# Mustangs, Huskies Meet Antlers, Panthers Set County B Favorites Earn Victories

Everything went pretty much according to the pre-tourney dope-sheet in the opening round of the County B basketball tournament held in the Oregon Tech gym Thursday afternoon and evening. Malin, Chiloquin and Bonanza all scored lopsided victories while Merrill was hard pushed for its right to enter the semifinals which begin at 7:30 tonight. The semi opener pits Bonanza and Chiloquin while Merrill and Malin will tangle in the nightcap immediately following.

Thursday the Bonanza Antlers pounded the Gilchrist Grizzlies 75-43; Chiloquin blasted Bly 63-25; Merrill won an uphill 59-44 victory over the Sacred Heart Trojans and Malin, using its reserves for nearly two-thirds of the ball game, chastened little Paisley 75-37.

The winners of tonight's action will square away Saturday night in the sub-district 5B championship match and the right to continue to the district championships which will be held in Ashland March 3-4-5.

**Malin 75, Paisley 37**  
Malin had absolutely no trouble in polishing off outclassed Paisley, and the Mustangs' second unit played for two and a half quarters. Before the flashy first unit went back to the bench, they had run up a comfortable 35-6 margin with 4:11 of the second stanza left on the clock.

Prior to the Mustangs' starting five's departure, a brilliant display of ball handling, passing, shooting and rebounding was put on by Randy Miller, Rick Illian, Jim Long, Dave DeMarritt and Larry Rick.

Almost stealing the show from the starting five, though, was 5-4 guard Bob Brown of the Mustangs. Brown demonstrated an amazing shooting accuracy by gathering a game high of 20 points. He tallied seven field goals and garnered a perfect 6-6 from the foul line.

The Mustangs jumped off to a 21-5 initial stanza lead and stretched it to 43-14 at the half. The second squad continued the high scoring in the latter half and made it 62-26 at the close of the

**Merrill 59, SHA 44**  
The closest, most exciting game in the opening round was the Husky-Trojan encounter. It was anybody's ball game until about six minutes left in the final period when Merrill slowly moved out.

Although the Trojans never led, they came within four points of the Merrilites, 44-40, at the 6:43 mark when Brian Fields and Bill Beasley of the Huskies fouled out. However, Denny Salvadori refused to let up and collected nine points in the last six minutes of play.

Neither club could control the offensive rebounds, and yet both of them cleared the defensive boards effectively. What won the game for the Huskies was the consistent outside firing of forward Dean Haskins and Salvadori. Haskins ended the game with 19 tallies and Salvadori collected 21.

The Merrill five jumped off to a 15-9 lead in the first period and enlarged it to a 31-22 advantage at the intermission. The Trojans narrowed the gap at the final buzzer in the third canto at 42-34.

Tony Krok dropped in 13 points. The Huskies collected 21 field

**Chiloquin 63, Bly 25**  
The second game of the afternoon session was nearly an exact replica of the opener. The Panthers clobbered a shorter but aggressive Bobcat five.

The Panthers used a zone defense, but pressed the shorter and slower Bly squad into numerous mistakes. Chiloquin's fast break, tremendous height advantage and greater shooting accuracy decided the game from the beginning.

The scrappy Bobcat "5" used some deliberate ball control tactics for the first six minutes of the game when they held the Chiloquin club to 5-5. However, Bly found itself at a 16-5 first quarter disadvantage two minutes later when John Ochoa stole the ball to dump in eight quick points on three field goals and two gift shots. The Panthers' shooting skills and fast break pushed them into a 37-10 lead at the intermission. Bly made a serious attempt on the comeback trail in the last half, but Chiloquin ignored the

threat and registered a 49-15 third canto margin. Ochoa's ball stealing antics and eight field goals provided him with the game's scoring honors with 18 tallies. Teammates Lyle Hall, Paul Harris and Frank Heglund each nabbed 10 points.
