## Squaw Valley Air Has Athletes High

SQUAW VALLEY, Calif. (AP)—The parties here aren't breaking any Roman records for revelry, but it's not uncommon to run into an athlete who's feeling a little high.  
The boys aren't hitting the bottle at full throttle. They're gasping for air that isn't all there. It's the altitude—6,200 feet. The

air at the site of the Winter Olympics is so thin that a good wind will blow only a quarter of a mile before it dies of anemia.  
The lack of oxygen hasn't bothered all the athletes, but many complain that breathing conditions here are roughly as invigorating as those at the bottom of a lake.  
Friday, for example, after the pairs' figure skating competition, some of the skaters collapsed. Others vomited.  
Said Oarika Kilus of Germany, who finished second with Hans Baumlner:  
"One week was not enough to get acclimated."  
Nearly all the cross-country skiers complained of short breath. Sometimes even speed skaters can't get going fast enough to catch their breath. But they may have less ground for complaint than other athletes.  
One official said they can go faster in the thin air. This, combined with excellent ice conditions, may produce more fallen records than athletes.

## Prep Cagers Collect A-1 Playoff Slots

Two more teams—Hermiston and Sandy—clinched berths Friday night in the Oregon class A-1 high school basketball tournament at Eugene March 15-19.  
Hermiston, tied for No. 5 with Roseburg in the last Associated Press poll, won one of the Intermountain League spots when it beat Bend, 50-42. Dave Mann scored 20 points as Hermiston came from behind for the victory.  
Unranked Sandy, leader in the Wilco League, nailed down a berth by trouncing Wy'East, 62-44.  
Marshfield trimmed Cottage Grove 88-59 Friday. Mel Counts, 6-9, registered 38 points.  
Cleveland, ranked No. 4 in the poll, continued to pace the Portland League, downing Lincoln, 63-28. Jefferson moved into a tie with Grant for second place in the league with a 64-56 triumph over the Generals.  
Roseburg was shaded by North Bend, tied with South Salem for No. 10 spot, 63-62, as the battle continued for runnerup position to Marshfield in the Midwestern League.  
Ninth-ranked South Eugene edged the No. 8 team, Springfield, in another Midwestern contest.  
South Salem downed Corvallis, 79-67, and advanced closer to winning a Valley League tournament spot.

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## Len Matthews Stops Godih

NEW YORK (AP)—Len Matthews made youth, punching power and one knockdown pay off for a split decision over Lahouari Godih, a game, experienced Algerian.  
That was the story of Friday night's Madison Square Garden fight. The two lightweights (Matthews 135½, Godih 136½) drew it so close that the officials had to go to the point system to get a verdict.  
A rematch on March 14 is set. Referee Harry Kersch voted for Matthews, 29, a Philadelphia slugger. Judge Tony Castellano scored it 5-4-1 for the 30-year-old Godih. Judge Leo Birnbaum had it 5-5 in rounds but gave three points to Matthews for a seventh-round knockdown and thus scored it in Len's favor 7-5 in points. The AP also was 5-5 but 6-5 for Matthews on points. Ten of 12 writers thought Matthews won.

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## Capacity Crowd Sees Semi Thrillers

The Friday semifinals produced two highly exciting and close contests which went right down to the wire. The near capacity crowd at Oregon Tech had its share of thrills as Malin eked out a 32-30 victory over a deliberate, ball control Merrill five, after Bonanza trimmed Chiloquin in overtime, 72-68.  
The Huskies established the pace in the second game of the semifinals by using deliberate stalling tactics which, coupled with a Mustang cold streak nearly cost the league champs the ball game.  
With 50 seconds remaining Malin's Randy Miller scored on a layup which put the winners at a four-point advantage. But at 0:37 Mustang Dave DeMerritt fouled Husky center Brian Fields who calmly sank both his gifts. The Huskies twice stole the ball away from the Mustangs, but jump shots by Dean Haskins and Denny Salvadori weren't on course. Confusion reigned as the buzzer sounded when Merrill's Dick Carleton dropped in a bucket, but it was ruled too late.  
Merrill jumped off to a 9-4 initial quarter margin and desperately held on to it at 19-15 at the intermission. With five seconds remaining in the third, Larry Rick finally put the Malinites ahead for the first time at 24-23.  
Dean Haskins led all scorers with 13 tallies. Malin's Miller was next with 10. At the free throw line the Mustangs garnered 10-13 and the Huskies scored 15-21. Malin out-shot the Huskies in the field goal department 11-8.  
In the first game of the evening, Chiloquin virtually fouled itself out of a crack at the championship by collecting 28 personal fouls in their overtime defeat. Except for rugged John Ochoa, every Panther starter gathered five personals. Even Ochoa had to sit on the bench for the third period when he ran up four personals in the first half.  
Credit must go to the red-hot Antlers, though, as they played cool ball until the final minute of regulation time. Chet Schooler of the victors dropped in six points in the last four minutes of play to push the Bonanza crew ahead at 64-60, but a tremendous full court press and Ron Hoggarth's accurate jump shots put the game into overtime. Ochoa's desperation half court heave when the buzzer sounded hit the hoop, but caromed off.  
Butch Crume sank six of the Antlers eight overtime points and Denny Ellis provided the other two.
