### Daily Paper In Portland Hits Snag

PORTLAND (AP) — Plans to start a new daily newspaper in Oregon ran into a temporary snag at the outset Wednesday. Incorporation papers were improperly filled out, said officials of the state corporation commissioner's office in Salem. The papers were sent back to Portland. Attorney William B. Murray said here the papers would be corrected and returned. The papers are for a company to be known as the Portland Examiner, which is planned as a 24-page daily with an initial 100,000 circulation. Murray said the backers were investment bankers and professional newspapermen, but that he could not disclose their names until 100,000 persons have indicated a willingness to take the new paper. If 100,000 sign pledges being mailed to Portlanders now, underwriters will put up three million

dollars, then begin selling stock to Oregon residents, Murray said. He added that there were Portlanders in the backing, but that one important backer was from San Francisco. In separate statements Murray and labor officials said the proposed new daily has nothing to do with organized labor's earlier proposal to start a new daily here also. Ed Whelan, executive secretary of the Multnomah County Labor Council, said labor's plan for a new daily still was alive, although labor would watch closely the development of the Examiner. Earlier he had said the aim was not to get a labor-owned daily, but an independent, third daily in Portland. It was expected to take several

months for any new daily to get clearance from the state corporation commissioner, the federal Securities Exchange Commission and to complete other paperwork. Meanwhile the city's current two dailies, The Oregonian and the Journal, continued to issue the joint publication they started when a strike hit the plants Nov. 10, idling 850 union workers. The papers have said they hope to resume separate publication by April.

The Negro minister denied the charge as he posted \$2,000 bond Wednesday.
