peddled by ambitious men about the state of the nation's defenses," he said. "It doesn't do justice to the needs of the nation in this critical period."

Solon's Aid Requested

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP) — Sen. Warren G. Magnuson's aid in protecting Northwest salmon interests was sought Monday by Gov. Rosellini.

Rosellini sent the Washington senator a bill proposed by Milo Moore, state fisheries director, and asked Magnuson's help in working out an understanding with Canada concerning fishing rights off the British Columbia coast.

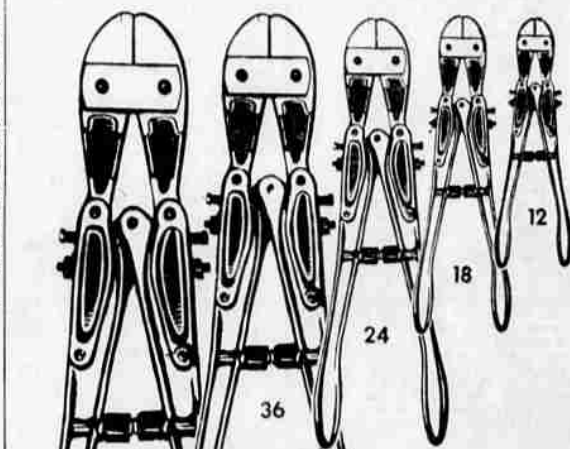
Moore's proposal would involve agreement on the historic fishing rights of both countries in waters within a three-mile limit. It also would call for cooperative management to permit fair and equitable harvest of fish based upon conservation needs and contributions made to the resources as a whole.

Canada has announced it will press for fisheries jurisdiction up to six miles at the Law of the Sea Conference in Geneva next month. Such a move would cut U. S. fishermen from rich coastal waters.
